

New Catalog Available

Sam Houston Duck Company has released their 1998 Specialized Duck Stamp Catalog. The catalog contains listings for all federal, state and foreign duck stamps and uses Scott numbers on the state and federal ducks. State ducks have only values for mint stamps. It does include prices for governors editions of state ducks, first day covers of federal ducks and federal souvenir cards. It also gives estimates for duck prints, both state and federal.

Three areas are covered in this catalog that are not commonly found in other catalogs. The first is Indian Rservation stamps. Those listed are ones which Sam Houston has in stock but it a sizable portion of what has been issued. There is a section on state fishing stamps - again this is more of a price list. And third there is a section called "Convservation Stamps" which includes many state hunting and habitat issues as well as many society stamps, such as National Aubdubon, National Wild Turkey, and North American Game Bird. While this is again a price list for mint stamps, it is surprising complete in the society area.

Seafood Stamps

A Survey of What Exists and Research on What Should Exist by Scott Troutman


Seldom do you come across a category of stamps of any kind which has had over 160 stamps and tags issued and virtually nothing has been written about them, except a couple of short notes that the stamps exist. But that appears to be the case with regard to seafood stamps. By seafood I am referring to stamps taxing items such as shrimp, crawfish, oysters, scallops, crabs and clams and in this article I am going to include terrapin and shad, as they get little press.

Five states have issued seafood stamps of one kind or another; South Carolina, Georgia, Virginia, Florida and Washington. Of these South Carolina and Georgia produced the bulk of the stamps. Those used in Florida and Washington fall more under the license category, in that they were used on permits which allowed you to harvest seafood - crawfish in Florida's case and clams in Washington.

South Carolina

South Carolina got into the business of seafood stamps and tags when it set up its Department of Fisheries in 1906. At that time the state took the stance that all seafood was owned by the state. A person could stake a claim to an oyster bed of up to 500 acres and the state established ways to enforce your claim. The new Fisheries department had an interest in helping people propagate oysters and clams. But the oysters and other seafood was the states natural resource. The stamps and tags, then had the sole point of paying for the Department of Fisheries. In reading the laws this was quite a surprise as it was long assumed this was an inspection fec. But the truth is - it was a use tax.

All of the South Carolina stamps and tags have the same basic stamp design: the left panel describes penalties for counterfeiting, the center panel describes what the stamps are for and the right panel describes how the stamps are to be cancelled. This same wording is on both stamps and tags (which were used interchangeably). The center section also contains an overprinted value, typically in red, and a serial number also in red. Various colors of paper were used.

This paid the tax on two dozen five ounce cans of oysters.

The stamps or tags were to have had the date they were used written across the face of them in ink. Few that I have personally seen have that.

According to Gary Turner of the South Carolina Department of Revenue, the tax codes were repealed in 1959, ending all stamp and tag usage. In preparing this article I have looked at the laws from 1906, 1921, 1924, 1925, 1929 and 1952. I am sure there are other tax rate changes. I hope some one in South Carolina will try to ferret out more. The big discovery is that many, many more tags or stamps should exist than have been cataloged.

An interesting sidenote is that sturgeon and their by-product caviar are mentioned all through these laws. While not taxed, a caviar industry did exist at least through the 1920's. I do not know if sturgeon even exist in South Carolina today.

Oysters

Of all the seafood stamps, the South Carolina oyster stamps dominate with over 93 stamps listed in the Hubbard catalog and at least 4 tags.

In 1906 a law was past setting up the Department of Fisheries. The tax that was prescribed on oysters was one cent on each 60 ounces of canned oysters and two cents on each gallon of raw shucked oysters. The first stamps were two imperforate yellow orange stamps with the signature of then F is her ies

Commissioner Rhett. Both are listed by Hubbard as extremely rare. These large stamps had 12 mills and 16 denominations. The 16 mill stamp was for 96 ounces of oysters, the 12 mill presumably was for 72 ounces. The stamps indicate they were to support a law of February 23, 1906, but the law


actually went into effect on May 1, 1906.

