OREGON CITY BEVERAGE ISSUES


by John B. Norton In regard to the various Oregon City Beverage stamps, Mr. Cabot, in his 1940 catalog, says that they "were outlawed by the legislature on March 19, 1935." E. L. Hubbard adds at a later date that they "were declared unconstitutional" soon after their issuance.


These statements, I believe, are basically correct but are in conflict to a degree with some of the facts.

Following the end of Prohibition in 1933, seven Oregon cities issued beer and/or wine stamps as a means of collecting taxes. These cities were Bend, Klamath Falls, Marshfield(now Coos Bay), Mt. Angel, North Bend, Salem and Turner. These cities had it made in adding to the city treasuries. Made, that is, until the state decided to get into the act.

Actually the state, following the end of Prohibition in 1933, was itself slowly preparing to get in on the act anyhow. About the time the cities were acting, Governor Julius J. Meier appointed a "blue ribbon" committee to study various methods of liquor control. The comittee chairman was Dr. William S. Knox; subsequent legislation establishing the liquor control system was for many years called the "Knox Law". The majority of the committee recommended the adoption of the "Quebec" system, in which the sale of liquor was through government-controlled liquor stores.

A special session of the legislature in December, 1933 passed the Liquor Control Act, which created the Oregon Liquor Control Commission. In January, 1934 the first commissioners were appointed and the proper organization began with the first stores opening on February 15. By the end of the following month there were 23 stores and 53 agencies located throughout the state.





It was the enactment of the Liquor Control Act that abolished the city beer/wine laws. Chapter 471, section .045 read as follows:

The Liquor Control Act, designed to operate uniformly throughout the state, shall be paramount and superior to and shall fully replace and supercede any and all municipal charter enactments or local ordinances inconsistent with it. Such charters and ordinances hereby are repealed.

As any state law will, of course, supercede a county or municipal law, one cannot say that the city beer/wine laws were either "outlawed" or "declared unconstitutional." They were repealed by the legislative act which allowed the state to make the sale of hard liquor a state monoply.

It would be interesting to know where Mr. Cabot got the date of March 19, 1935. As the Liquor Control Act was passed in December, 1933 one can, without checking Mr. Cabot's sources, come up with any number of reasons for this disparity; i.e. a court battle, a later legislative act, etc. With the Liquor Control Laws available, and after talking with the OLCC Information Officer, Geneive Cook, I would be of the opinion that Mr. Cabot made a minor error in his outstanding work.

DELAWARE FISH AND GAME

In 1978 the Delaware Division of Fish and Wildlife produced its first full color freshwater trout stamp. The Division commissioned artist Bob Jones to illustrate the stamp with his original art work.

Since 1979 the illustration used has been chosen from anong entries submitted to an art contest conducted by the Division.

A shredding schedule has been established to insure the value and collectibility of these stamps which are becoming increasingly popular with collectors. Approximately 6,000 resident and 1,500 non-resident stamps are produced each year.

The cost of Non-resident stamps for 1979 and 1980, and all future years will revert to the \$2.10 base price two years after the issue upon the completion of the State's audit.

Freshwater trout stamps still remaining from 1958 through 1976 can be purchased in a package for \$10.00. Stamps of some years during that period are no longer available. As each years' supply is exhausted they will not appear in the package.



The first Delaware Migratory. Waterfowl stamp was released in 1980. It is illustrated here showing a pair of Black Ducks in flight. The winning design is similarly determined in a contest sponsored by the Division of Fish and Wildlife.

NEBRASKA LIQUOR STAMPS

These stamps are interesting in that they range from a strip 140 mm x 12 mm for the first stamps to a 22 mm x 22 1/2 mm stamp for the final issue. There are printed cancels, a Columbian Bank Note imprint, Commission members names, sheet and position numbers, additional tax overprint and one issue of decals which closed out the use of tax stamps.

When this tax first went into effect the stamps were in strip form in order to go over the top of the bottle so the stamps would be torn when the bottle was opened. Since this covered the Federal strip the government requested that the useage be discontinued. Future issues were about half the size until the requirement of the names of the commission members being on the stamps was dropped in 1946 and the stamp then became the size of a postage stamp, 24 mm x 27 mm. The final paper stamps did not contain sheet or position numbers and were 22 mm x 22 1/2 mm.

The Columbian Bank Note Company imprint is on the three low values- $3\,1/8\,$ ¢, $6\,1/4\,$ ¢ and $12\,1/2\,$ ¢- issue of 1937. One Liquor Commission member served two terms as Chairman and to indicate his second term placed two vertical dashes below his signature. The stamps of the first term, 1938, were 84 mm x 18 mm and those of the second term, 1942, were 61 mm x 20 mm.

