A History of Bedding Stamps.

Bedding inspection is something we take for granted. We assume that when we go to buy a piece of furniture or a new mattress or even a pillow that it is a benign object, meant to bring comfort. The protections afforded by inspection have been around so long we tend to forget that they are still need. Sadly, two events recently have shown it is a good idea to keep them around.

An Oklahoma TV station recently went to a store that sold remanufactured bedding. In theory, the remanufacturer takes an old mattress, strips it down to the springs, sanitizes what is left, and then puts a new pad and cover on it. The reporters bought several of these mattresses, which cost about \$100, and opened them up. Inside was an old mattress, covered with stains (urine, blood, something worse?). Overall it was clear that nothing had been done but to slap a new cover over an old mattress. That shouldn't have been happening!

About the same time one of the prime time news shows did a similar piece in New York City. In this case they followed a truck that drove around town ahead of the trash trucks picking up old mattress's. This bedding was, by and large, so bad that a homeless person would think twice about sleeping on them. These filthy objects were taken to a remanufacturer who paid the man cash for them and did much the same thing as the remanufacturer in Oklahoma did. When the remanufactured mattress's in New York were opened up, the reporters and inspectors found live bed bugs, all manner of active bacteria, and one literally had pounds of dust fall out. They further investigated one case where a small child kept breaking out with skin rashes and when they opened up her "new mattress" they found a nasty old mattress you wouldn't have let your dog lay on.

Apparently back in the 1920's and during the depression years, similar practices were becoming self evident. People had enough of it. Departments of Health were being established in many of the states and bedding inspection was one of many public health issues they got charged with.

Two things came out of this. The first was the little "DO NOT REMOVE UNDER PENALTY OF THE LAW". tags that are found today on virtually every kind of bedding, seat cushion or pillow. These tags

and the laws behind them required the manufacturers explicitly state what was inside these articles. Failure to comply could result in the revocation of licenses needed to sell and manufacture bedding items. It was people selling the bedding that were not to remove the tags, however to this day the public has the misconception you cannot take the tag off, or to do so is a crime.

Most of laws went further and detailed out procedures for handling used bedding materials. Special red tags were supposed to be put on in most states and often it was illegal to sell used bedding at auction (thus eliminating a loophole).

Manufacturers had to obtain licenses and were subject to inspection. The licenses the manufacturers obtained required them to sanitize anything that was remanufactured. Many states had special provisions. Oklahoma's law stipulates that bedding from hospitals, or insane asylums or known to have been associated with contagious diseases could never be reused. Texas's statutes were very concerned with eliminating sweat shops and their associated unhealthy conditions.

Along with the tag, in many states, came the bedding stamps. These were proof that inspection had taken place. Most states required that their own stamp was on the article. The sale of the stamps was designed to offset the inspection costs. For collectors this brought into existence tags with multiple stamps. For example, in North Carolina many of the bedding manufacturers sold in South Carolina, Georgia and Virginia. Rather than have separate warehouses in each state where they got inspected and put on the tags, they would arrange to be inspected by all the local states and just put stamps from all of them on the tags. This two cent per state nuisance was a lot cheaper than having warehouses in each state.

The result is that there are some spectacular tags out there. Peter Martin has one with ten different stamps on it. These multiple stamps on a tag are highly sought after by bedding stamp collectors.

Rhode Island was a bit of an exception. They just wanted the stuff inspected, and they didn't care which state did it. As such inspection stamps from other states were valid in Rhode Island.

When the manufacturers got their licenses, they were often given a tax number. This number was then put on the stamps. Often the manufacturer had to pay to have this done himself. Surprising little research has been done correlating these numbers to manufacturers.

Exactly what constitutes bedding varies from state to state. Delaware for example defines "bedding" as "any mattress, mattress pad, mattress protector pad, box spring, upholstered spring, upholstered bed, davenport, upholstered sofa bed, quilted pad, comforter, bolster, cushion, pillow, featherbed, sleeping bag or any other bag, case or cover made of leather, textile or other material which is stuffed or filled in whole or in part with concealed material, which is intended for use by any human being for sleep or reclining purposes". One would think that would about cover it but in other states they included quilts and even clothing of a quilted or stuffed nature (such as a goose down coat).

