State Revenue News Page 3 / 3rd Quarter 2001 Flyspecking the Mississippi Mineral Documentaries of 1946

The mineral documentary stamps of Mississippi issued in 1946 are a wonderland of plate flaws for those with the time and chance to go through them. In the Hubbard catalog Volume 2, Elbert Hubbard documented some of the ones he had found, and in other cases he just noted that many varieties exist. On the \$1 stamp for example he just noted "6 types of constant flaws" without saying what they were. These range from small dots of color to very dramatic broken frame line varieties.

Recently I had a chance to examine a huge hoard of this material, some of which has been put up for sale through the SRS auctions. Nothing frustrates me any more than an incomplete catalog. Trying to find undescribed differences in stamps is like playing one of those "What's wrong with this picture" games without the right picture. This is my attempt to show these various plate flaws and varieties describing how to find them.

In viewing some 2500+ stamps of Mississippi D1 through D8, I did not find all of the varieties mentioned by Hubbard. I only found one of the double impressions or at least what I think is the double impression. And this was on the five cent which Hubbard did not list as having one. In these cases it may be because I don't know what I am looking for. However, I did find additional constant flaws that aren't mentioned by Hubbard.

The mineral documentary stamps, used to pay a recording fee on deeds and transactions involving mineral rights, were printed in panes of 50, ten across by five down. Where I've been able to locate the position of the flaw I have used standard plate position terminology. Starting at the upper left is position 1 and going across to number 10 at the upper right corner, then dropping down a row and so on until position 50 is in the lower right corner.

The 1946 set of stamps all have 12 1/2 perforations. There are two later series where Bert J. Barnett's signature was removed from the stamps. Hubbard noted no flaws in these later issues, so the plates may have been redone or these may just be scarcer and no one has looked at them closely. The first set of the later stamps was perforated, the second set was hyphen hole rouletted. None of these last two sets were in the stamps I looked at.

D1 1ct rose or pink

This very light colored stamp had no plate flaws that I could find and Hubbard didn't list any. The ink on these, is very light.

D2 3ct orange

This stamp may be rarer than Hubbard indicates. It is almost always used singly and was the least used of the stamps in the sample I had. I detected no flaws.

D3 5ct lavender

This stamp saw very heavy usage and is probably the second most common. I did not find the D3a "flame at right of shield" variety so it may not have been constant. I do think in the past I have seen the "flame" variety.



D3b - Two dashes by state. A big flaw, easy to spot with the naked eye. Two horizontal dashes are just to the left of the S in STATE.



D3c - Broken T in DOCUMENTARY - This is more like a big blob of color at the top of the T. This may have been some kind of deterioration in the printing plate as these didn't occur as often as they should have.



D3d - Two dots after HB. This is the most common plate variety and appeared at least twice on the plates. It was in either position 19, 29, or 39 and also somewhere on the middle of the bottom row.





D3e - Double Impression. The bottom of this stamp is very fuzzy looking, especially the word CENTS. I cannot tell if it is a true double impression or a piece of printers waste that got used.



D3f - Slash in L - There is a plate scratch in the L in MINERAL extending out to the frame line at right. I only found one example.

D4 20ct lemon yellow

This is one of the palest stamps every printed and there could be plate flaws by the bushel basket. But everything is far too faint to see.

D5 20ct brown

This stamp saw a fair amount of usage though not in large multiples. I found four varieties.




D5a - Dot In W - A large dot of color is at the bottom of the W in TWENTY. There also appears to be some added color at the top of the left 20. This may be due to a deteriorating plate.



D5b - Plate scratch. This is a hard one to see. A curved scratch runs from the E in TWENTY down into the N in CENTS. This is in position 9.



D5c - Broken frame by AUDITOR. There is a small break in the inner frame line under the word AUDITOR just below the R. This is in either position 2,3,4,6,7 or 8. This stamp also has the D5d flaw.

D5d - Missing period after HB. At least two stamps on the top row had this problem. It seems to be fairly easy to find.

D6 50 cent dark or paler blue

The fifty cent was heavily used but seldom in large blocks. The D6a light blue variety was encountered and is the scarcer shade. Hubbard noted he found seven constant flaws. I only turned up six.



D6c - Squiggle. There is a squiggly line of color just to the left of H.B. It is on both the lighter blue and dark blue colors. It occurs in either position 14, 24, or 34 and also in the middle of the bottom row.



D6d - Broken left frame line - There is a small break in the frame line next to the lower left 50. This occurs on the bottom row of stamps in either stamp 44,45,46,47,48 or 49. It occurs on both the paler and dark blue colors.



D6e - Slash in front of 1946. A small slash is in front of 1946 in either position 19, 29 or 39.

D6f - Plate scratch - a huge plate scratch starting near the upper left corner and coming down into the T in TAX. It is in either position 17, 27 or 37. This appears to be quite rare.




D6g - White space below OC. I do not know if this is a constant variety. A wedge shaped area between the OC of DOCUMENTARY is missing color. The paler blue variety is the only one I found this on.


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D6h - Broken bottom frame line -There is a break in the frame line under the T in CENTS. This occurs somewhere in the middle of the bottom row (42-49).

D7 \$1 carmine

The \$1 appears to have been the workhorse stamp in this series and I was able to find six different constant varieties and one variety showing damage to the printing plate.