Hubbard also lists a 1920 set and a 1922 set, again both being extremely rare. These had a Durant signature and appear to be based on the 1906 law. In 1921 there was a tax law change which kept the tax on canned oysters at one cent per 60 ounces, but made the shucked oyster tax three cents per gallon.

The next undated set has Thomas Cravens signature. These are listed in Hubbard as being from 1923, which is unlikely as the tax listed on the stamps themselves indicates they support the law of April 2, 1924. This law increased the tax on canned oysters to two cents per sixty ounces.

In 1925 there was another law change effective April 14, 1925. The tax in this law remained at two cents per 60 ounces of canned oysters saw a big jump up to five cents per gallon on shucked oysters.

Beginning in 1926, a set of stamps was issued each year through 1945. My suspicion is they were issued each year up until 1958. On each stamp or tag the year is denoted following either a C or a BB. It is purely a guess but C may stand for canned and BB may be for bushel basket.



It appears to me there may have been more changes in tax rates over the years, however the 1924 rates remained in effect until at least 1941 on canned oysters, and the 1929 rates were good at least until 1939 on shucked oysters.

The following information is from the 1952 code of South Carolina section 28 subsections 954-958. "All containers used in shipping raw shucked oysters must have affixed to them in a manner to be prescribed by the State Board of Fisheries

cancelled tax stamps to the amount of five cents for each gallon of raw shucked oysters contained therein, under penalty of punishment as herein provided. But no stamp tax shall be required of local shuckers on raw shucked oysters sold to local consumers in less than gallon quantities.

"Each package containing oysters or clams shall contain a bushel or even multiple thereof and before being tendered for transportation or offered for sale shall be stamped or tagged with the quantity and kind of shellfish contained therein and the correct amount of tax stamps affixed and cancelled and wherever any package shall contain less than one bushel the tax upon one bushel shall be nevertheless paid as aforesaid.

It shall be unlawful for any person to transport any of the fish or fisheries products required by law to have the tax paid stamps affixed thereto unless such requirement shall have been complied with. Any person transporting any of the products in violation of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine of not less than five hundred nor more than one thousand dollars or imprisonment of not less than six months nor more than twelve months.


The several county treasurers shall sell fisheries tax stamps and tags, receive and collect all licenses and rents for leased bottoms.... For such service the county treasurer shall receive five per cent of the amount of such sales and collections..."

In addition fish inspectors could draw out \$50 worth of stamps or tags at a time, and pay for them later as they collected the fees.


Tags as late as 1958 (10 cent for 1 bushel of raw oysters in shell, Scabrook signature) have been reported.

Shrimp

Hubbard lists the first shrimp stamps as appearing in 1923 with a Craven signature. However the first law making mention of shrimp taxation that I have found was the 1924 law effective March 21 of that year. Cooked shrimp were taxed at the rate of one cent per four pounds while green shrimp (which I take to be uncooked) were taxed at 1/8 cent per pound. There was another major law

revision in 1925, but the shrimp rates remained the same.


Hubbard indicates stamp usage ended in 1931, however in this article a 1955 stamp is illustrated with an Alonzo B. Seabrook signature. Green shrimp tags with a Witsell or Graham signatures are known as late as 1940, and a 1950 2 cent for 16 pounds of shrimp is known with a Dupree signature. These tags are usually bright red.

Crabmeat and Crabs

Twenty one different stamps are listed in Hubbard as existing from 1934 through 1941. There should be more. The 1924 law placed a tax on soft shell crabs at two cents per dozen and ten cents per dozen on hard shell crabs. Crabmeat came in


with the 1925 law, taxed at two cents per gallon. Tags for both hard shell (Raney signature 1926) and softshell crabs (Witsell signature 1939) are known. Wording on crab tags indicates the tax dates back to March 21, 1924.

Hubbard may be correct, that the tax was repealed after 1941.


Clams

Only one set of three stamps is reported from 1938. Clam tags are known as early as 1932 and late as 1959. My guess is that these stamps are much rarer than anyone has suspected.