Delaware goes on to specify what you can stuff something with: "excelsior, straw, hay, grass, cornhusks, moss, fiber, cotton, wool, hair, shoddy, jute, kapok or other soft material". Connecticut included baling twine in their list (scary to think about the reason for that). I thought moss was bad enough. Shoddy is a specialized term for "any material which has been spun into yarn or woven into fabric and subsequently cut up, torn up, broken up or ground up".

In later years the use of the stamps was dropped in favor of a registration system in most states. Manufacturers kept records on the number of units produced and paid the taxes quarterly. This was easier bookkeeping for the manufacturers and got rid of having to pay multiple states taxes on a single item. Louisiana, curiously, is the only state to have abandoned bedding inspection entirely (given the recent abuses they may want to reconsider).

Maryland was the first state to use the stamps, Hubbard listing them as dating back to 1923. As is often the case, research has not verified that date. Nineteen states and one city (Detroit, Michigan) used the stamps in addition to Pennsylvania. Today only Texas and Oklahoma are known to still be issuing stamps.

A Young Collectors First Encounter with a Bedding Stamp.

In the end it wasn't worth the risk and we hid it behind a piece of wooden trim in our closet. It is still hidden there, in our old house in Falls Church, Virginia.

Pennsylvania Bedding Stamp

Shown is a new bedding stamp variety that has surfaced. It is possibly the stamp that was used on my childhood bed. Unlike most of the listed Pennsylvania bedding stamps this one is small, the design measuring about 16 x 24 mm. Most of the listed Pennsylvania bedding stamps are 28 x 41 mm.

This stamp is printed in an olive green ink on a green paper. The registry number is no longer used and below the seal the "Department of Labor and Industry" is in two lines. "Harrisburg" has been dropped.

I think this variety was used in the early 1950's, probably around 1953.

Washington State Revenue Collection Goes on the Auction Block

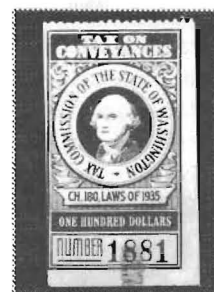

Eric Jackson, a well respected and preeminent dealer in revenues, offered what was listed as "The Bert Hubbard collection of Washington State Revenues" at auction in the October 1996 issue of the American Revenuer. The auction was unusual as many elusive, and yes, even rare Washington state revenues went under the auction hammer. There were a total of 127 lots, which for reporting purposes I've divided into several sub categories.

The first of these were the documentaries which consisted of 36 lots. Lot 78, an extremely rare \$100 issue (D7) pulled down \$135. I'm of the opinion that less than a half dozen copies of this elusive stamp exist. It was likewise unusual to see several "mint" documentaries offered for sale with the highlight coming from lots 109/110. These were listed as VF mint copies of the \$100 and \$500 respectively. The \$100 garnered a bid of \$155, with the \$500 being snapped up at a like bid price of \$155. Most interesting.

The wide ranging knowledge and expertise of the auctioneer was deftly reflected in the manner in which many of

the stamps were lotted for this sale. For example, lot 133, an extremely rare cigarette C33 fetched \$26. Two likewise elusive and seldom seen beer specimens, B2a and B10a, garnered a total of \$135. The author found few "disappointments" with respect to the price realizations. For example the scarce first apple issues A1-12 offered as lots 138 and 139 came in at \$37 as opposed to a catalog value of \$26.60. The recipient of this lot should have a very large smile for

netting this group at the price realized.