D7c - Round D in AUDITOR. This is a hard one to see and occurs somewhere on the top row of stamps in either stamp 4,5,6 or 7. I have not been able to determine which. The D in the word AUDITOR is round almost to the point of being the same as the O.

D7d - Broken top frame. There is a small break in the top frame line above the I in MINERAL. This is in position 49.

D7e - Lightly shaded left ribbon. On the two stamps shown the top stamp has fairly heavy shading in the ribbon at the left of the center shield. This appears to be "normal". The lower one has very little shading. I have not been able to determine the position.



D7f - Damaged lower left corner. This is a very dramatic flaw in which the frame line gives the illusion of having shattered and bent inward over the 1 itself. The stamp to its left, in this example looks as though it has a fragment of the frame line in its lower right corner. I have been unable to determine the position.



D7g - Dot in left frame line - This is in position 9 on the plate. A large dot of color is just inside the left frame line about even with the top of the center shield.



D7h - Dot near lower left 1.00. A heavy dot of color is below the "DI" in AUDITOR in the downward indentation of the inner frame line. Position has not been determined.



D7i - Plate scratch - A huge plate scratch starting at the B in Barnett and running through the O in ONE and the D in DOLLAR. This may well run into the top of other positions. This seems to be quite a rare error.

D8 \$5 slate green

On this stamp I was fortunate to have several remarkable documents with huge blocks of the \$5 stamp and in one case an entire pane on the back of an oil document. Being the high value, the \$5 was often used in huge blocks more so than the other values, which basically made change on high dollar taxes. Three constant plate flaws were visible and one more that I

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could not verify as constant. I did observe that the pale slate green variety D8a does exist but seems to be much scarcer than Hubbard indicates.

The central shields and ribbons seemed to vary all over the place in shading and the entire sheet could possibly be plated just from these minute differences. You would go blind doing it.



D8c - Broken bottom frame line. Mentioned in Hubbard and at position 26, there is a large break in the frame just under the left five.



D8e - Dot by 5. A constant flaw on position 10. A heavy dot of color is beside the lower left 5 in the space between the panel and the frame line.



D8f - Double period after HB. Another new flaw is a double period after HB. This occurs in position 42.

D8g - Dot over right 5. In position 1, there is a small dot of color above the right hand 5 inside the inner frame line. I do not know if this is constant.

The county recorders each had handstamped cancellers with which most of the stamps are cancelled. Many different colors of ink were used and there are some colorful combinations. Madison County seems to be the most often seen county. Some counties handstamps are quite hard to come by. There is one error

Florida first enacted a documentary stamp tax in 1931, at the rate of 10 cents per \$100 of consideration. In 1957, the tax on documents relating to realty (mainly deeds) was raised to 20 cents, and the tax has been assessed at two separate rates on deeds and notes ever since. Major rate increases occurred in 1957, 1963, 1979, 1981, 1985, 1987, 1991 and 1992.

In 1983, the Legislature authorized Dade County to levy a discretionary surtax on deeds of up to 45 cents for each \$100 except for deeds on single family residences.

Until 1967, all proceeds from documentary stamps went to General Revenue. In that year a surtax was imposed on documents relating to realty with the proceeds going to the Land Acquisition Trust Fund. The surtax was repealed in 1979 and replaced with an increase in the documentary stamp tax on deeds, and the Land Acquisition Trust Fund was given a distribution from this tax.

Since 1979, increases in the documentary stamp tax rate have been used to fund several programs, including acquisition of environmentally sensitive land, funding state infrastructure, and funding affordable housing. In 1990, the General Revenue service charge was extended to the Documentary Stamp Clearing Trust Fund (among other trust funds), which reduced all distributions from this fund by seven percent on a recurring basis. Chapter 90-217, Laws of Florida, authorized a portion of documentary stamp tax proceeds which had been allocated to General Revenue, to be used for Preservation 2000 debt services. By 1994, five P2000 bond series were authorized by the legislature, requiring debt service of 124.5 million dollars in 1995-96. Pursuant to chapter

in Jefferson Davis County. Their handstamp reads "CANCELLED/ JEFFRRSON/DAVIS CO". Either they never noticed the misspelling or were too cheap to buy a new canceller. 92-317, Laws of Florida, effective July 1, 1995, the distribution to General Revenue Fund was reduced by 8.66 percent and the distribution to the State Housing Trust Fund was increased by 8.66 percent.

Prior to March 31, 1996, documentary stamp taxes were paid by the following methods:

1. Affixing adhesive stamps printed by the Department of Revenue.

2. Meter tax stamps

3.Remitting tax directly to the Department of Revenue by qualified businesses, referred to as "alternated procedure"

4. Remitting tax directly to the Department of Revenue, by Clerks of the Circuit Court for recorded documents, referred to as "alternated method for recording documents".

Adhesive stamps printed by the Department of Revenue, meter machine stamps, or an authorized notation was required to be affixed to an instrument which is subject to documentary stamp tax. Purchasing stamps and maintaining stamp inventories, for both the tax payer and the Department of Revenue was a burdensome, expensive and outdated process.

