

President's Notebook by Peter Martin

SRS Catalog Prefixes

The response to last quarter's article about the effort to standardize state revenue category prefixes has been encouraging. Mike Borer, Mack Matesen and Scott Troutman provided in-depth reviews and others provided comments that have led to a number of additional categories (especially fish and game) and some interesting discussions. Two of the broader subjects were how to treat documentary stamps and tags.

The Hubbard catalog uses the "D" prefix for a wide variety of documentary usages ranging from real estate and insurance to intangibles. The question is, should the SRS continue to use the "D" prefix to cover this broad spectrum of usage or should each subcategory be given a separate prefix?

Tradition is on the side of the "D" prefix, but, since most of the stamps are inscribed with the actual category, a strong case can be made that real estate (RE), insurance (IN), intangibles (IT) and others should have their own prefix.

But where do you draw the line? The California documentary stamps, the first paper state revenues, all have a "D" prefix, even though some read: Bill of Lading, Exchange, Attorney at Law or Passenger. I think you muddy the waters and make them more difficult to collect if you break these stamps into subcategories.

How would you treat the Alabama Tax on Seals (Hubbard D1-D2), the Minnesota Deed Tax, the Missouri and New York Secured Debt Tax or the Washington Tax on Conveyances?

Tags are an integral part of certain categories of state revenue collecting such as Feed, Fertilizer, and Cotton Seed Meal. While tags are clearly not stamps, they often have all the same characteristics, including a date, value or poundage, of their adhesive cousins. To ignore them is to close an important specialized area. Two possible ways to treat tags would be with a "T" suffix (similar to the "M" suffix for meters) or with a 'TG' prefix.

The 'T" suffix would mean that Feed tags (such as FE2OT) would be collocated with Feed stamps. The TG prefix (such as

TGFE2O) would mean that all categories of tags would be placed together in a separate location.

Let me have your thoughts about these and any related issues. If you have not already done so, please review the "Proposed SRS Catalog Number Prefixes" article in First Quarter State Revenue News (pages 14-15) and provide your comments to me by June 30. Alabama Liquor and Wine Tax Stamps

The Acts of 1943, No. 99, p. 104, approved June 3, 1943, provided that liquor would be taxed at the rate of 10% of the selling price established by the Alabama Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

The current 1975 Code of Alabama, Chapter 3, Title 28, provides in section 35-160 for a tax on spirituous or vinous liquor sold by the ABC Board equal to 58% of the selling price. The tax consists of a basic 10% rate (imposed by Sec. 28-3-200), plus additional taxes of 10% (imposed by Sec. 28-3-201), 10% (imposed by Sec. 28-3-202), 13% (imposed by Sec. 28-3-203), 3% (imposed by Sec. 28-3-204), 10% (imposed by Sec. 28-3-205) and 2% (imposed by Sec. 28-3-280).

The Attorney General has determined that counties do not have authority to levy an additional local Alabama alcoholic beverage tax on wine based on a percentage of retail sales because the general state statute provides for an exclusive tax in lieu of all other taxes on table wine (see Para. 35-160.20).

Prior to October 1, 2001, the tax on native farm wine sold by native farm wineries was 5 cents per gallon. The tax was also imposed on wine given as free samples of 6 oz. or less in winery tasting rooms. A native farm winery was one which has an annual production not exceeding 100,000 gallons and in which 75% of the berries, fruit, produce or honey used was grown in Alabama by the permit holder. In 2001 the legislature eliminated the lower rate for native farm wine (Act 1114, Laws 2001, Fourth Special Session) and provided that wine manufactured in Alabama is now subject to tax at the rate of 45 cents per liter sold, the same rate as the tax on foreign table wine (Sec. 28-7-18, 1975 Code).

Liquor decals may measure a mm or so larger in each dimension when used.

Numbers in parenthesis such as (LS4a) are Hubbard catalog numbers.







Hugh M. Goldberg

Hugh M. "Big Mel" Goldberg, a long time SRS member and owner of Subway Stamp Shop died Jan. 18, 2003 at age 64. He had been battling pancreatic cancer. Mel was born Dec. 4, 1938.

His father sold stamp packets in luncheonettes, cigar stores and candy stores in the New York area. The elder Goldberg's stamp business grew and in 1952 he bought Subway Stamp Shop in New York City.