In 1946 a regulation specified a standard color of green for liquor stamps and that each value be distinctive. In place of Commission names sheet and position numbers were used with different colors for value, size and sheet number.

A red violet fugitive overprint "A.T.P." (additional tax paid) was used on the stamps of 1947 until new stamps could be printed to conform to new tax rates. Overprints reading up, down and inverted are known on some of the stamps. Some perf varieties and overprints have turned up and these make interesting hunting.

I have a previously unlisted L-4 12 1/2¢ (Preuss Catalog) printed date of June 19, 1935. Known dates for L-1 to L-4 were:

It would seem possible that L-1 and L-3 might also exist with the same dates as L-2 and L-4. Printed dates were used on the most popular rates until the Liquor Commission could catch up with the rush of orders due to the new tax and conform to punched dates. I would appreciate hearing from anyone with other dates and would refund postage along with a Nebraska freebie.

I would also be interested in hearing from other Nebraska collectors about any interesting items in their collections.

AN UNLISTED OREGON REVENUE?

During the last of May, 1974 I was sitting high in my own self-esteem. I felt so sure I had gotten upon the trail of an unlisted Yam-hill County, Oregon tax stamp that I thought I was up on cloud-9. Do you know the feeling?

While driving around the northwestern part of the Willamette Valley that spring, on the spur of the moment, I stopped at the Sheridan tax assessor's office. Showing them a small group of Oregon state revenues that I'd brought along, I asked if anyone has seen them or used them in their office. Saying no, they referred me to the courthouse in McMinnville, the county seat.

With my hopes having risen a small notch, I presented myself and stamp album at the counter of the county assessor's office. A half dozen people there found the Oregon revenues of interest; mainly because they had no idea such things had been issued, but told me they were not using any at that time. My hopes fell!

But upon being asked if their office had ever used adhesive tax stamps before, I was told they had at one time but, because the law had been changed in 1968, they had been discontinued. They didn't say how the law had been altered and I didn't think to ask. My hopes rose back up another notch. The stamps, I was told, had been issued to them by the Post office a block away and advised me to check there.

With my anticipation now at the boiling point, I was told at the Post Office that their remaining stamps had been inventoried in 1968, been placed upon a Post Office destruction sheet and their stock disposed of according to regulation.

I felt I'd missed out on something with this last bit of information, but still felt I had an unknown stamp at my hot finger tips. Even though I could find nothing further on these items within Yamhill County, I thought I was on the verge of a discovery.

With this sense of "I'm on to something," I wrote to Mack Matesen and Ken Pruess with my (to me) electrifying information. They, with the kindness and finesse of all pro's toward a novice researcher, let me down gently by stating that because the use had ended in 1968 the stamps had probably been the U.S. Documentary's rather than a local issue. Too, Ken said he didn't believe that Oregon law would have permitted a local tax at that time.

So much for the high hopes I had during that brief search!


But still, during the intervening years, there has been the nagging question in the back of my mind: Is there, or is there not, an unknown Yamhill County tax: stamp out there somewhere?

FLORIDA FRUIT INSPECTION CERTIFICATE AND STAMPS

I thought the pictured state of Florida Department of Agriculture Citris Fruit certificate with stamps on back would be of interest to those who have not seen one. Most of it speaks for itself but I would like to point out a few interesting items.

First, the inspection was on July 4, so that in 1938 there were some people who were working on what is now a universally-observed holiday. As noted on the bottom 250 boxes were inspected and fee paid for at the rate of 1¢ inspection fee and 1¢ advertising assessment per box. However under "Products" earlier in the form the inspector noted only 200 boxes were "Manifested" so there were apparently more boxes than the manifest called for.

On the back the inspection fee was paid with stamps CF26 and the advertising assessment with OR10 (50¢) and apparently OR17 (\$1). However Hubbard lists OR17 as perf 12 but these are definitely perf 12 1/2. Whether this is a new variety or a typographical error in the catalog needs determining. It would be informative for members to check the 1937 series of advertising stamps for oranges and report if theirs are 12 or 12 1/2 perfs. Since the grapefruit and tangerine stamps for 1937 were listed as 12 1/2, I suspect the orange stamps were inaccurately listed as 12 and should be corrected.

Incidently, the stock of 1936 50¢ OR10 must have been good since in July, 1939 they were still using up old supplies rather than the new 1937 series.

Twelve decals are printed each year, one for each month. These are issued with licenses during the month of issue. The decals are a different color each year, either red, green, yellow or blue. However, they are the same color for each month during the same year.

I managed to pick up about twenty license plates as they were being sold for salvage to a metal junk yard. Anyone interested can write me. That good fairy did a little work for the membership too. I was able to get the excess stock of decals from one of those sweet gals. Most are in short supply, but I do have about 50 of each of the 4-80 and the 1-81decal. 