Under Chapter 96-335, subsections 5 through 16, Laws of Florida (Senate Bill 248), the adhesive and meter machine stamps were eliminated and all businesses which finance transactions, banks and other lending institutions are now required to register with the Department of revenue and to remit the tax directly to the Department of Revenue. The Department of Revenue determined the use of physical documentary stamps for businesses that do not qualify for the alternate method of filing a tax return, instead of purchasing stamps, was burdensome for both taxpayers and the agency. This was because both the revenue department and the taxpayers had to each provide considerable security to store and use the stamps.

State Revenue News Florida Documentary Used as Stock Transfer

In an editorial a few years back called "The Muddle in Documentary Cataloging"¹, I noted that documentary stamps can be very difficult to catalog because there is such a wide variety of documents that were taxed. Shown is a Florida 15 cent D32 documentary used as a stock transfer stamp. This usage piqued my interest as I had thought these stamps were used on deeds and bonds and other legal documents.

The 1931 law² which brought these stamps into existence does indeed call for their use on stock transfers among a whole list of things. The following is from section 2 of the law:

"On each original issue, whether organization or reorganization, of certificates of stock issued in the State of Florida, or of profits or of interest in property or accumulations, by any corporation, on each \$100.00 of face value, or fraction thereof, 10 cents: Provided that where a certificate is issued without a face value, the tax shall be 10 cents per share, unless the actual value is in excess of \$100.00 per

share, in which case the tax shall be 10 cents on each \$1000.00 of actual value or fraction thereof. The stamps representing the tax imposed by this subdivision shall be attached to the stock books, and not to the certificates issued."

This last line makes the stock certificate shown, a the stamp attached to it, a fairly rare item. There is the possibility this last line of section 2 was amended by the 1957 or 1963 changes to the law³. Stock books were accounting books used by brokerages in which the transaction was noted and stamps were applied in the book. Pages from these sales books are sometimes offered for sale with NY stamps. The stock, 100 shares of Nashville Electronics, Inc. with a par value of 10 cents per share, was sold on September 14, 1965. It is interesting in that there are two handstamps noting the federal stock transfer tax had been paid. It appears that the tax rate on stock transfers was raised to 15 cents per hundred by the 1963 revision to the law. Bibliography.

PRESIDENTS LETTER

Scott Troutman has for several years done triple duty for the SRS as editor of the State Revenue News, Auction Manager and SRS Secretary. Due to job pressure, he has had to cut back on his service to the SRS. To this end, he had requested to be relieved of the position of SRS Secretary.

After conducting a search for a new SRS Secretary, the Board of Directors has appointed veteran collector Kent Gray to the position. In addition to Kent, Mack Matesen, currently a member of the SRS Board and Fred Kolcz also volunteered to take on the duties of Secretary. Kent's situation makes him the best choice, but both Matesen and Kolcz deserve full credit for stepping up and volunteering to take over this position. You will find Kent's address on the second page.

On other matters, the SRS typically shares a table with the American Revenue Association at the annual "Revenue Show", this year at Chicagopex in November. Next year, however, the SRS hopes to hold two regional meetings. The first will be at a the "Revenue" show with the ARA in Phoenix, AZ February 15-17, 2002. For those of us on the east coast, there will be another regional meeting at the Massacusetts Philatelic Show, popularly known as the Boxborough Show in late April or early May 2002. More details on all these two regional meeting in future newsletters.

Like several other SRS members, I'm an active buyer and seller on E-bay. Whenever I sell a state revenue stamp to someone who isn't an SRS member, I include an SRS membership application.

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I urge all SRS members who sell on Ebay, or other venues, to do the same. You can get some applications from Kent or print them off the web site. We have been getting a lot of new members this way. Ebay is alive with state revenue stamp buyers and sellers and it would be wonderful if those collectors who are not now members would join.

Finally it is a pleasure to announce that in the near future the State Revenue Society will be creating the State revenue Society Award for exemplary exhibits of state revenue stamps at local, regional and national philatelic shows. The details are yet to be worked out, but it is hoped that this award will encourage the exhibition of state revenue stamps nationwide. And for you exhibitors I especially encourage you to show your material at the three revenue gatherings I mentioned early. We love looking at each others goodies.

Auction Change

In the State Revenue Society Auctions, we have been charging \$2 minimum postage and handling on all winnings between \$10 and \$100 and 50 cents for under \$10. This was to cover certified mailing as we are self insuring up to \$100 plus the cost of notifying you and postage.

As certification fees have shot way up (and so has postage), on auction 21 I am going to charge 75 cents on winnings under \$30, \$2.75 from \$3-\$100 and a minimum of \$3.50 above that. Heavy stuff will always add postage charges.

On winnings over \$100 to Canada, I will try to ask you if you want it insured or not and charge accordingly. Minimum insurance is \$8.50. Ouch.

Two New Catalogs for Fish & Game Collectors

The Streamside Catalogue of Fish and Game Stamps, 2001 edition, by Jan R.. Wooton, 210 pages. Note - <u>The SRS is selling this catalog for</u> <u>a reduced price. See the</u> <u>publications section.</u>

Until now the key catalogs for collecting state fish and game stamps have been Jan Wooton's two catalogs State Pictorial Hunting Stamps and State Pictorial Fishing Stamps, along with Howard Richoux's Ducks 97 CD which included the non-pictorial stamps. The problem recently has been that both the Wooton catalogs were out of print and Richoux only helps if you have a PC with internet access.

