Second SRS Auction Another Big Success

The second SRS auction, which closed July 10, was another huge success with 121 of the 127 lots (95 percent) selling for a total of \$437.75. The total includes 77 lots that sold for at, or above, the estimate.

Bids were received from all parts of the country and 24 of the 29 bidders (83 percent) were successful with at least one bid.

Most bidders did not take advantage of the 25-cent bidding increments, resulting in 20 ties, including two three-way ties and one four-way tie, that were broken by bidders whose submissions had the earliest postmark. Hunting stamps were the most popular items as the top eight lots with the most bids received were from this category. Leading the way with 10 bids each were lot 7, a 1975-76 California duck stamp with a \$2 estimate, that wound up selling for \$7.25 and lot 40, a Maine 1974 \$1 pheasant stamp that sold for \$3.

Close behind with nine bids was lot 99, Utah's 1951 \$3 resident game bird stamp that sold for \$5.25.

Receiving eight bids each were lots 6, a 1974-75 California duck stamp that sold for \$4.25; lot 20, an Indiana mint 10-cent

Mahler Preparing Handbook Of 19th Century State Revenue Usages

Michael Mahler, a long-time revenue collector and researcher, is conducting research in preparation for a catalog/ handbook about documents bearing 19th Century state revenues.

Mahler previously authored United States Civil War Stamps Taxes, published by Castenholz and Sons in 1988. The work is considered a standard reference for revenue collectors.

For nearly 20 years Mahler has been recording documents bearing 19th Century revenues from Alabama, California, Louisiana, Nevada and Oregon. He has accessed dealer stocks, auction records and the holdings of private collectors. Now he feels that he has enough information to compile a catalog/handbook for this field.

He will classify documents, not only by the tax paid, but also by the type and rate of tax paid.

"It is an exciting endeavor involving

material that is nearly all exotic and scarce, if not rare," Mahler said. "My hope is that the finished product will be eye-opening, not only for those in more traditional areas of philately, but also for revenuers of all stripes."

Mahler is seeking additional information, suggestions and comments from collectors.

"No one person or small group can see it all and obviously, the more who contribute, the better," he said. "Even data on a single item will be welcome; often a piece thought to be trivial proves to have unsuspected significance. There will be no attribution of ownership."

Contributors are encouraged to submit photocopies of items in their possession. At a minimum, a piece should be identified by the type of document, the place and date of execution and the stamp(s) affixed. Send information to Mahler at 1725 The Prominade #204, Santa Monica, Calif. 90401 or call him at (310) 393-1394.. pheasant legal food sale stamp, that sold for \$2.25; lot 62, a set of 1960 and 1961 New Hampshire \$1 deer stamps that sold for \$4.25; and lot 68, a New York 1969-70 big game bowhunting stamp on licence that sold for \$2.75.

Seven keen-eyed collectors bid on lot 124, a 1976 \$3 National Wildlife Turkey Federation stamp that had a \$1 estimate and sold for \$4.25. One Midwest dealer had listed this issue for public sale at \$50.

The highest bids received were for lot 95, a Texas liquor decal with a high bid of \$24 that sold for \$7.25; lot 86, a set of three Klamath Falls, Ore., beer stamps that had four bids of more than \$10 with a high of \$15, that sold for \$13; and lot 81, an Ohio sales tax receipt proof that received a high bid of \$15 and sold for \$12.

Highest prices realized were by lots 86 (\$13), 81 (\$12), 80 (\$12—Ohio sales tax receipt specimen) and 48 (\$10—Minnesota \$100 deed tax block of four).

A complete prices realized will be published in the next SRN.

Publications Committee & Fund

The State Revenue Society will continue to grow indirect correlation with the amount of publicity the organization generates and the availability of publications that both newcomers and veterans can use.

For more than three decades the Hubbard State Revenue Catalog has remained the only comprehensive guide available to collectors. Some specialized catalogs, such as those produced by the SRS during the 1970s, Barry Porter's catalogs and the recent duck catalogs, have been produced but many are out of date and most use different numbering systems.

Catalogs Needed

For state revenue collecting to grow a standard numbering system must be established, catalogs have to be updated and new catalogs and handbooks must be produced.

One of our cover stories details the efforts of Michael Mahler, who is compiling a catalog of usages of 19th century revenue stamps. When completed, this is the type of publication that will spur interest in our field.

I have been in contact with a number of members that have indicated an interest in compiling a catalog or handbook. Because of the difficulty in obtaining information from state and other sources, the projects are in various stages of completion.

Several authors have made commitments for 1994 and one manuscript, a catalog of turkey stamps by John Crook, will be serialized in the SRN in the near future.

We need additional researchers and collectors to come forward. Most collectors don't collect every state, so our objective is to produce catalogs for each individual state and for different categories, such as cigarette, egg and honey stamps.