While the apple issue may have been lacking, the remaining lots of what I'd refer to as agricultural issues couldn't be considered to be anything other than a smashing success. Lots 147 thru 150 consisting of the first four values of the potato stamps, were all knocked down at a smart \$22 per lot. A rhubarb stamp (RH1) listed as having a "small scuff and thin"

still pushed up bids to over 800% of catalog with a sale price of \$41. Not to be underdone, the "partner" AAA issue of the Tomato and Cucumber stamp (TC1) was presented for sale in both mint as well as a used condition. The mint issue was picked up for \$57.50 while the used advertised as "w/tack holes and faults" brought a smart \$105. I mention this as "smart" in that the buyer was astute enough to realize that the used stamp is far, far more elusive than the mint counterpart. I might also mention this stamp always has a straight edge on at least

Bedding stamp laws

Colorado permitted stamp exemption after 1963 if an additional license fee was paid. Law is still on the books that stamps can be used. They are not being issued.

Delaware code did not require use of stamps after 1974. There was a major law revision in 1953. It is not known what this involved.

Indiana laws have no mention of stamp usage.

Louisiana terminated the entire inspection program in 1985.

Pennsylvania changed cost of stamps from

1 cent to 1.5 cents in 1953. Minimum quantity sold is 1000 at a time (1953 law). Pennsylvania laws appear to date from 1935, which is a conflict with Hubbard who shows stamps as early as 1925. Laws show that stamps can still be used though none are being issued.

Rhode Island still has laws on the books allowing stamp usage. They are not producing stamps. Their laws accept other states stamps as being valid.

Texas began allowing exemption to stamp usage in 1989. Stamps have minimum order quantity of 500. Charge per 500 cannot exceed \$15.00 (3 cents each).

Virginia's current laws do not call for stamp usage.

Ohio Bedding Stamps Have Misspelling

Ohio is unusual in that its bedding stamps had a spelling error that seems to have gone unnoticed for years. The figure shows the blue Ohio BE5A stamp with the word bedding spelled BEDDNIG. A light green BE4 stamp with a different design that has the correct spelling is shown below cropped from a tag. The spelling error is known on this BE4 stamp and also on the BE2 stamp which is rectangular in design.

Normally an error like this would occur when a printing plate was being made. A die would break, they would make a new one with the error on it, and in that way it would creep into a sheet of stamps. What is odd here is that these three stamps had different designs and shapes. Not only is the BE2 a different shape, but the two square designs have different wording in the ring of text containing the error. On says BEDDING STAMP while the other has the wording BEDDING & UPHOLSTERY.

My suspicion is that his was done

purposely, either as an engravers joke, or possibly as a security measure. What counterfeiter is going to notice some of the stamps are misspelled! I fear we will never know which was the case.