Wooton's new catalog, featuring over 6700 stamps and their values is a great leap forward. He has combined the two old catalogs and added the non-pictorial material into one comprehensive catalog. State waterfowl or duck stamps are not included as these are being covered by both Scott and Dumaine. Stamp coverage goes through the 2001 season in many cases.

The strength of the catalog, as in its predecessors is in the prices for both new and used stamps. While Jan would be the first to tell you that on the scarcer material pricing is little more than an educated guess, by and large it is very consistant with what you see occuring in the SRS auctions and on E-bay.

The numbering is also consistant with the older catalogs which is a great help. One change is that the prefixes on the various types of stamps has been dropped. For example the first Virginia Floyd county bear-deer damage stamp previously was numbered VAFL1. Now it is just 1 and you can put your own prefix on it.

The older Wooton catalogs often featured discussions on pricing on license material. These are by and large gone. What is included is references to other books and articles on particularly "difficult" material. For instance the Kansas Quail section, references David Lucas's book and the Marion County Kansas fishing stamps reference David Torre's articles in the American Revenuer.

Some areas have seen tremendous price jumps in this catalog. The Indiana trouts

in particular caught my attention. Mint stamps from 1951-1966 have seen a doubling in prices and the used versions have gone up up by as much as five times while for the more common later material the prices are almost unchanged. Other areas with large upward price changes are the early Alaska fishing stamps, Colorado Additional Rod stamps, early Delaware fishing, Georgia trouts, Idaho fishing validation and archery stamps, early Iowa trouts, almost everything in Maryland, Michigan bear and cisco netting, early Missouri trout (I question this), New Mexico trout, North Dakota mule deer, Pennsylvania non-resident trouts, and Tennessee ammuntion stamps. Many of these rarer stamps prices were pushed up based on the Vanderford auction realizations of a couple years ago.

Most prices reflect modest price increases due to inflation and increased interest, due in part to hunters and fishermen collecting through E-bay.

It is fascinating going through the catalog just looking at stamps that have been made but you rarely come across. Things like the ND predator, Ohio trapping, SD hoop net and set line fishing stamps, or mountain goat and whistling swan hunting, WV wild boar or the stamps for hunting on West Point in NY.

Jan had a lot of help in cataloging this material and most of it from current or past SRS members, notably Howard Richoux, Jack Stewart and David Torre but also Charles Souder, Rog Beals, Dale Stover, Peter Pierce and Ken Pruess.

Jan notes there are several states including South Dakota, Georgia, Louisiana, Colorado and California still needs work. If you can supply him with missing information, please do. Also if you see prices that you think are way out of line.

This is a catalog you want to grab onto. We will put a copy in the SRS library.

The last Sam Houston Specialized Duck catalog I had was put out by Bob Dumaine in 1998. The old catalog with its listings of federal, state and worldwide ducks stamps was in black and white and was in a 6 $1/2 \ge 9 1/2$ inch format. The new catalog is 8 1/2 by 11 inches and with very nice colored pictures. Quite amazing that they could hold the three dollar price.

This catalog is the perfect compliment to the Wooton catalog as it covers the remaining material that Wooton does not cover. In addition to the duck stamps, Dumaine also covers federal junior ducks stamps, federal duck souvenir cards, Indian Reservation Stamps, state conservation stamps, and society conservation stamps (this catalog is a valuable reference in this area). The catalog also has a lot of listings for the state fishing stamps.

For duck stamp collectors there is also a wonderful index at the back of the catalog. Here you will find a topical index of all the duck stamps featuring particular ducks or dogs (say all the stamps featuring Brandts or Black Labradors). Duck collectors also tend to have their favorite artists and there is a second index by artist of stamps featuring their handywork.

The Sam Houston catalog is of course a working price list for the largest dealer in duck stamp material. But don't let that put you off, because it is still a handy catalog for this material (with the added advantage that you can buy it if you see something you have missed). It also features specialized albums and supplies.

Page 10/ 3rd Quarter 2001 Perfins and Perforations in State Revenues Notes from the Rev-Perfs Project by Chuck Spaulding




Figure 1 District of Columbia 5448 perfin

Many SRS members know about The Perfin's Club's effort to document the perfins and perforations found in United States (State and federal) revenue stamps and documents. What they may not be aware of is that a very large number of perforated designs are found only in state revenue stamps. For example, the perforated number shown in Figure 1 is found only in Washington DC beverage tax stamps. We have many different

numbers perforated in these stamps and the mystery becomes more complex because we always find a rubber stamped number on the face of the stamp that is different from the perforated number.

The perfin design UTAH (Figure 2) has been found only in Utah's Oleomargarine and cigarette tax stamps. Figure 3 shows






Figure 4 - Kansas cigarette strip with 744 perfin

the D/1, M/# and W/# that are only found in Maryland's wine and liquor excise tax stamps. States like Kansas used perforated numbers (Figure 4) in their cigarette tax stamps.

What we don't know is who perforated them, the reason for their use and how many different designs may have been perforated. Is there anyone that can help us discover this information? There are probably other states that have perforations in their revenues and it is our hope that SRS members will examine their state revenue collections and report the perforated designs that they find. Has anyone seen a perforation in a state hunting or fishing stamp?

