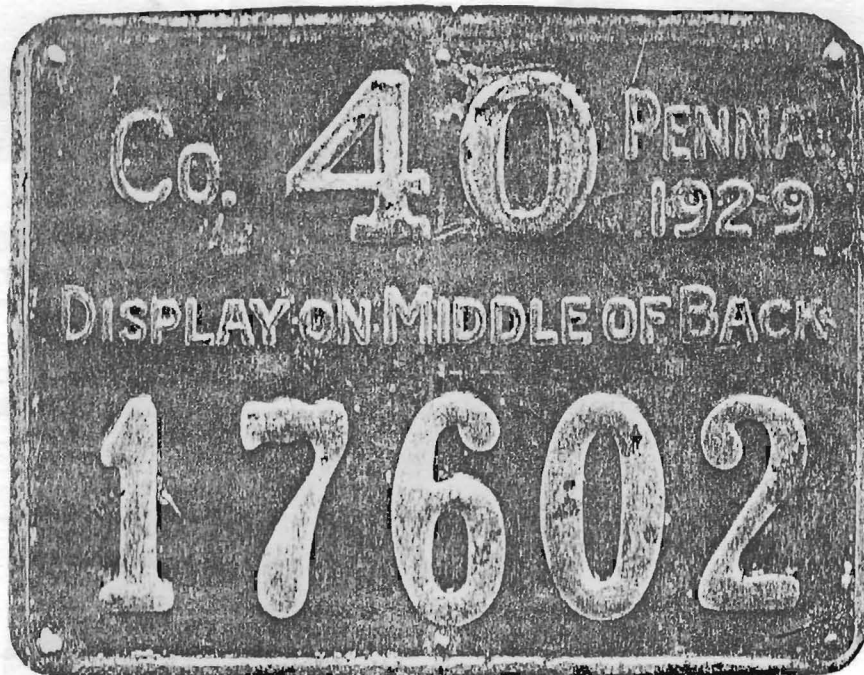

METAL HUNTING LICENSES AND BADGES

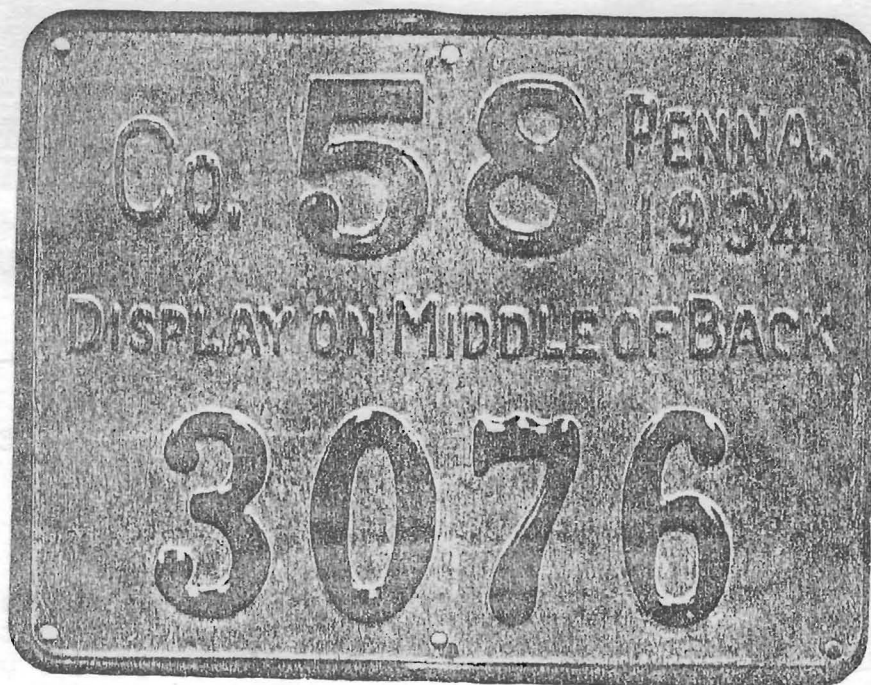

Unquestionably today's wallet-sized hunting and fishing licenses are a lot more convenient than some utilized in the past. Metal licenses required to be affixed to the back of the jacket undoubtedly got caught on low-hanging limbs and bushes. Badges on the fishing jacket probably provided a happy nesting ground for lures, alder bushes and fly leaders. Nonetheless, many states used such devices conspicuously displayed on sportsmen in place of a simple piece of cardboard.