The clam tax started back in 1906 at ten cents on a bushel of clams. In 1921



the tax was raised to 20 cents a bushel and held at that rate in the 1924 law. The 1925 law dropped it back to 10 cents a bushel and in 1937 the rate was changed to tax canned clams at two cents per 60 ounces. Only one series of stamps on canned clams from 1938 has ever been reported. My guess is that the taxes with their tags existed from 1906 through to 1959. Clamming is not a big thing in South Carolina, and the lack of a clam industry may have made usage of these stamps and tags very small.

Terrapin

Terrapin, edible turtles that live in fresh or brackish water and are often called cooters, appears to have been a bigger industry than clams in South Carolina. The 1906 law covered terrapin and taxed each at 5 cents. Only terrapins over 5 inches could be legally taken.

Again, these stamps and tags

appear to be much rarer than indicated in Hubbard's catalog. Hubbard lists the terrapin stamp as being from 1912-1916, while on the stamp it correctly lists February 23, 1906 as the date of the law. A rarity is known in that the date on one stamp on the sheet is 1096 by mistake.

The terrapin tax remained at 10 cents until 1925 when it was raised to 20 cents. In 1929 the rate went back to 10 cents, Terrapin tags are known from 1934. These reference the 1929 law (Act No. 147). There was no mention in the 1952 law.

To take terrapin, a \$25 terrapin

(fishing?) license had to be obtained (this beginning with the 1906 law). The season on terrapin varied but usually ran from March until June.

White or Hickory Shad

Shad are small boney fish which are caught using specially made dip nets. Shad spawn in fresh water streams much like salmon. Shad taxation got started with the 1906 law which put a 3 1/2 cent tax each on them (which seems high if you have ever eaten a shad). The tax had a curious loophole in that if you caught it more that 40 miles inland from the mouth of the river, there was no tax. Shad

season was January 15 through March 25, unless you were inland where it ran on until April 20th. The tax was repealed in the 1921 law.

While unlisted in catalogs, the state issued tags for these under the April 24, 1925 law. This law spelled out two types of shad, white shad which was taxed at 8 cents each, and hickory shad which was to be taxed at two cents each. I have seen examples of a white shad tag from 1942 with Witsell signature and hickory shad tags (two different sizes) from 1939 with a Graham signature. Hubbard also lists the existence of a shad tag with a Raney signature (1926-1931).

Georgia

Georgia laws imposed a tax for the inspection of seafood, which included oysters, shrimp, clams and crabs. Indeed, under the current laws which have been in place since 1938, it appears they could still be used at the discretion of the commissioner of Agriculture. Two sections of the current law cover the shellfish inspection program.

45-919-27-4-197 of the Georgia code covers the shellfish sanitation program. Part b states "....It shall be unlawful to fail to attach to each such container a tag obtained from the department (Georgia Fish & Game). The tag shall indicate the place the oysters or clams were gathered, the name and address of the consignee, the kind of shell stock in the container, the name of the shipper and the Department of Agriculture certificate waivers.


Section 42-1109-10 gives the Game Commissioner of Agriculture power to provide for inspection of fish and seafood and to collect license fees to pay for the inspection by Acts of 1937-38 Extra Session, pp. 332-387).

Oysters


At least forty three different stamps have been issued to cover oyster inspection in Georgia. These began as early as 1925 and continued until at least 1945. These covered either raw shucked oysters or oysters in the shell.




1934 SC Terrapin tag. Tan paper with red overprint Courtesy M.E. Matesen




1933 Raw Shucked Oysters red on buff, Hubbard OY37 Courtesy John Funkhouser.




1930 White Shag tag, white paper with black lettering, serial number in red. Courtesy John Funkhouser.




1942 White Shad with wrong value. Did rate change or is this an error? White card with black lettering. Courtesy M.E. Matesen.

In 1945 the tax was equal for 1 gallon of shucked oysters or 2 bushels of unshucked. Indications are that the usage continued well past 1945. Hubbard indicates that seafood stamps were discontinued in 1953. but that has not been confirmed.

Crab

Only one stamp is listed as issued for blue point crab meat in 1944. It paid 1.25 cent tax for 10 pounds of crabmeat. These were rouletted vertically on a heavy card stock.