Perforations have been found in state beer stamps since they were first issued. This was caused by a 1902 federal law that required breweries to perforate federal beer stamps. When states issued their own beer tax stamps, the states also required that the stamps be perforated in a similar manner. We have estimated that there should be at least two or three thousand different perforated designs to be

discovered in state and federal beer stamps. To date, we have found about 900 different designs. There are a lot of designs to be discovered and we can use some help in trying to find them all. These stamps may become more valuable after the catalog is published and collectors start looking for these designs.

Perhaps the most common state revenue stamps are the New York state stock transfer stamps (Figure 5). Collectors, like Ken Pruess, have made them their primary collecting interest. Perfins and perforations are very common in them. These stamps were used on stockbrokers sales slips to pay the state tax that was required. One of our problems in cataloging the different designs is to note the design's users. These sales slips have been our primary source in discovering the users of the different designs. We are always looking for these sales slips to help us complete our research. We believe that with more research and help, we should discover most of the designs and users that were required to pay this state tax.

We are primarily seeking help with the state revenue perforations. The Rev-Perf's Project will appreciate it, if SRS members will check what perforated designs they have in their state revenue collections and let me know what you find. You may discover a very rare perfin. Contributors to the project will be noted in the final catalog.

South Dakota hunting stamps contain some real rarities and a new one from 1976 has popped up. Shown is a license with a federal duck stamp, a South Dakota resident small game (Wooton SDSG33) and a South Dakota duck (Scott 3). It is the fourth stamp that is not listed in any catalog. It is a \$12.00 resident West River prairie deer stamp (Wooton WRPD21) that has been overprinted in purple ink with a handstamp "ANTLERLESS DEER/ UNIT 15". I assume that this antlerless deer season was only held within the West River area to thin the herd.



Page 12/ 3rd Quarter 2001 Adventures in State Revenue Collecting: The Search for the Oklahoma Farm Implement Stamps by Scott Troutman

Ken Pruess, up in Nebraska, started this adventure. He sent me an e-mail with a web address on it

www.oktax.state.ok.us/oktax/taxes1.html. "Check out the farm implement stamps. It only tells where to get the stamps. Amazing what you can find on the internet with a search engine. I like Google".

This was one of the more cryptic messages I had received in a while, but when I clicked on the web site, a whole list of strange Oklahoma taxes came up. There amongst the Admission Tax for horse races, Aircraft Excise Tax, Charity Games Tax, Cigarette Stamps, Compact Tribal Tobacco Payment, Documentary Stamps, Drug Tax Stamp, and the Freight Car tax, was a listing for the Farm Implement Stamps. When you clicked on it, it said that farm implement dealers had to pay an ad valorem tax on new and used farm implements worth over \$500 and that you got the tax stamps at the Oklahoma Tax Commission. What in the world was that about?

A few weeks later I was working the OKPEX stamp show on a Friday, here in Oklahoma City. The show site is a hotel known locally as the Lincoln Plaza, even though the name on the sign out front changes every few years. It was in the process of changing names from the Clarion to the Ramada and a tarp was over the sign at the moment. The Lincoln Plaza is about a mile down Lincoln Boulevard from the state capitol complex, the seat of government in the Great State of Oklahoma. So at lunch I slipped off to go see what I could find at the Tax Commission office. It is in a large white building, sitting north of the capitol itself.

The state capitol is a huge, imposing Gothic building festooned in gargoyles and sporting huge marble columns. It sits among a collection of old oil derricks. By chance the building was sited on a major oil field, and after the oil played out they left the derricks as a tourist attraction. The Capitol building itself is oddly proportioned as it was originally designed to have a huge dome, but the funds ran short and that never got built. Now, a huge

crane was being erected as after nearly a century, the state had come up with the money to finish the dome. The dome fund raising had been a squalid affair which included trying to get notorious purveyor of pork-barrel grants U.S. Congressman Bud Shuster to give Oklahoma a U.S. Department of Transportation grant to build the dome - an idea so bizarre even Bud Shuster (later heaved from Congress for his crooked doings) wanted no part of it. They had finally given up and went elsewhere for the cash.

Inside the terrazzo world of the Tax Commission building was a never ending collection of counters for the payment of an endless stream of taxes. Finding the information desk vacant, I tried inquiring at a window for auto licensing. A smartly groomed middle aged gentleman was working the window, finishing up retitling a pick-up for a small, gray haired black gentleman. I stepped up and asked where you got farm implement stamps. He rolled his eyes and pondered a minute and sent me down to a window labeled "Miscellaneous".

The lady at the miscellaneous window, which didn't seem to get a lot of business, surprised me to no end by actually knowing about farm implement stamps. "We don't sell them here. The treasurers at the county courthouses have them."

Drat. The Oklahoma County courthouse sits right in the middle of downtown, in an area so notorious for

having no parking that the parking garage under the Murrah Building, that place of infamy that Timothy McVeigh blew up killing 168 people, well that parking garage is still used. I would call it a day.

A month went by and I had a half day of vacation and I decided it was time to make another attempt at searching out the farm implement stamps. By chance, it was the Friday before Tim McVeigh was to be executed, and the downtown landscape was swarming with TV crews buzzing around the Bombing Memorial area in search of a story like buzzards to a week old piece of carrion. Half the streets were blocked off. So I decided to try the little courthouse over in El Reno instead.