Mel inherited the business in 1975 and in that same year met Virginia who he would marry. In the 1970's and 1980's he expanded his business heavily into stamp and coin collecting supplies. In 1994 he moved to Altoona, Pennsylvania. This was after he discovered he could buy the entire warehouse building for what he was paying a year in rent in New York.

Mel was a member of the American Philatelic Society and served on the board of the American Stamp Dealers Association. He was a major contributor to the APS.

He had a well deserved reputation as being a prickly character to deal with. But he loved the hobby and he supported a number of publishing efforts including the Walla catalogs on US liquor revenues and reprints of the Bellinghausen Kansas catalogs. He was attempting to restore the original Dennison stamp hinge machinery to full operation to produce better hinges.

Carolina material (like the Vegetable seeds) and a lot of good stuff from all over.

On Auction 25 I am trying an experiment with some of you. If your winnings are between \$40 and about \$100 I can now insure it cheaper than certify it. If this works out well it will get you the material for about \$1 cheaper.

Some of the auction consignors have sent in whole collections to disburse. This is good news. The problem is, when we set up the auctions originally we assumed the material would come in already lotted in glassines. Beginning with auction 27 we will charge 4 cents a glassine for each lot where we put them in glassines. That is about what it is costing us buying them bulk from Subway Stamp Shop.

This is an issue I wish we could have published in color. The scans in John Bowman's article are just beautiful.

Alabama Playing Cards Tax Stamps

John D. Bowman

The Alabama legislative Acts of 1935, No. 194, p. 256, established a tax code that included playing cards stamps (Schedule 109, p. 485-6). This Act established a tax of one cent on each five cents or fraction thereof of the selling price for packs of playing cards containing not more than 54 cards. Such tax was to be evidenced by revenue stamps and the stamps to be affixed to the individual package with the initials on the stamps of the person selling such cards, written with indelible pencil. An annual license fee of \$2.00 was also required of any dealer selling playing cards. This Act was made part the Code of Alabama for 1940 (Title 51, Section 573). In the Acts of 1951, No. 978, p. 1653, the tax rate was changed to ten cents per deck or package of not more than 54 playing cards, such tax to be evidenced by revenue stamps. This was incorporated into the Code of Alabama of 1975, and the tax is still in effect in 2002 at the time of this writing (Code of Alabama, 1975, Section 40-12-144), although it is not enforced as many decks sold in 2002 do not bear the tax stamp.

Playing Cards Tax Stamps were produced in panes of 10 (5x2) arranged vertically to make a sheet of 100 water decal stamps. The top pane has a control number printed above it in black, with or without a preceding letter. Control numbers were used for accounting of stamps sold and on hand. Panes of ten were separated by rouletting, often with black color printed on the pane. Stamps were printed in color on a white background unless otherwise noted. Designs are similar to tobacco stamps issued simultaneously.

Suggested valuations are based on the best information available to the author, including Hubbard's catalog. Unused stamp valuations are for decals on full card backing with sufficient card margins to identify the type of card or safety paper, and to be classified as VF or better. Used valuations are for single decals on piece of package wrapper and complete with no missing pieces. Examples used on playing card packages are worth much more than single used specimens. Examples listed by Hubbard or others but not known to the author are indicated with "?" in the value field.

Pruess suggested that the Alabama punchboard/chance card tax (1935-1953) was often paid with the playing card/chance card stamps, which could account for denominations which presumably had no use on playing cards.¹ In fact, punch cards exist with playing card stamps in various combinations of denominations, and an example is shown in this section.









A 56 Cent Mystery: Prefix Letters on the New Hampshire Paper Tobacco Tax Stamps.

In 1939 New Hampshire issued a set of 18 paper tobacco stamps, Hines #s T13 -30. These were printed in green. The very next year the state started issuing another, longer, set of paper stamps with an identical design but printed in brown (T32 - 58). The reason for the color change is unknown. All the paper stamps have a sheet number in a center panel that begins with an upper case letter. The letter is different for each denomination. Generally, the letter moves through the alphabet as the denomination increases. The denomination and corresponding letter for the green and brown stamps are shown in the following table.