Shrimp

The initial shrimp stamp was also issued in 1944 and with a 10.43 cent value. It also was on rouletted card stock and showed a red shrimp. A second similar stamp appeared later with the same value and an orange shrimp and black type. While Hubbard lists the first stamp as fairly common, indications are the orange shrimp is a tough find.

Seafood

Hubbard's 1972 catalog indicates the existence of three seafood stamps. I think this is an erroneous listing for three more oyster stamps. They have the same values as the 1936 stamps with typographic

differences. Even Hubbard gave them 1936 Georgia Oyster Black on white catalog numbers consistent with varieties of the 1936 stamps.



VIRGINIA Scallops

Only one set of three stamps in 1, 4 and 10 gallon varieties is known. These were issued in 1931 by the Bureau of Shellfish Sanitation as an inspection tax. Hubbard indicates these were discontinued in 1933. All of these stamps are quite scarce. Hubbard notes that tags were also used and these are equally tough to come

FLORIDA

Crawfish

In 1989 the state began issuing special crawfish stamps for fisherman who wanted to take them. The first stamp was hastily produced and showed the state of Florida with the word CRAWFISH overprinted across the stamp (this was done because the legislature had not set the value). The Snook stamps were done the same way. These first stamps showed no value on the stamps - it was \$2. In years since the stamps have depictions of the crawfish and the \$2 value. These stamps have been made available through the SRS Sales Division. They are still being produced and are the most attractive of the seafood stamps.

WASHINGTON

Clams

Washington's clamming stamps came about in 1992 as a license fee to harvest clams. The stamp was put on a fishing license and permitted the digger to harvest a limit of up to 15 clams. The fee was \$2 for residents and \$10 for non-residents.




1992 Point Elliot Treaty Area Shellfish Stamp.

This was an attempt to recoup some of the \$200,000 a year Washington was spending a year for clam research and harvesting enforcement.

INDIAN RESERVATION

Two Indian Reservation stamps are known, both from the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission. These are produced by the Squamish Tribe. The first is a 1992 stamp for use in Area 2 of the Point Elliott treaty area. This stamp is identical to fishing stamps for the Point Elliott area. Sadly I cannot tell you what the color is. A second stamp for 1993 was produced with just the word shell and the year. These were used on tribal fishing licenses, which are used year after year. Bob Dumaine has indicated that only 200 of each stamp were produced and no mint stamps are known. With estimates of \$300 in a recent auction, these are probably the most pricey of the shellfish stamps.

Iowa Firewood Stamp by Harold Effner Jr.

Shown is one of the strangest stamps I have ever come across. At least I think it's a stamp. Put out by the Iowa State Conservation Commission's Division of Lands and Waters, it is a ten cent receipt for a bundle of firewood. It is perforated 12 on the left hand side as though it is a stub, but it appears to have had gum on the back.

My guess is that this firewood was sold at a state park or natural area and the stamp might have been stuck on a permit

of some kind which allowed you to pick up your wood. But I don't know. I also have no idea how old it is. If you have any information on this stamp, particularly how and when it was used, send it to the editor.



Maryland Hunting Stamps

by J.R. Wooten

From its inception in 1960 through the 1997-98 season, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources has through its stamp program issued 117 face different stamps required for the harvesting of big game. This figure includes the five stamps issued from 1975 through 1979 for hunting on public lands. The big game hunting stamps for archers and for firearms are discussed in detail in Vanderford's *Handbook of State Fish and Game Stamps*. Deer and turkey stamps for the 1968-69 through 1979-80 seasons are pictured in Crook's "State Turkey Stamps", *State Revenue Newsletter*, Vol. 32, No. 5, Sept-Oct. 1994, with the following additions. Beginning with the 1972-73 season and continuing for an additional fifteen seasons, stamps were issued at a reduced cost for senior resident hunters (65 and older). Figures 1, 2 and 3 show such stamps for the 1975-76, 1977-78, and 1978-79 seasons respectively. Note that these consist of a printed text only with slight changes in design and wording.