El Reno is the county seat of Canadian County, a small town which grew up around the still existent Fort Reno - a Buffalo soldier calvary outpost. Driving out on I-40 you pass such landmarks as a garishly painted water tower at Yukon announcing it is the birthplace of Garth Brooks, and a big brown historical marker showing that the Chisholm Trail once passed though what is today a nice subdivision. It was a hot summer day and it was late in the afternoon.

El Reno sits at the southeast corner of an area sometimes called the 10 mile square. Ten miles on a side, the 10 mile square is almost nothing but continuous wheat fields, one of the great bread baskets of the earth. The wheat was ripe and standing gold and tall in the fields and the traveling combine teams were up from Texas and hard at work on the harvest.

It is a 20 mile drive out to El Reno. and as late as the 1950's the Interurban trolley ran all the way from Oklahoma City. The center of El Reno was torn up and it appeared they were re-installing some kind of trolley system. It wasn't clear that it would run more than a couple blocks, but it made getting to the courthouse something like negotiating a town sized maze.

I found the modern courthouse building, and the first clerk I approached gave me a quizzical look, queried a coworker and then said I needed to go next

door to the old courthouse. At the old courthouse, a small square brick building, I knew I was in trouble. Just inside the door was a huge fan six feet tall rumbling along. The air conditioning had failed. A woman at the counter, wiped sweat from her brow and led me back to the desk of a blond woman named Cindy dressed smartly in a black pants suit, with a phone hanging in her ear. It was 85 degrees at her desk and her hair was drooping about her face and the back of her shirt was sweat stained.

She got off the phone and when I asked about farm implement stamps she said "Good Lord, nobody has asked for any of those in years." She quickly explained that she had to leave in five minutes, but took me over to a safe and pulled out a rumpled old white envelope that looked like someone's oft reused lunch bag. She dumped out the contents which were thick pads of stamps and said "See what you want. I should have left already. I'm late for an appointment. Can you come back tomorrow". Before I could answer "No", she got a phone call from someone talking very slowly and her frustration was building by the second.

I quickly noted that there were four values of rather plain looking little stamps. A \$6 black on white, an \$18 black on green paper, a \$24 black on yellow, and a \$108 black on pink. In the sweltering heat I forgot to note the size of the sheetlets, but would say there were between 20 and 25 on each sheet and each pad probably had at least 50 sheets.

Trapped on the phone, Cindy was growing frantic and I mouthed, could she write down her address and I'll just mail in for what I wanted. She scribbled an address on a yellow post'it note, heaved the stamps back into the envelope, hurled the envelope into the safe, and managed to lock the safe with her free hand, phone under chin, and phone cord stretched to the breaking point. Some lady droned on and had poor Cindy repeat a set of simple instructions for the fourth time. She was talking to an interpreter for a deaf lady and the signing wasn't going well. Cindy finally slammed the phone down, waved goodbye and ran for the door. I left parboiled and empty handed.

In her haste, Cindy had written down the wrong zip code and forgotten to tell me who to make the check out to. This being the case, the envelope, once I did find out who to put on the check, came back a week later stamped "No Such Person, Return to Sender".

In the meantime, Ken Pruess had found that the law authorizing these stamps had passed in 1991 and gone into effective January 1, 1992. The law was house bill 1081 and in the Session Laws of Oklahoma for 1991 is Chapter 149. This became compiled statues 68-5401 to 5404.

My understand after reading the law is it is an attempt to lower the state ad valorem sales taxes on farm equipment. With state sales tax in the 7% range on farm equipment, all the farmers were going to neighboring states and the Oklahoma implement dealers were going broke. A similar exemption exists on automobiles. To get the exemption, an item has to cost over \$500. The dealers had to maintain a log book into which the sales are logged. The dealer keeps a copy of the invoice with the tax stamps on it in the book.

The tax rates are:

At first it isn't obvious a lot of \$108 stamps are needed, but then try pricing a fully loaded, tandem wheeled John Deere with CD tape deck and air conditioning for pulling a set of wheat gang plows, or a new International Harvester combine, airconditioned, with quadraphonic stereo system, quartz lighting systems so you can cut at night and a maw wide enough to deal with the 10 mile square, and this denomination makes a lot of sense.

For the record the stamps are 21mm x 16mm with a serial number on each. On the bottom row of stamps on the pad, the serial numbers are actually in the selvadge.

We have some of the \$6 stamps for sale in the sales division as a result of this effort and Cindy Barnett's patience.

Page 13 / 3rd Quarter 2001 Kent Gray: A Bio on Our New Secretary

Born and raised in California, Kent enlisted in the USAF at age 17. Nineteen years later he is on his 7th "permanent assignment". Ten of those years were spent overseas in Germany, Panama and most recently England. He is currently a Master Sergeant and Flight Chief for the 7th Explosive Ordnance Disposal Flight, where he "blows up suspicious packages, provides counter-terrorism protection for VIP's, and disposes of explosives and munitions that have become hazardous, old or are no longer needed. In short, the military equivalent of the bomb squad."

In state revenues he collects all fifty states and DC, except fish and game unless he gets a great buy like his all time favorite - a lot of Virginia bear-deer damage stamps with Wooton Catalog value of \$1200 for 35 cents. His favorite states (though not necessarily his best material) are Pennsylvania, Florida, Indiana, Colorado, California, Arkansas and Texas in no particular order and his collection has over 8,000 state revenues and is growing daily. A longtime collector of city-county revenues, his favorites are Philadelphia and Baltimore locals where he has been trying to acquire all known varieties.