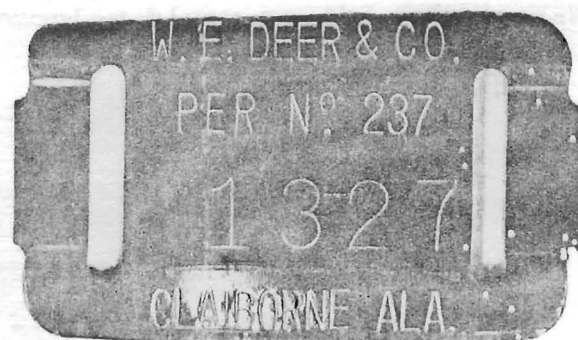
Pictured here are some of these from my collection. Certainly the NEWSLETTER editor would welcome additional examples for future issues.

These Claiborne, Alabama hunting permits appeared in the form of belt buckles. Years are unknown. I have an additional Claiborne example in the form of a tag which is difficult to copy but is shaped in a long rectangle about 4 inches long and an inch wide topped with a half circle with a radius of about 1 inch. Near the top of the half circle is a punched hole, presumably to make it easy to affix to a jacket or maybe a watch chain.

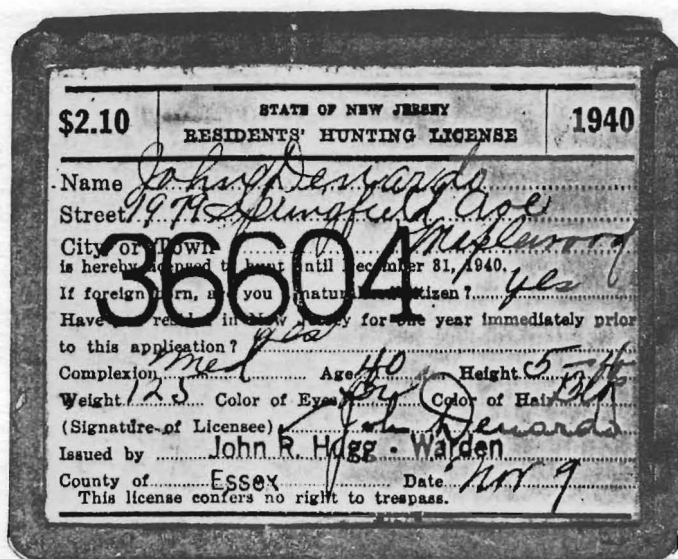

HAND LIMIT: Prairie Chickens and Grouse: 5 in one day; not over 10 in possession at any one time. Snipe and Waterfowl: 15 in one day; not over 30 in possession at any one time.

SEASONS: Prairie Chickens and Grouse: Begins on morning of September 16 and closes at dark on October 15. Snipe and Waterfowl: Begins one-half hour before sunrise on September 16 and closes one-half hour after sunset on December 31. (The Federal Law permits no hunting after sunset.)

NOTICE: The 1925 legislature provided that each male citizen over 21 years of age must have a fishing license to take protected fish (except perch) unless he holds a hunting license, which is good for both hunting and fishing.

No game of any kind can be sold. Hunting game birds with a rifle is prohibited.

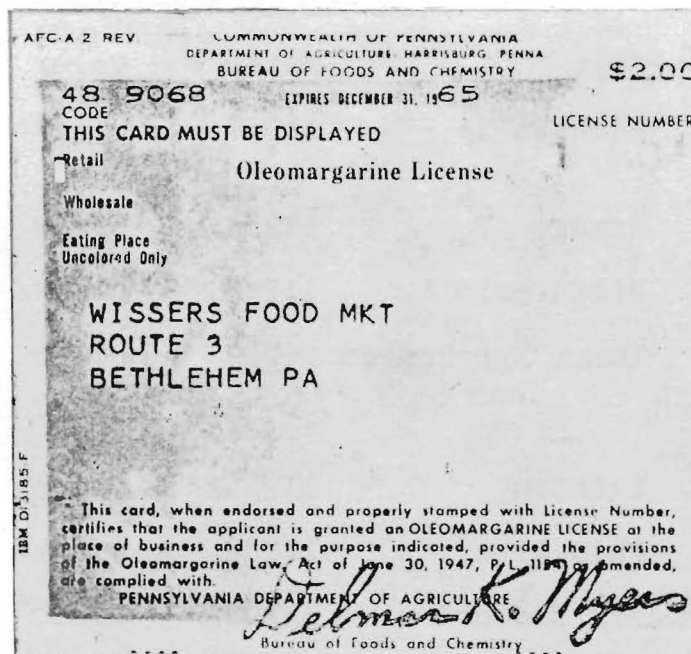
PENNSYLVANIA OLEOMARGARINE LICENSES

In contrast to many other states, Pennsylvania never taxed oleomargarine directly. But on May 29, 1901 a law was passed that prohibited the possession or sale of colored margarine. At the same time annual licenses for various occupations associated with oleomargarine were established. The following rates were set:

Manufacturer	\$1000
Wholesale Dealer	500
Retailer	100
Restaurant keeper, Dining room proprietor or hotel proprietor	50
Boarding house keeper	10

This law was in effect until 1947. Effective July 1, 1947 colored margarine was legal and the old license system was drastically altered. A court case similar to the one reported in Kentucky (see Ken Pruess' article, SRN 114:39ff.) claimed that the large license fees actually were a restraint of trade. The new law (1947 P.L. #483) retained the original occupation titles but all licenses now cost only \$2.00.