From 1980-81 through the 1982-83 seasons, two stamps continued to be issued each year and were now called "Deer Stamps". For these three seasons, the adult stamps pictured a deer head and the senior resident stamps continued to consist only of a printed text. The 1980-81 issues were somewhat smaller than the stamps from the two following years, and were issued with two tags attached. Stamps for the 1981-82 and 1982-83 seasons were issued with three tags attached. The 1982-83 stamps without their tags are pictured in figures 4 and 5. Descriptions are as follows.

\$5.50 deer stamp - black & red on orange
\$1.00 senior res. deer stamp - black & red on light green
\$5.50 deer stamp - black & red on yellow
\$1.00 senior res. deer stamp - black & red on blue






The number of stamps for the 1983-84 season expanded to seven, one being an overprint. Individual stamps were now issued for firearms, bow & arrow, and black powder hunting (figure 6). Again, only the three adult stamps were pictorials, showing a deer head. Each stamp was issued with one tag. An additional stamp was created when the Dept. of Natural Resources, anticipating a need for additional adult bow & arrow stamps, overprinted the senior resident deer stamp with a \$1.25 overprint (figure 7). These seven stamps are described as follows:

From the 1984-85 through the 1987-88 season, six deer stamps were issued for each season. Several changes are evident. First of all, all stamps were reduced in size from the previous years. Also, only the bow and arrow hunting stamps, both adult and resident senior, show any kind of design. These two stamps for each of the four seasons show a silhouette of antlers and an arrow (figure 8). The other four stamps for each year have only a printed text (figure 9). The following table describes these stamps:



The 1988-1989 season saw the end of senior resident stamps but the addition of a new second deer stamp. The antlers and arrow silhouette now appear on the deer stamp (bow and arrow) and the new second deer stamp. Stamp size remains the same as in the four previous years. This format was followed for two years as shown below:

\$3.50 deer stamp (bow & arrow) - black on light yellow
\$3.50 deer stamp (black powder) - black on white
\$10.50 second deer (bow/black powder) - black on green
\$9.50 deer stamp - black on red

Beginning with the 1990-91 season and continuing until the present, all stamps consist only of a printed text. Again, for that season four stamps were issued but in a different format (figures 10, 11, and 12). Their descriptions follow:






Beginning with the 1994-95 issues, stamps and agent stubs are self-sticking and found on a stiff backing paper. Stamps and stubs are not attached.

For several years it has proven difficult to acquire copies of Maryland hunting stamps. No provision is made for sale to collectors; it is necessary to purchase a \$35 3-day non-resident hunting license in order to secure the stamps.

Collectors of Maryland trout stamps may purchase stamps for the 1995, 1996 and 1997 seasons at \$5.00 per stamp from

the following address:

Maryland Dept of Natural Resources Licensing and Registration Services PO Box 1869

Annapolis, MD 21404-1869.

Also for sale is a 1997 bear stamp at a cost of \$5.00. This stamp is a pictorial through not particularly well executed. It should be considered a conservation issue as there has been no open season in Maryland for several years.

It has been reported that after the 1997-98 season the Maryland Dept. of

Natural Resources will no longer require the purchase of stamps, but will be using an automated permit processing system. If this information is correct, several long and colorful series of fish and game stamps will have come to an end.

Baltimore County Tobacco Stamps

A set of tobacco stamps new to me surfaced recently in a lot of stamps sent in to SRS Auction #11. All have the same design shown. Tobacco stamps from Baltimore City have long been known. These were issued from 1946 until 1957. The Baltimore City stamps feature a statue on a pillar that is the seal of the city.

These new stamps however have the wording "BALTIMORE COUNTY" and feature what appears to be the top of the old courthouse at Towson, Md. On a recently trip to Towson, I was able to find nothing in the Baltimore County code to indicate when these stamps were produced. The three values I have seen are as follows:

3 ct brown

4 ct pink-lilac

5 ct pale purple

All are hyphen hole roulette 5 1/2. I cannot tell with certainty but a least one appears to have been used.

Colorado Revenues Pay for Disease Testing

by Frank Bocovich and Kenneth Pruess

It all started with a \$6 lab fee stamp from Colorado State revenue collector Scott Leslie; he gave me his last one (he is in the water consulting business). Tracking this down led me to the Colorado Public Health and Environmental Department and how people pay for biological testing for diseases. The \$6 was the tip of what's been floating around.

