SRS Logo Contest Announced

The State Revenue Society Board of Directors has approved a nationwide contest hat will result in the selection of an SRS official logo.

The move was taken in response to the SRS survey that indicated more than twohirds of the membership felt the society should have an official emblem. Most organizations of national stature have some form of organizational identity.

The logo contest winner will receive 5100 for camera-ready logo art, will be eatured in a *State Revenue Newsletter* article and will be included in the society's national publicity.

The logo will be incorporated into the *IRN* banner and used with SRS official locuments.

Entries from all sources will be onsidered but they must be received by Jovember 1.

Logo submissions should be black and white pen and ink drawings on white paper hat is no larger than 8 1/2 by 11 inches. All esign elements must remain clear when the ogo is reduced down to one inch.


Portland Punchboard Meter Found

Postage Stamp Catalogue. For example, Hubbard identifies some illustrations by catalog number, some by year of issue and some by category. Differences in printing varieties are almost never illustrated.

The price value guide is not explained in Part Two, making it virtually useless for a novice.


Part One has most items priced but this information hasn't been updated since the 1960 catalog. Hubbard recommends multiplying the prices by ten but for most items dealers, are charging about four to five times the catalog price. Part Two uses a rarity factor for determining value but Hubbard's explanation of this system is weak and seems to confuse many people.

A regular retail price listing would be ideal but, because of the scarcity of much of the state material and the lack of regular dealer and auction price information, a wel defined rarity price guide could still be useful

Hubbard plans to combine the two sections into one and when this i accomplished the catalog's ease of use wi! improve greatly.

Despite its current shortcomings, th Hubbard is still the only complete listing the state revenue collectors can turn to. If yo don't have Part Two, I recommend that yo obtain a copy. The price for SRS members i \$30 postpaid.

The SRS library has one copy availabl for loan.

Arizona Luxury Tax Trial-Color Proof Reported

Terry Hines reports that he has found what he believes to be a previously unreported trial-color proof of the two-cent Arizona luxury tax stamp introduced in 1933 to tax tobacco, beer, cosmetics, playing cards and other items.

The imperf pair is black on an ungummed, off-white colored paper that is stiffer than the usual stamp paper.

The 1933 two-cent stamp was carmine.

Maryland Cigarette Decal Available From SRS Sales Service

When Maryland recently changed its cigarette tax rate to 36 cents per pack, it had no effect on the current "20 cigarette tax" decal in use. The design and colors, black and white lettering on a red shield background, stayed the same. Information on the previous stamps is unavailable but the SRS Sales Service has purchased a quantity of the 36-cent stamp for SRS members. (Harold Effner Jr.)

Bedding Study Group Report

Oklahoma Bedding Stamps Used Earlier Than Current Catalog Listing

New research into Oklahoma bedding stamps has caused significant changes to my earlier article in the *State Revenue Newsletter (SRN January-February 1991)*.

The Oklahoma statutes governing bedding stamps are Section 63 sub-section 1-1001 to 1-1007. In earlier research I confused this with Section 63 sub-section 1001, which was a law concerning migrant worker camps that went off the books in 1975.

The original bill authorizing bedding stamps and bedding stamp inspection was House bill 432 of the Oklahoma legislature, which went into effect April 25, 1945. This was a major revamping of the Oklahoma Department of Health.

The important points of this legislation with regards to bedding stamps are:

1. This pushes back the first usage of bedding stamps significantly from the 1947 listed in the Hubbard catalog.

2. To purchase the stamps you had to have a permit indicating your business had been inspected for proper germicidal handling. The application fee for a permit was \$5.00 the first time and \$2.50 for each years renewal. At the time a permit was issued you paid a \$25 fee the first time and a \$1 fee for a renewed permit.

3. The stamps were only issued in a onecent denomination and you had to purchase a minimum of 500 (or \$5). The stamp was to show the seal of the State of Oklahoma and "the registry number of the person applying therefor."

4. This act established that at least two state inspectors would be funded by this tax.

5. Penalties were \$50 to \$100 per day for operating without the proper permits.

In 1955 (page 352 of the Session Law) several changes were made to the sections governing bedding stamps.

The permit application fee for a renewal was upped to \$5 a year and the renewal fee when you got the permit also went up to \$5.

