----Those Kansas Secured Debt stamps are becoming 'impossible' to obtain. Other Kansas stamps which were plentiful, such as the Feeds etc., are also becoming very hard to dome by. Our reference collection lacks the Secured Debts 20¢, 80¢, 90¢, and \$11 thru \$15 altho we sold some of them to Frank Applegate for his denomination collection in one of our weaker moments. Can anyone help us with these stamps? ----look for some new rare varieties of the Feed, Fertilizer, and Livestock Remedy stamps-- we have found some and will put out a new list for SRS members very soon.