In 1945 four denominations of the 1940 brown set were surcharged with five new denominations (T72 - 76). The values, along with the prefix letters, are as follows:

Denomination	Letter
12 cent on 45 cent	U
21 1/2 cent on 45 cent	U
22 ½ cent on 3 cent	D
67 1/2 cent on 56 cent	Z
97 1/2 cent on \$1.01	AC

For three of the original values, the prefix letter on the surcharged stamps is the same as that on the unsurcharged stamp of the same denomination. But this is not the case for the 67 1/2 cent on 56 cent denomination. On this stamp the letter is Z but on the unsurcharged 56 cent stamp, the letter was R. This suggests that the basic 56 cent stamp may have been reprinted with a new prefix letter and then overprinted. But this seems odd - surely it would have been cheaper just to print stamps with the new denomination. Or perhaps a new printing of the 56 cent denomination had already been made, the new prefix letter denoting the new printing. It was stamps from this new printing that ended up being surcharged. If this is the case, I would expect that unsurcharged copies of the 56 cent brown stamp with prefix letter Z should exist. Can anyone report same?

Welcome once again to the Back of the Book (BOB) area of state revenue collecting - city and county tax stamps!


As always, please check your collection for locals not listed in the On Line City and County Catalog (www.staterevs.com) and see what you can add!

First I would like to thank this quarter's contributors: This quarter's two thumbs up award goes to Mack Matesen, who contributed untold numbers of scans (over 100!), mostly for the CA and GA catalogs. Other contributors were: Anon, Mike Florer, Roger Forsyth, Ed Lovegren, Ken Pruess, and Scott Troutman.

A new area to the catalog is the "Unknown" catalog. The above pictured Brentwood is a perfect example - can you help identify what state it is from? AL, FL, GA, MO, NY, and VA all have a Brentwood, and all these states had city tax stamps! Because of the safety on the card, I believe it to be from Missouri, but have nothing but the safety to go on.



Previously, I had a set of Jeffersonville accounting stamps listed as unknown. Ken Pruess quickly straightened me out, reminding me IN listed these, but they were not pictured in Hubbard's catalog. The catalog lists a partial set from 3 cents to \$500, and is fantastic - check it out!




One of the many additions to the GA catalog is this great \$5 on 84 cent beer from Warner Robbins. Previously unlisted to boot!



Another nice GA, one of a set of Brunswick whisky (liquor) stamps, also previously unlisted.

These are nice Baltimore, Maryland items; a Baltimore tobacco tax meter, a new Baltimore County cigar find, and a 50ct blue pressure sensitive tobacco (Hubbard's CR18?). The meters I should note are known to come in pink, purple (which this one is), green and blue inks and from four different meters. Values reported are from 1 to 12 cents, 14, 15, 25 and 50 cents. Not all values are known in all colors.







The pressure sensitives are known in four denominations: 6 cent purple, 25 cent brown, 50 cent blue and \$1 green.

These are listed as cigar stamps but are the really tobacco? They are not pictured.

In Hubbard's County & Municipal stamp catalog, the Baltimore meters are unpictured but listed as cigars. Does anyone have cigar meters or is this a catalog error?

The City of Lakeland, Florida is the latest coin operated machine stamp to appear. This stamp, apparently made so it could be used for multiple years, has the rate (\$15.00) the year (1998-99) and a serial number handstamped in black. The stamp is 38x48mm, self-adhesive on a white "Mactac" backing paper and apparently is a coil stamp that comes in rolls. It is rouletted vertically 6 1/2. The stamp is flat black on a florescent yellow paper.



Check out the California County Documentaries on the web page - at least seven new counties have been added to the counties known to have issued stamps, bringing the new total to 32 counties, each with 17 stamps!!! That math for you multiplication challenged types is at least 544 different stamps for CA Counties!

Montana Overprints on Federal Red Liquor Strips.

Montana was amongst a small number of Western states which restricted the sales of liquor to state owned stores. These were referred to as either monopoly or control states. Oregon, Utah, and Washington were also control states. The federal red liquor strips in use during this era were overprinted with the name of the state's liquor commission.

Hubbard's catalog Volume I lists these Montana issues as:

LS3 Surcharged variously in red on Federal Liquor stamps"

LS4 Surcharged in black

LS5 Handstamped in black.

As clarification, neither LS3 nor LS4 exists in the form noted in Hubbard's catalog. Montana never "surcharged" any of these federal issues used in the state. The overprinting was done by the distilleries. I'd suggest that one merely delete the word "surcharged" and substitute "overprinted". Since none of these issues were overprinted in red we also need to delete that word as well. Therefore the listing should read:


LS3 - Overprinted variously in black on red federal liquor strips.

LS4 does not exist, as such, and should be deleted from the catalog.

LS5 I've never seen but it seems logical that a handstamped version could exist since like issues appear in other Western states which likewise handstamped their issues when they were initially placed in use. If anyone has one of these in their collections please provide it to the editor.