Also, the stamps went up to five cents each, and were still sold by the lot of 500 (\$25).

In 1957 (page 469 of the Session Law) there was a minor change dropping the number of stamps sold to a minimum lot of 100 or back to \$5. Apparently smaller manufacturers were not able to use the larger lots.

A large bill in 1963 (Session Law, pages 519-521) restructured the Department of Health and the code sections that the bedding stamps came under was changed.

Changes affecting the stamps were:

Permit applications now cost \$15 for a first time, \$5 for a renewal. Permit issuance now cost \$25 for the first time and \$5 for a renewal; adhesive stamps came in hundreds in only the five cent variety; and the registry number was no longer required on the stamp.

The last major bill change was in 1967 (session law chapter 95, sub section 1) effective April 20, 1967. A one cent stamp was now provided for articles retailing for from one cent to 94 cents before sales tax (my guess is that this was everything that could retail for under \$1 with sales tax). The five cent stamps were now required for use on items retailing for over 95 cents before sales tax. Both stamps were issued in quantities of 100. The registry number was not required on the stamp.

For large manufacturers the ability to not use stamps was introduced. They could keep records of their output and pay the fees quarterly in a lump sum.

The 1967 law is still in effect.


In the illustrations, I have tried to indicate the dates of usage based on the tax laws. This will vary quite a bit from the dates in the Hubbard catalog. The roulettes were measured per 20 millimeters.



Revised Hubbard Catalog Now Available

USA State Revenue Stamps Up to 1950 and 1992 supplement USA State Revenue Stamps 1950-91 by Elbert Snowden Amsler Hubbard. Self published, 1992, 11 by 8 1/2, three-hole punched. Available from the author for \$25 for the original and \$35 for the supplement at Box 9128, San Jose, Calif. 95157-0128. SRS members receive a \$5 per volume discount.

When reviewing the Hubbard State Revenue Catalog it helps to put this work into context.

The Hubbard catalog remains the only comprehensive listing of revenues of all 50 states and the District of Columbia. In this vein, it is a major contribution to state revenue collectors.

Hubbard purchased the rights to the George D. Cabot's 1940 Priced Catalogue of the State and City Revenue and Tax Stamps of the United States and has spent a lifetime updating the listings. The task, particularly when the sparse amount of information that can be obtained from state departments is taken into account, is a monumental undertaking. State revenuers owe Hubbard a debt of thanks for attempting this project.

The catalog is currently broken down into two sections: Part One is in a four column format on yellow paper and covers state revenue issues to 1950. It is essentially the same as the original Hubbard catalog published in 1960. Anyone that has the original catalog or one of the later supplements does not need Part One unless he or she wants to place both parts into the same three-ring binder.

Part two is on orange paper and covers 1950 to 1991. It is an updated listing in a revised, much easier to use, three column format. The type size in Part Two was increased, making it much more readable, particularly for older collectors. Each state has a numbered page header that makes finding a state easy. This feature is missing from part one. It also provides Hubbard the ability to add new finds and information without renumbering the whole catalog.

While this version of the Hubbard catalog is his best to date, there are still numerous shortcomings.

Hubbard has yet to develop a consistent editorial style. The manner of listings change throughout the catalog. The catalog needs a severe editing to correct misspellings, improper usage and punctuation. The design and layout is weak and inconsistent.

The catalog would benefit from an organized introduction rather than the current cut and paste hodge podge. A detailed explanation of listing criteria, organization, abbreviations and pricing is essential to make the catalog user friendly. A consistent catalog style must be established and followed. Everything from the color-coded pages, to the cover content, to the name of the catalog seems to vary with each reprint.

In 1960 the title was *State Revenue Catalog* by Elbert S. A. Hubbard, today the title is U.S.A. *State Revenue Stamps* by Elbert Snowden Amsler Hubbard.

Illustrations are now placed at the top or bottom of many pages and while the quality of the stamp reproductions has improved, there are still too few, some are still too dark to be of reference use and the manner of identifying the illustrations is inconsistent and often confusing.

To be a complete catalog, each major variety needs an illustration. Also the method of identifying the illustrations must be consistent, similar to the *Scott Standard*