Like many of us he has a US postage collection that has seen little activity lately, "a pretty decent US Revenue collection including the reds and greens" and he likes to hunt for low serial numbers. In the past he collected all the Springer listed material but has sold off most except the tobacco material and McLellan's Local Post.

He also collects Apollo 15 material topically and is working on an exhibit using covers and stamps to tell the Apollo 15 story.

He is currently settled at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene, Texas (the home for B1B bombers and C-130 cargo aircraft) where he keeps his 18 man explosives disposal crew, one of the busiest units in the continental United States, ready for peace or war. His wife, who I believe is English, is trying to adjust to life in tornado alley.

We had 41 bidders and only 2 got skunked. High bid was \$72 for the rare Florida liquor lot 31. Other good returns were lots 9A the Arkansas honeys (\$25 est/\$28 bid), 58 the Kentucky import liquor block (\$5/\$11), 96 North Carolina bedding (\$2/\$4.25), 100 NC hunt & fish (\$2.50/\$5.25), 137 Nevada trout (\$14/ \$30), 195 Texas beer (\$10/\$12), 196 TX liquor (\$1/\$2.75) and both lots of ration coupons(266,267). One of the Tennessee ducks was misdescribed as a #5 instead of a #15 and was withdrawn.

Four lots tied for most bids: 94 North Carolina fortified wine (\$2/3.25), 255 a hodgepodge (\$1/\$5.25), 256 junior duck (\$3/\$4.25), and 265 a US oleomargarine with odd rouletting (\$2.50/\$3.50). Lot 115 the North Dakota trout & salmon was the attack of the cheapskates (\$14/\$7). Hot areas were bedding, honey, Florida, Wisconsin, Texas, oleomargarine, beer, wine and malt. The PA stock transfers also did well. SD and VA hunting was spotty and great buys were made on the tough Illinois trouts and Tennessee ducks.

State Revenue News **1998 Delaware Temporary Trout Stamps**

Every year the Delaware Department of Fish and Wildlife issue trout stamps for trout fishing in Delaware. For the 1998 Delaware trout fishing season the trout stamps were not ready. The Delaware Division of Fish and Wildlife issued temporary trout stamps to fishermen.

The temporary trout stamps were 1997 trout stamps with a 1998 handstamp overprint in black ink and hand numbered on the front of the stamp. The temporary stamps were issued for resident, nonresident, and youth. Numbers started with 8001 for the resident stamps, 1801 for the youth stamps and 1801 for the nonresident stamps.

The central design in all these stamps is the same, with the wording at the top being different. The non-resident are yellow around the central picture, the youth are dark brown, the resident stamps white.

1998 temporary trout stamps were sold by vendors and by the Delaware Division of Fish and Wildlife Department. Temporary stamps were sold from January 1, 1998 until approximately March 6, 1998 when the 1998 trout stamps were ready. The temporary 1998 stamps were then recalled by the Fish and Wildlife Department. A large portion of the temporary stamps for the non-resident and youth went unsold.

According to the Delaware Fish and Wildlife Department sales figures for the temporary stamps are approximately 363 resident stamps, 27 non-resident and 43 youth stamps sold. 1998 Delaware trout stamps have serial numbers on the back.

There are six trout streams in New Castle County that are stocked with trout. These streams are Christina Creek, White Clay Creek, Mill Creek, Pike Creek, Wilson Run and Beaver Run. Two weeks before trout season opens, trout are stocked into streams and occasionally in the fall. For the six streams trout fishing season opens the first Saturday in April. Between June 30, 1998 and October 1, 1998 a trout stamp is not needed because the waters are too warm for any uncaught trout to survive. Rainbow, brown, and brook trout are stocked with a daily limit of six trout in possession or four trout in restricted streams.

There are also two warm water ponds that are stocked with trout during the cold time of year. Tidbury Pond in Dent County and the eastern most State Department of Transportation pond at Gravel Hill near Georgetown in Sussex County. Trout stamps are needed for fishing in these ponds during the month of March, when they are stocked with trout. The daily limit is six fish per day. Trout stamp requirements will not be enforced in ponds stocked with trout from April 1 through February 28th.

These 1998 temporary trout stamps are very rare. It is unknown how many were on licenses. The youth and non-resident stamps are rarer than the resident.

Page 15 / 3rd Quarter 2001 Mississippi Levee Tax A No Tax Tag

In the fourth quarter 2000 State Revenue News, Terence Hines provided an illustration of a red Mississippi levee tax tag, as well as an explanation that this was a fee imposed upon cotton with the funds going toward the upkeep of certain of the state's levees.

This tag, which is of a like design (Card size and font type) is pale blue with black printing and a yellow grommet and is clearly marked as "No Tax". Can anyone explain as to the kinds of cotton shipments that would have been exempt from the levee taxes? Given that this tax was repealed in 1895, this is a most unexpected survivor indeed.

Editors note - These may have been used on cotton shipped from other states which may have been off loaded for transfer on Mississippi docks or warehouses or on cotton which was being transported through the state. They could have also been used on cotton stored either before or after the law went into effect. The U.S. cotton taxes of 1932 had similar no tax tags for these purposes.