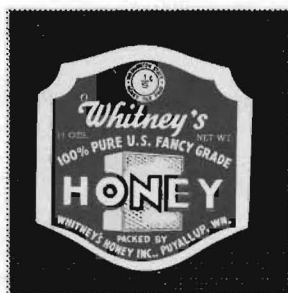


BEDDNIG Spelling

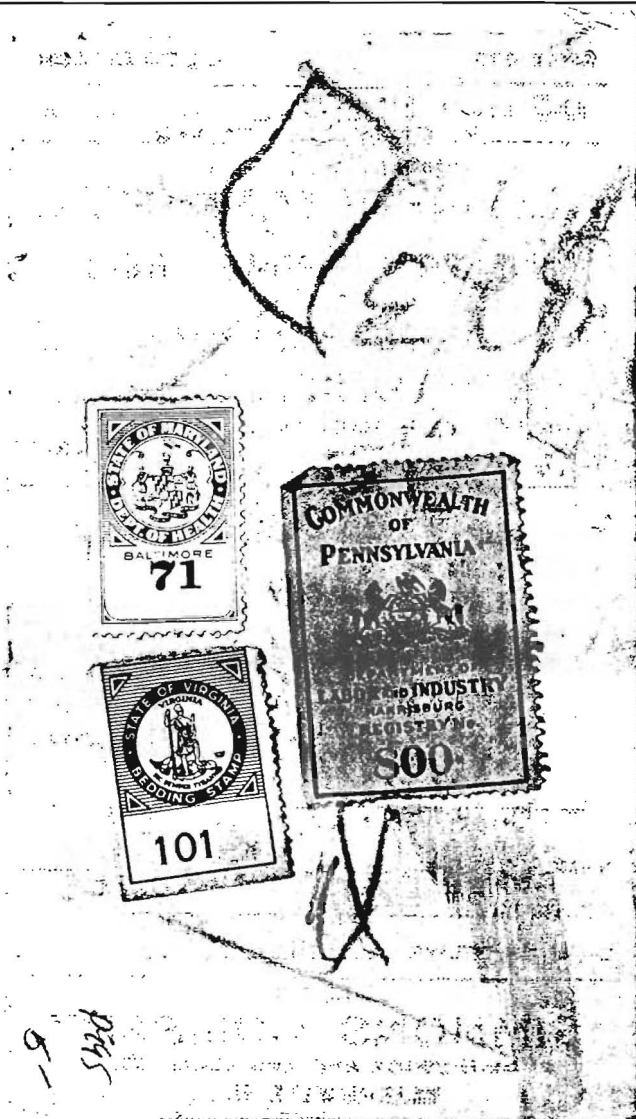

Featured Usage - Shown above is the front and back of a of a mattress tag with four different bedding stamps on it. The stamps are a New York BE4 on the front and on the back a Maryland BE8, a Virginia BE2, and a Pennsylvania BE9. As the Virginia stamp was not used until 1947 and the Pennsylvania stamp is thought to have only been used until 1953, it appears this tag was created in that time period. This allows us to date the Maryland BE8 into that time period, as it's usage date is not listed in the catalogs. Study of tags like this allow stamps with unknown histories to be dated. Interesting Overprints on Texas Bedding Stamps

Shown is a regular Texas 1939 style bedding stamp with two that have been found with interesting cancels. These stamps were used from 1939 until about 1971 and come in colors ranging from carmine to orange-red to vermilion to yellow. It is thought that the yellow versions were used in the later years.

The first one show is a carmine color, showing a normal registry number overprint of 1051. These numbers were assigned to the various manufacturers.



The second stamp is a vermilion copy with an OKLA overprint along with a registry number of 199. The Texas statutes do not require this special overprint for out of state manufacturers. As the registry numbers were often printed by the manufacturers, one wonders if the never ending rivalry between Texans and Oklahomans was being expressed in some new way.

The third stamp, in the orange-red color has a different variety of the OKLA overprint but this time with (Tenn.) added also. As Tennessee never used bedding stamps this is most curious.

Oklahoma and Texas Only States to Still Issue Bedding Stamps

To date 19 states and one city have issued bedding stamps in the United States. For various reasons (most revolving around administrative costs) only Oklahoma and Texas continue to issue bedding stamps. All the other states have gone to a reporting system.

Oklahoma and Texas have the reporting option and most of the larger manufacturers use the reporting system. A few smaller producers use the stamps and it was from one of these small firms that the SRS Sales Service was able to obtain a small quantity of the current stamps. Neither state will sell bedding stamps to

collectors. Manufacturers are required to obtain a permit and pay annual permit fees before they can purchase stamps.

The Oklahoma stamps are sold in sheets of 50 (10x5) with selvage at left. The sheets measure 9 x 4 1/2 inches with each stamp measuring 7/8 x 15/16 inches. The stamps are light green with a dry gum, rouletted 8 1/2 and serially numbered with the last two digits reflecting the number in the sheets (00-49 and 50-99). This could mean that the stamps are printed from a plate of 100 that is cut in half. The stamps illustrate the Great Seal of Oklahoma with the state name curved over the top. The wording "BEDDING STAMP" is at the top and "STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH" and the 5 cent denomination are at the bottom. The serial number is below the seal in black.

The Texas stamps are sold in sheets of

100 (10 x 10). The sheets measure 9 3/8 x 6 5/16 inches with no selvage. Stamps measure 15/16 x 5/8. The stamps are a pale orange or peach color with a dry gum and are rouletted 6. The stamps are serially numbered. The design shows the state seal beneath a black serial number. A banner at top includes the wording "TEXAS BEDDING STAMP", and a box at the bottom has the wording "TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH". No value is shown.