Publications Committee

To pull this all together, I've appointed a publications committee whose goal is to establish an acceptable numbering system, establish listing criteria and provide a format for SRS catalogs and handbooks. Initial members, besides the *SRN* editor, are Dick Bilek, Arlington Heights, Ill., our long-time printer and Harold Effner Jr., Lincroft, N.J., our vice president-treasurer. I invite anyone else interested in producing SRS publication to contact me as soon as possible.

To produce SRS publications, the SRN editor and printer have agreed to donate their services, being reimbursed for expenses only. This will save the society thousands of dollars as anyone familiar with producing publications can attest. Even so, to publish quality publications that will appeal to a wide audience is not inexpensive. Producing halftones, paper and printing, packaging, mailing and advertising requires more than is in the SRS treasury at the moment.

Publications Fund

To plan for producing publications beginning in 1994, I have established a publications fund. The fund, which will be listed as a separate line item by SRS Treasurer Harold Effner Jr., will consist of donations and grants received by the SRS. The fund will be self-perpetuating, meaning that profits from sales will replenish the fund for future publications. An initial goal of \$5,000 has been established.

The SRS, as an educational tax-exempt body, can receive donations and charitable contribution and donors can receive a tax deduction.

Members that would like to donate to the fund, either in money or in gifts, should send their contributions to the SRS Treasurer, Attention Publications Fund. SRS dues are due in December and amounts in excess of dues are a tax-deductible contribution.

SRS board member Tim McRee, Claremont, N.C., recently made the first fund donation. His stamp material will be listed in the next SRS auction and all proceeds will go into the publications fund.

Area Representatives

In other news, I have appointed Tony Crumbley, Newell, N.C., as the SRS Southeastern Region representative. Tony will cover Florida, Georgia, North and South Carolina and Virginia.

He is the third representative appointed. Bert Hubbard is the Southwestern representative and Peter Pierce is covering the Northeastern area. Anyone interested in supporting the society in another area should contact me today.



New Jersey Offers Obsolete Fish And Game Stamps

The 1987 trout fishing (resident and non-resident) stamps and the 1987 pheasant/ quail stamps are available for purchase from the New Jersey Division of Fish, Game and Wildlife, Expired Stamps, CN 400, Trenton, N.J. 08625. The stamps cost \$2 each, \$6 for a plate block of four and \$10 for panes of 10. The stamps will be available from the state until November 1. The SRS Sales Service has purchased a limited number of these stamps and is selling them to SRS members for \$1 each.

The 1992 resident and non-resident waterfowl stamps are available from the state until December 31. Stamps can be purchased as singles, plate blocks, sheets, books and panes at face value of \$2.50 or \$5. Since there is no discount for large orders, the SRS Sales Service does not plan to purchase these stamps.

Florida Amends Documentary Tax; Courts Rule Two Drug Taxes Unconstitutional

Various Florida documentary stamp tax rules were amended in February to reflect an increase (except in Dade County) in the realty conveyance tax to from 60-cents to 70-cents per \$100 of consideration paid and an increase in the stock certificates tax from 32-cents to 35-cents per \$100 of value.

Also in Florida, the Third District Florida Court of Appeal ruled that the Florida sales tax on illegal drugs was unconstitutional because it violated the taxpayers right against self-incrimination because compliance with the tax would have subjected those inherently suspected of criminal activities to a risk of self-incrimination.

Since the sales and use tax return contains identifying data and all information filed with the Department of Revenue is readily available to state and federal law enforcement authorities, the tax laws confidentiality provisions did not provide the functional equivalent of a guarantee against self -incrimination.

In another drug ruling, the Ninth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals determined that a Montana dangerous drug tax levied against taxpayers previously convicted of certain drug trafficking offenses violated the Double Jeopardy Clause of the U.S. Constitution, which prohibits multiple punishments for the same offense, because the tax was levied to punish the taxpayer a second time rather than to compensate the state for losses suffered as a result of a taxpayers' conduct. 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The New York Stock Tax Stamps

HE most interesting exponents of delight to the United States revenue stamp collectors, since the appearance and passing of the regular issues over a decade ago, have appeared in the shape of the New York State Stock Transfer Tax stamps. The multiplication of varieties both normal and abnormal since their first appearance in 1905 have created for themselves a favor not to be passed without comment. The feature of their comparatively easy acquisition lends to them, perhaps, as much magnetism as any other feature. The possibility of finds while the field is still in its infancy leads others to mark them closely. The beautiful engravings, well executed printing, fortunately and well chosen colors, and the general artistic temperament which they bear draws alike the eye of the novice and specialist. While the study of this class of stamps is one that leaves an opening for the most exacting minor variety fiend to enter, it is not my intention in this article at least, to dwell at any length upon any but straight varieties, giving the minor varieties but a "touch and go" mention, dwelling with them in more detail perhaps, at some future time should occasion warrant. My reasons for so doing will be apparent to the student either now or later, and to a pregnant purpose. There are but two designs of these stamps, covering four issues:

The first and second issues bear the same design, and the third and fourth issues bear the other.

The first issue is the only type appearing normally without a surcharge. The second is virtually identical with the first except that each stamp is surcharged with the value, in large numeral characters.

The third issue of the later design, bears surcharges similar to the second issue, but there must be noted a change in color. The fourth issue, also of the later design, has colors approximately as in the third issue, the chief differance lying in the application of the surcharge, which is in small characters, and in multiple.

The first issue is rouletted, all following being perforated. The first issue is un-watermarked, second issue watermarked "STATE OF NEW YORK STOCK TRANSFER TAX" Third and fourth issues watermarked with block characters resembling a Grecian Border Design.

EDITORIALS

The original dies of the 5c and 10c stamps of the United States issued in 1847, which were our first regular issue, were destroyed and about 1876 new dies were made for the Centennial, held that year. They differ from the originals very materially. Sometimes the stamps printed from them are called "government counterfeits," and its a good name for them too.

History tells us that in Peru at the time of the Conquest the Spaniards found a well established postal system in operation. The Indians had small buildings located about five miles apart and runners, in uniform, conveyed messages from station to station. It is said that messages sometimes covered one hundred and fifty miles in a day.

ENTRIES MUST BE MADE IN INK

Can the design of a license hamper a collector? A surprising intact example of one of the first Washington fishing permits indicates that this is the case with certain fishing permits from the state of Washington. The license, provided to me by Bill Smiley (Fig. 1), is in the condition that it would have been issued to the angler.

For the purposes of this article the term "permit" is used to refer to all three sections of these initial salmon issues as well as the 1988 issues, which were in two sections.

I suspect that the scarcity of these first issues, to a certain extent, can be attributed to the manner in which the three interconnected sections were separated one from another.

The upper portion, entitled "Fisherman Instructions," should have been the first section to be removed.

The Fisherman Instructions clearly admonishes the angler to keep the remaining two portions intact until he or she was finished fishing or the end of the year of issuance, whichever came first.

The remaining sections consisted of the "(Year) Sport Salmon Validation Stub" and "(Year) Sport Salmon Punch Card."

The Validation Stub served no other purpose than to provide a place to affix the Salmon stamps. Along with the Fisherman Instructions this section should have been detached before the bottom portion (Punch Card) was mailed. The flip side of the Punch Card doubled as a postcard, preaddressed to the Department of Fisheries.

Optimally, everyone would have followed the instructions, separating one section from another before the Salmon Punch Card was mailed. In actuality, many were not separated as intended.

In many cases however, the Sport Salmon Validation Stubs, to which the Salmon stamps were affixed, were unintentionally delivered to the state or detached and destroyed in the mailing process. Once in the state's possession, the Department abstracted the information they needed and then shredded them.


Again, one needs to remember that the intent was to have the angler take the time to **Continued on Page 8**

separate one section from another before mailing the bottom portion, the Salmon Punch Card, to Washington's Department of Fisheries.

This misunderstanding is a strong contributing factor to the scarcity of some issues through 1987.

By 1988 a design change (Fig. 2) moved the Salmon stamp to the upper left hand corner of what is referred to as a Sports Salmon Catch Record. So what? Well, the flip side of Fig. 2 (shown as Fig. 2a) is yet another postcard preaddressed to the Department of Fisheries. As previously stated, once in the hands of the Fisheries Department the stamps are gone!

1988 was also the year that the state reduced the quantity of different salmon stamps (by denomination) from four to two and the year that two new denominational issues for Sturgeon were introduced.

Interestingly, the Sturgeon issues were dispensed in a like manner to that of the Fig. 1 so that the Catch Record (Fig. 3) could, unlike the Salmon issues, be separated one section from another.

In the ensuing year the state made a

dramatic design change turning to an item made of a filament like material. The new "Recreational Licenses" (Fig. 4) could accommodate up to six different stamps. The reverse side of the Recreational License entitled "Sport Person Instructions" notes which stamps were required and in which combinations.

The Catch Record, which heretofore had been a part of one entire form, is now a separate, yet distinct, item.

In addition, we have a Sport Catch Records for Salmon (Fig. 5) and a separate, but like design, for Sturgeon (Fig. 6).

Of note is the fact that I've been able to obtain these issues in which the stamps (Salmon or Sturgeon) were affixed to the wrong form (i.e. the Catch Record shown in Figures 5 and 6)






Figure 7a. The back of the 1990 Washington Recreational License.

If large numbers of these stamps were being affixed to the Catch Record and these in turn were forwarded to the state, even fewer would have found their way into collectors hands. I can only assume that these "paper like issues" proved to be unsatisfactory since the next year, 1990, the state reverted to the previously used

recreational license design (Fig. 7). There are six blocks for each category of stamps in use at that time. The flip side is the 1990 Recreational License itself.

Whether this new form will hamper collecting remains open to investigation but, over the years it's clear that, intentionally or otherwise, Washington's varied designs helped make it difficult to find these issues in their true form, "on permit."