TOURING MUSEUM PROF. DR. VAN DER POEL

Who were the first people to collect taxes? What was the first country to issue tax stamps? Who was the first woman tax collector? What country had a tax on beards? What country taxed the wind?

If you are ever in Rotterdam, Holland and go to 14 Parklaan, you will be able to find the answers to all of these questions and discover many more interesting stories and ancedotes associated with taxes and tax collecting. The building at this location originally housed the city's tax offices and has now been converted into a museum titled "Netherlands Museum of Taxation." It is the only such museum in the world devoted to the history of taxes.

The collection is the efforts of Prof. Dr. Van Der Poel, who was born in 1888. His original collection was destroyed by fire during the German bombing of Rotterdam in May, 1940. After the war he began to assemble a new collection and, by 1949, had sufficient material to open the present museum.

A quick tour of the highlights of the museum will give you an idea of what it contains. In the entry hallway is a large clock which dates back to 1797. It is not a fine piece and was evidently built for utilitarian purposes. Actually, it comes from England and dates to the time when there was a "tax on Clocks." Businessmen purchased the large clocks for the convenience of their customers. The tax only lasted eight months so not many of these clocks exist today.

Also in the hallway is a large painting which depicts the signing of the "Statutes of Utrecht", in 1579, which laid the foundations for the Netherlands Republic and the general tax system to finance the government. Oddly enouth, the Union of Utrecht was used as a guide in formulating the U.S. Constitution.

In Room #1 are innumerable objects and pictures connected with tax collection. For instance, there is a signboard which hung outside a tax collector's house showing a woman paying her "hearth tax", one of the earliest taxes going back to the Norsemen who had a tax on fires (huslotha). There is also a picture of Simonsdochter Hasselaer who was assigned the right to collect the "peat tax" after her gallant conduct during the Spanish wars in the defense of Haarlem. This was the first woman tax collector. A Babylonian clay tablet is a receipt for taxes paid on cattle, one of the earliest records of tax collecting. The taxes recorded in the bible are are fully covered as well as items from the Middle Ages. Tax revolts are also well covered, oddly enough, by illustrations on Chinaware plates. A bread tax was always a good reason for rioting, and in one case, the undertakers got into the act because of a tax on funerals and weddings.

Room #2 is filled with tax stamps. The first tax stamps were actually imprints from dies which embossed the document in question. They were invented in 1623 by Johannes Van den Brocke, and the first stamps were imprinted the following year. The complete story is told by displaying the actual steel dies, including all the known varieties, along with the associated hand presses for making the dies, applying the

stamps to the documents, and the modern printed adhesive stamps. Revenue stamps from almost every country are on display including some state revenues from the U.S., although they are far from being complete. Other countries followed Holland in use of the imprinted tax stamps; Spain in 1636, France in 1665 and Great Britain in 1694. A Russian Beard tax token of 1705 is also shown in this collection.

Room #3 is devoted to taxes in Holland under the rule of Louis Napoleon.

Room #4 traces the state lottery which isn't actually a tax, but is a method of raising money for government finance. It is in this room that a small stained glass panel shows a bare-bottom citizen running away from a tax collector who is holding the victim's pants as a last-resort tax payment.

Room #5 covers the area of excise duties. Sir William Temple wrote in 1668, "Everything is taxed in Holland except air and water". He overlooked the tax on ground corn which was the results of wind-driven mills and also water tolls.

Room #6 contains rotating exhibits. The one showing at the time of my visit concerned customs officians and customs duties.

Room #7 features many articles imprinted with guild hallmarks which were used as a mark of assay especially on gold and silver for collecting taxes. Land measurement and registry is also included in the displays.

In Room #8 is a selection of tax notices dating from 1634 to modern times.

Room #9, the portrait gallery, imortalizes in paintings, sketches and sculptures various famous and infamous people directly associated with taxes and tax collection throughout history with special emphasis on the Dutchmen. Would you believe that one P.H.B. Motke, a tax collector in the little town of Thorn, was so well liked that a statue of him was erected by the citizens in 1874.

Last, but not least, Room #10 features the fraud and deception side of tax collecting. There are all types of ingenious devices on display which have been used in smuggling various products. For instance, hollow coins for hiding narcotics, a bicycle used for smuggling gin in the hollow tubes and cigarette papers in the seat, artificial cow dung hiding enclosed containers, and may more. Not to be left out is a revenuer's still, a continuing problem in Holland today.

Every visitor to the museum will come away with a new perspective of taxes and how they form an integral part of the history of one's country. Visitors will also find out what we as revenue collectors already know--the history of taxation is not as tedious and dry as one expects.