The Texas stamps reportedly were reprinted in 1996 while the Oklahoma stamp has been in service at least two years (1994). Since only small manufacturers use the stamps, items on tag should be scarce. The SRS Sales Service is believed to have the only mint stamps currently on the market.



Elberton Georgia Excise Stamps

Shown are two excise stamps from Elberton, Georgia, a five and twenty cent value. Initially I thought these were the beer stamps mentioned in a 1962 SRN article, however, Hubbard's County and Municipal

catalog indicates the beer stamps have the wording "Retail Beer Tax" instead of Excise Tax. Both decals have a yellow background with the printing in black. They are shown twice normal size. The twenty cent stamp has a white oval area surrounding the value, whereas the five cent has the oval blacked in.

The five cent stamp is on a white safety card which has a roulette perforation of 8.

The twenty cent value has no perforations. There are many small differences in the designs, notably that the square of dots on either side of the words "CITY OF" is made up of much smaller dots on the five cent value.

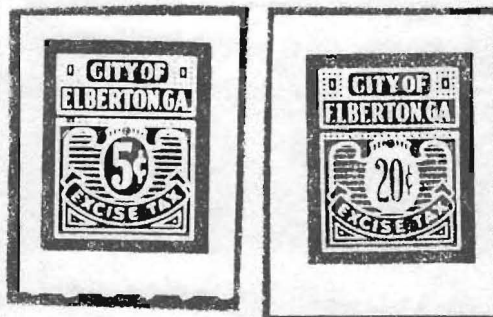

War shortages created Oklahoma Motor Vehicle stamp

Shown is a very scarce Oklahoma motor vehicle stamp which was found recently in a dealers box at a small show in Sedan Kansas. The stamp is printed in yellow, with the numbers and "AUTOMO-

"This certifies (1) that the motor vehicle number plates (if any) issued for this vehicle in 1942, have been reissued for 1943 and (2) the Oklahoma motor vehicle and license fees for 1943 on this vehicle have been paid."

The stamp has an imprint at the bottom showing it was printed by the Columbian Bank Note Company.

The stamp was issued because of a war time shortage of metal. To support the war effort the state of Oklahoma apparently decided to not issue

GUIDE TO NEW YORK CHAUFFEURS BADGES

Auction lot 26, Auction #7 Seldom Seen Arizona Egg Stamps

By Scott Troutman

This is to document just some of the eggs stamps in a lot in auction #7. Shown below is an unlisted egg stamp design which shows an egg with a large numeral 1 on it surrounded by the words Dozen Eggs. At the top is the wording, "INSPECTION FEE PAID" and at the bottom is the legend "STATE OF ARIZONA". The design on the stamp is 21x35 mm.

This design was first noted as existing in 1962¹. In that article they describe this design as "rouletted a little under 7, and perforated 12. We also have the same design in a coarse printing imperforate with side margins. We believe this to have been printed on 2 1/2 inch wide white gummed tape in rolls....a strip of three

of these shows the stamps to be 5/8 inches apart horizontally on the tape. These are all green, various shades".

Three of the stamps in this lot are a dark green in color, printed on a very soft, clothlike paper with a waxy feel to it. A fourth stamp is in a much lighter yellow green shade. One of the dark green stamps is split, that is, the space between the designs is in the middle with half the design on either side. The stamps are about 42x52mm in size—there is a lot of space between the designs. The top and bottom margins of these stamps are parallel and cleanly cut, indicating these were produced in a roll. The side margins on all four the examples are roughly cut. My guess is that it was done with a machine with a dull blade. The paper has a fibrous structure to it.

Two of the dark green stamps and the yellow green stamp are rouletted 10 horizontally across the stamps just above the word EGGS or right along

the bottom of the 1. These three stamps have no gum showing. The fourth stamp has gum, but no rouletting.