State Revenue News Maryland Non-Tidal Fishing

Shown is the back of a 1988 fishing license issued to a resident of Pennsylvania. In addition to the 1988 adult trout stamp (Wooton MDT43) a second stamp called a license sticker is to the right. This stamp is black on salmon, imperforate and probably self adhesive.

The serial number looks computer generated. The date is written in and a note on the license indicates that "Issuing Agent must enter the date issued on the sticker only if the sticker is issued on a date other than the date entered in the validation section of the License carrier." In this case there is no difference but he dated it anyway. Non-tidal indicates that this is fresh water fishing not including the Chesapeake Bay. Seperate stamps are needed for fishing in the bay.

This stamp is not in the updated 2001 Wooton catalog.

The current New York state cigarette tax heat fusion decals are in the shape of an apple. It is unclear if this is some sort of wierd ad for New York state apples or if this is a reference to New York City being referred to as the "Big Apple".

The apple is gold in color and has at the top the words "NEW YORK" and near the bottom the word "STATE" in black. A serial number is in the middle of the apple, applied with a black dot matrix printer.

At the bottom of the apple is a line of black color which when looked at under a good magnifying glass is microprinting which appears to say NECEL © INC.

Page 18/ 3rd Quarter 2001 Sedalia, Missouri Depression Scrip Revisited

I bought a block of 12 of the illustrated Sedalia co-operative currency stamps from a dealer last January not knowing what they were. Later I accidentally ran across the article in the 3rd quarter 1999 SRN explaining the deal, from which I review:

"To alleviate the short supply of money... the plan was to work as follows: In order for the receiver to pass this currency (the bogus one dollar notes), it was necessary for him to purchase unused co-operative currency stamps from the City Treasurer at 2 cents each, affix one to the back of the note and cancel it with his initials and date, each time the note was passed. After 52 such stamps had been affixed and cancelled in the manner described, the note was redeemed by the City Treasurer for one dollar."

What remained unexplained was -how did the notes themselves originally enter circulation? You see -- the first person to possess the note could spend it merely by adding a 2c stamp and receive one dollar's worth of goods or services. Each subsequent passer hence paid a full 1.02 for one dollars worth of goods. So how did the *first person* obtain the note?


Connecticut Turkey Tags

Shown is a copy of the front and back of a Connecticut Turkey Inspection Tag. I found two identical tags in an antique shop. I have not seen these tags listed or described anywhere.

The tag was issued by Connecticut Department of Agriculture, S. McLean Buckingham, Commissioner and reflect that the turkey to which it was attached has passed a state inspection. The turkeys were grown at Raylem Turkey Yards, In New Milford, Connecticut. New Milford is no longer an agricultural area (for that matter most of Connecticut is no longer an agricultural area), and I do not think the farm exists now.


An inquiry to the current Commissioner of Agriculture for information brought no response.

Incidentally, the block of stamps known to Scott Troutman had an 18% probability of occurring with a period after "SEDALIA MO". Mine had 4 out of twelve chance, or 33%, corroborating that dot-less ones are the scarcer of the two varieties. None of mine have a straight edge, giving no clue as to sheet size.



Gasoline Ration Stamp

This is in response to "Help Needed" in the 2nd quarter's SRN Letters to the Editor. Mr. Yoder's stamp is a US gasoline ration stamp from WWII. There is a reference catalog entitled United States Rationing: World War II that comprises 632 pages plus a 142 page supplement. It is published and sold by the Society of Ration Token Collectors at \$40 postpaid for a SRTC member or \$56 for nonmembers. The Office of Price Administration's official form numbers are used in the catalog for catalog numbers. Thus, Mr. Yoder's stamp is catalog number R-528J. The SRTC also issues a quarterly journal, The Ration



Çarter Litchfield was kind enough to send a copy of the above cartoon from the *Rural New-Yorker* in the 1890's showing the three headed hydra of "glucose" (dextrose or corn sugar), "cotton-seed oil - lard" (shortening or substitute lard) and "oleomargarine" threatening the livelihood of the traditional farmer. This is from his book "*History of Oleomargarine Tax Stamps and Licenses in the United States*", a must read for any one interested in these issues. It was sentiments like this that brought the substitute lard stamp from South Dakota into existence. You can buy a copy through the SRS Publications or borrow the library copy.

Class B - Supplemental ration for passenger cars.

- Class C Supplemental ration for drivers in occupations considered vital to the war effort (larger ration than class B)
- Class D Basic ration for motorcycles.
- Class E Non-highway ration for tractors, boats, engines, etc.
- Class R Non-highway ration as above but for large amounts of gasoline.
- Class S Service ration for trucks, busses, ambulances and other fleet vehicles.
- Class T Transport ration; replaced the service ration during Phase III of gas rationing.
- Class X Unlimited ration; only used during Phase I of gas rationing.



Little Mystery California Vehicle Inspection

Shown is a California item which was used for at least the years 1954 through 1956. It is a form stating that your vehicle has been inspected by the California Dept. of Agriculture's Bureau of Plant Quarantine. It is unclear just what they

were inspecting for. The back of the form indicates it was some kind of "ravaging insects", but this was long before the fruit fly scare of the 1980's. Does anyone know what they were hunting for?

The form lists seventeen different inspection stations which are well spread around the state. - thus it does not appear to be a border inspection.