Note that the Sexual Diseases has two different printings of the \$5.50 stamp and Premarital Blood tests has two different printings of the \$7.50 stamp. The fee for Strep testing is currently \$1, but has been \$2, \$3, \$4 or \$5 in the past. \$1.00 for Strep testing says that there is a large surplus in the Colorado General Fund; that is the criteria for the low fee.

All of these stamps are 25 mm square, rouletted, on glossy white paper with the following colors of printing:

\$1 black

\$2 brown rose

\$3 light green

\$5 bright blue

\$5.50 red

\$6 pale blue

\$7 turquoise green

\$7.50 blue-green

\$7.75 dark pink

\$8 grey blue

\$9 lavender

\$9.25 grey black

\$10 grey

\$11 lavender pink

\$12 purple

\$13 emerald green

\$15 light blue

\$27.75 bright rose

\$31 rose pink.

They are printed by Miller Press in the Denver area in sheets of 100 (10 x 10).

Our understand at this time is that they have been taken off sale. They do not intend to reorder.

Perhaps your own state is currently doing business somewhere with stamps that you didn't know about. This has been going on for 15 years in Colorado and only recently discovered.

Tests for which stamps have been used, fees, and reported dates for fee changes are summarized below.

Water Bacteria: \$6 (1983), \$9 (1993), \$11 (July 1994), \$13 (July 1995)

HIV Combined Tests: \$15 (1983)

HIV EIA: \$5 (1994)




COLORADO HEALTH DEPARTMENT LAB FEE- TESTS FOR DISEASES



INFECTIOUS DISEASES - STREP









SRS Auction #10 is a Doozy

SRS Auction #10 featured a collection of 60 year old beers and liquors, and another collection of Georgia material along with interesting material in almost every catalog. The Georgia, Missouri, and Texas material were outright battlegrounds between state and topical collectors, and the beers and liquors did good across the board. Hunting and fishing bidders picked up some bargains.

Lot 298, the key Texas beer had the

highest bid at \$85. Lot 3, an Arkansas beer with a candy company cancel came it at almost 3 times estimate and lot 360, an interesting liquor strip, came in a \$6 or a \$2.50 estimate. Lot 66, an XF Georgia beer had the most interest with 10 bidders. The unlisted Pa. liquor strip, lot 245 had nine bidders take a crack at it.

Other highly contested lots included lot 67 the Georgia bedding, lot 71 the Georgia seafood, lot 262 a SC beer & wine and lot 313 a WA elk stamp. Better beer, liquor, bedding, fruit and seafood lots

averaged 5 to 6 bidders. There were 43 bidders overall with 36 winning something.

Florida Egg Stamps - Older Than Previously Thought?

by Scott Troutman

Shown are some egg stamps which are in auction #11. In trying to catalog them for the auction, I originally thought they were the 1942-45 stamps which are not illustrated in the Hubbard Catalog but are described as follows: "1 doz. stamps. Typeset with double lined border, hyphen hole perforated 6 1/2, 50 x 70 mm. Now have solid letters in title". The 1946 stamps, also not illustrated has the notation "Signature added in type, rouletted 9 1/2 in color". Rouletting in color means that there were colored dashes to guide the rouletting.

The stamp shown in figure 1 (lot 34) is rouletted 6 1/2, it is 50 x 70, it is orange in color, has a double line border and the signature is not in type so it should be one of the following.

E29 1 doz

E30 1 doz red (A-F)


The A-Frefers to a serial number. The picture in the catalog of an earlier series of stamps shows the letter after the serial number. Lot 33 I took to be an E30. However, the "Ser. D" is in the upper right corner.

There is however a big problem here. The stamp in figure 1 is used, with a date stamp of 4-29. Thats 1929!! It also has another interesting feature and that is the word "Special" printed in the upper right hand corner. This is where "Ser. D" is on lot 33. This is not listed anywhere. Lot 35, a blue one dozen shipped eggs, also

came in with this consignment, but it has nothing up in the upper right hand corner.

The signature on all three stamps is the same and is a stumper. It appears on any number of Florida stamps, including the 1931 egg stamps. Where ever it appears in the catalog, Hubbard did not say who it was for. That's because he couldn't read it and neither can I. Nashaulberg? It seems to be on stamps from about 1925 to the early 1930's. If anyone in Florida can find out who the Commissioner of Agriculture was during that time period, it may help to solve this mystery.

For now I am willing to say these three stamps are from an earlier 1929 egg series. I would like to see copies of stamps in the readers possession of a similar design to see if there are different signatures and other upper right corner markings. Send them to the editor and try not to crease any copies you make (cut them out if you need to).

following is roughly my method. First, I pick some items from every consignor. Next I try to get examples from long runs (apple stamps for example in Auction #10). Next I try to show items with flaws or exceptional centering where the picture will affect the bidding. And lastly, the stamp must show decently. Stamps on colored paper copy as black. Yellow stamps copy as white. Many duck stamps reproduce poorly. I can never show you how beautiful the dark blue Missouri beers are.

Some people have asked how come we don't send the stamps with the invoice? Two reasons. The most important is that they are not our stamps. Unlike big auction houses we don't have the money to cover a big loss if we send out the stamps and the person doesn't pay. The second reason is that I try to get the invoices out quickly, so I can get the money in and pay off the consignors. It takes quite a while to package up 30+ winning bidders material, and I can do that while the money is coming in.

I have just frozen auction #11. That leaves only one more auction this year. If you have material to consign try to get it to me by August 1.

Hubbard Catalogs

Harold Effner tells me our supply of Hubbard catalogs (the Bible in most state stamps) is getting low. We understand from the people who now have the rights to the catalog that more will be produced. If we run out, understand that this is a situation beyond our control.

Library

Several of you have sent requests for library material to the editor recently. You are wasting time. Peter Martin has the library, so please send requests directly to him (address on inside front cover).



SRS Sales Philosophy

Why does the SRS purchase these stamps? The following rules of thumb apply:

- --There is a discount for a large order which can be passed on to the SRS members.

The Commission dropped one value and added four new ones. This issue is also perforated 12 1/2 and is the same size as the 1939 issue. However, three of the new values were printed on colored paper. Colors are as follows:

1 cent	red
1 1/2 cents	black on yellow
2 cents	violet
3 cents	black on gold
5 cents	blue
10 cents	orange
25 cents	black
50 cents	green
1 dollar	purple
5 dollars	red on green

Two different shades of paper exist for the 5 dollar stamp.

drastically altered the Apple Act. Compliance of growers was now optional. Those who chose not to participate could apply for a refund for all apple stamps used during a given season. Also, growers now had the option of filing a return instead of using stamps.

Ten years later, the Michigan Apple Commission officially changed its name to the Michigan Apple Committee. At approximately the same time—1965—the third set of apple advertising stamps appeared. These are smaller and horizontal informat with an apple next to a small map of Michigan. See figure 16 for an example. The colors of the issue are: 2 cents violet, 3 cents yellow, 4 cents black on blue, 10 cents orange, 25 cents black, 50 cents green, and 1 dollar purple.

Most of the values have the value printed perpendicular to the rest of the design. The 3-cent stamp has the value printed as a large numeral parallel with the design. The dollar stamp exists in both formats. Also, the 2-cent and 4-cent stamps are perforated 12 1/2 while the other values are perforated 12. Other varieties exist as well. (See related articles by John Funkhouser and myself, respectively, in the first quarter issue.)



Shown, possibly not to well, are a pair of the 1/10 pint Maryland liquor stamps used on a small green bottle of Calvert Daiquiri Mix. These stamps, with the Louis Goldstein signature, appear to be Hubbard No. L68. They are purple in color. This 1/10 value is seldom seen used, as splits or miniatures used the 1/16 gallon value.

The daiquiri mix however, uses Hawaiin Leilani rum and is an odd two ounce size. Each stamp apparently covers one ounce of liquor. This style of liquor stamp was used, with varying signatures, from 1943 until about 1978.

At that point they went metric.


The bottle also has a Series III red liquor strip for "Less than a 1/2 pint".