Yet another new variety is the same design in dark green on a buff or off white paper. The stamp has part of a blue cancellation of some sort on it. This stamp is rouletted 6 1/2 on the top and bottom, and is rouletted 7 on the left side. The design on this stamp is slightly smaller at 21x32mm and a heavier frame line has been added. The stamp appears to have been gummed.

This lot also includes four of the 1941 E4 brown one dozen stamps. Each is in a distinctly different shade of brown. Two are what I would term red-brown in color.

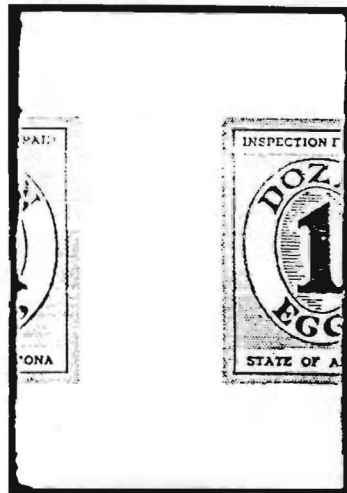

Great SRS Auction Material Brings Out the Bidders

By Scott Troutman

SRS Auction #6 featured some the best material we have seen to date. The 368 lots sent in by 13 consigners brought out a record number of bids with 60 different members placing bids. And 54 of you won something. This meant that almost 30 percent of our members participated. That's outstanding.

Winning bids totaled \$1,525.50 and this would have been higher if two bid sheets had come in on time.

The auction was mailed out labor day weekend from the Chicago area, and while several people in the NY-NJ area reported not getting them until around September 20th, everybody should have had time to get the bids in. The first bids I got in came from Oregon and Washington, DC.

The two most heavily bid lots were 124 (MI 1968 fishing) and lot 363 (Albert hunting

& fishing), both with 13 bids. Lot 205, the NY free hunting stamp had 12 bids.

Lot 15, the Arkansas honeys had 11 bids as did lot 364, the Manitoba fishing enhancement. There was intense interest in all the honey stamps, the tomato prorations, and the North Dakota fur bearing stamps.

Top dollar value was for lot 30, the key tomato proration with a \$37 realization. Lot 15, the Arkansas honey brought \$12 on a five dollar estimate, Lot 363 the Alberta set brought \$10.25, and lot 201 the hunting badge brought \$13.

The Chataqua ticket (lot 336) realized \$26 and several people recognized that lot 353 was an outstanding example of an extremely rare cigar stamp forcing it to \$31.

The following areas were "hot" in this auction: fishing and hunting stamps, honey, eggs, tomato prorations, Missouri, Texas,

Wisconsin beer and wine, and on document usages on most anything.

"Weak" areas were, Washington apples and documentaries, Illinois beer, and Arizona luxury tax, though there were sound buys in all these areas.

There was an error in the auction in that the Montana egg stamps were marked as Minnesota. Apparently everybody figured out I can't type by the picture.

Note-a "t" in the auction results indicates a tie bid. Their were 26 tie bids. 213 lots were won at one increment over over the next highest bidder, or in other words on over half the lots I had bidders willing to go higher.

I already have good material coming in for the next auction.

Texas 1996 Wildlife....Stamps?

In 1996 Texas went to a computerized license system in which sportsmen no longer need to purchase any license stamps. But the state still prints and sells "Collector's (sic) Edition" stamps. There are eight different stamps, apparently issued in sheets of eight including 1) waterfowl stamp, 2) saltwater stamp (for fishing, perhaps), 3) turkey stamp, 4) nongame stamp, 5) white winged

dove stamp, 6) freshwater trout stamp, 7) muzzleloader hunting stamp, and 8) archery stamp. Each stamp bears a face value of \$3, but they can not be purchased individually. Each stamp is also labeled "Collector's Edition" at the top. A set of eight costs less than face - \$20. And if you order 10 or more sets, they cost only \$10 per set, just \$1.25 per stamp! These are more in the category of charity labels than hunting and fishing stamps. They can be ordered from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas