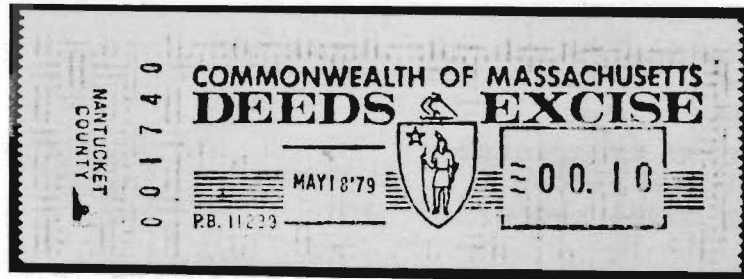
Three of these licenses have been discovered:

- 1961 Dull green on manilla
- 1962 Dull rose on manilla
- 1965 Black on manilla

The 1965 issue was the last before the law was repealed. The author would appreciate hearing about the existence of other examples. The author would like to thank Carter Litchfield for the information on the 1961 and 1962 issues.

Sometime in the past few years Massachusetts introduced a new design for the deed transfer tax meter tapes used to collect this tax. The new design is illustrated here. The design of the deed tax adhesive stamps has not been changed.



Several of Massachusetts' 14 counties are divided into two or three districts. Each district has a register of deeds and a metering machine. There are a total of 21 districts. The table below details the meter tapes used in each district. All counties and districts use tape that is imperforate horizontally.

THE EDITOR ANSWERS

Each year's dues renewals offers members an easy opportunity to ask questions about the NEWSLETTER and its content. Secretary/Treasurer Harold A. Effner, Jr. is always kind enough to pass these along and here goes for answers.

Members' suggestion: "Copyright the NEWSLETTER so no one can copy it." Editor: "It is being copyrighted now. Due to an editorial error, the NEWSLETTER has not been so protected until the last issue; President Hines had requested this be done considerably prior to this."

Members' question. "When will the next yearbook appear?" Editor: "The yearbook has been set up to appear in alternate years with the election of SRS officers. In other words, the next yearbook should appear about July, 1981. OBSOLETE FISH AND GAME STAMPS

Member Don Terrell provides information on obsolete fish and game stamps from Florida and Arizona.

At the close of each fiscal year, the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission make available obsolete stamps at the nominal charge of \$1.00 each, including the 1979-80 Florida duck stamp. Many of the available stamps are management area stamps, and date back to 1967.

VIRGINIA BEAR-DEER DAMAGE STAMPS

H.B. Hutton offers an explanation of the reduced number of Virginia counties utilizing the Bear-Deer Damage Stamps in 1980.

The sale of these stamps creates a fund used by counties to pay land-owners for damage to crops or property caused by either the bear and deer or by the big game hunters. In some counties there has been so few claims that the funds on hand have outstripped the limits placed on these funds by the General Assembly. Consequently Floyd, Patrick, Rockbridge, Scott, Smyth, Wise and Washington counties issued no stamps for the 1979-1980 hunting season.

In Smyth County approximately 700 resident and 23 Non-Resident stamps were sold before being taken off sale. County officials advertised that anyone who bought one could take it to the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court for a refund.

A National Forest stamp is still required in all counties by anyone trapping, hunting or fishing on National Forest land.

ALASKA PUNCHBOARD DETAILS

Elliott Chabot believes the Alaska Punchboard stamp pictured on the back page of the Sept. issue of the NEWSLETTER was issued in 1951 and was used throughout the 1950's. By 1966 all use of the stamp had stopped as the result of the enforcement of Alaska's anti-gambling laws. The tax was \$2.00 for punchboards with 2,000 holes or less and \$4.00 for punchboards over 2,000 holes.

Mr. Chabot would be interested in finding out the exact size, color, perfs and watermark(if any) on this stamp to include in the next edition of his US possessions revenue catalog. Can anyone help??

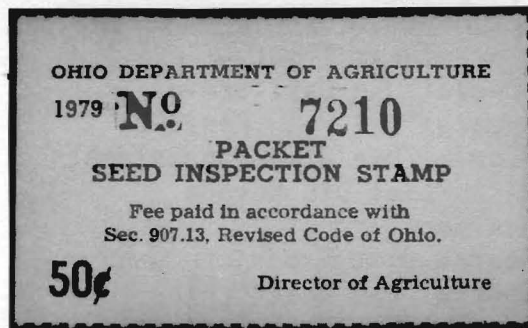