The overprints have various fonts, sizes and typrographical arrangements, all variations of LS3. The stamps shown are reduced in size. Overprints shown top to bottom are:






Montana Trade Stimulator by M.E. Matesen

Here is an item from my collection showing use of the 1947 punchboard stamps on a "trade stimulator" put out by Planter's Peanuts. Sadly the swatch of scotch tape and the years have taken a toll on the stamps.

Such an odd tax amount of \$1.14. The tax was 2% of the value of the board, so the board was worth \$57.

Auction 25 Results

There were 38 bidders - several new. Overall the bids were more spread out than usual, so some real bargains were gotten.

High bid was only \$54 for lot 141 a Missouri beer. Most bids were on lot 358 a big lot of US cigarette stamps (\$1/\$3). Good returns were lot 198 a Nevada liquor (\$10/\$21), 231 an early Oregon insurance (\$10/\$16), 273 a South Dakota non-resident small game (\$22/\$26), 302 Texas Citrus (\$4/5.25), 352 the baggage stamp (\$5/\$625) and 363 the Canada non-resident

fishing shipping coupon (\$2.50/\$5.25). Most of the South Carolina clams and oysters came in over estimate.

Other heavily bids lots included 13 Alabama liquor seal (\$2/\$2.50), 55 a Florida Citrus (\$2/\$2.75), 168 Mississippi beer & wine (\$4/\$4.75), 171 another Mississippi beer & wine (\$4/\$4.75), 196 New Mexico beers (\$12/\$11) and 260 a SC oyster (\$8/\$11).

Strong areas were citrus, seafood, beers, and SD hunting. Some tough proofs, notably in Ohio were picked up dirt cheap.

A good run of gas pump seals did well.

The Sale of Bert Hubbards California Collection

On April 29th the San Francisco, California auction firm of Rumsey Schuyler place the magnificent collection of "Classic California Documentaries" of the late Elbert S.A. Hubbard onto the auction block. First, before noting the specifics of the sale, let me first quote a few passages from the introduction section which was penned by Peter Martin.

"The lots featured here represent one of the largest and most complete holdings of these rare early revenues. Included were multiples, imperfs, paper varieties, controller surcharges, star cuts, and different types, most in very fine condition. Collectors will now determine the value of these rarities because today they are being offered as UNRESERVED LOTS and will be sold to the highest bidder."

Of the 100 lots offered, 45 sold. Twelve of these went at or above the estimates. The remaining ones fetched in the arena of one-half the estimates.

The 95th and 96th lots were shall we say the spectacular stars of the show. Lot 1738 was described as 109 different 1866-69 rectangular revenues "these rare revenue stamps almost extinct and due to the phenomenal quality and completeness are probably impossible to duplicate" with an estimate of \$500-\$750. It fetched a whopping \$3,500.

Lot 1739 which followed was 156 1866-69 4 cent-\$56 rectangular revenues, complete set imperforate, missing only the \$38 value..many of the stamps unlisted. Estimated at \$1,500-\$2000, it went under the hammer for \$6,250.

Aside from these two lots, I'm truly of the opinion that there had to be some parties that were at best "asleep at the switch" or who fell under the false assumption that the material would be sold with extremely high reserves, which was clearly not the case.

As to how the material which was not sold, plans are being formulated as to how this will be liquidated. If you've any interest in what is available, you can contact "The Statesman", P.O. Box 304, Lynnwood, WA 98046-0304. If you've

The Sale of Bert Fusions are Tax Stamps Too!

I was surprised not so long ago during an email conversation I was having with a pretty serious collector. In his words, he "only collected stamps, not those fusions".

I have noticed here in Texas that our fusions seem to have a use period of about 3 to 4 months. It is very hard to tell the exact times as some places will sell cigarette packs with the "old" color combo for several weeks after the "new" colors can be found at other stores. The brown on white fusion that started appearing in September 2002 seems to have been replaced by a blue on pink combo which first appeared in January 2003. That said, I still see the older combo in some stores (I am writing this mid-March). I have just returned from a trip to Ohio, where I managed to save a cigarette package from the trash. It is interesting to note the red on white design is the same as Texas (other than color and state name). I am not sure who makes the fusions, but I imagine most states buy from one company.

Although no where as sexy as paper stamps, fusions still fill the role as a tax stamp, and deserve a place in your collection! With a use period of only a few months, it is very important for collectors to take the time to save decent examples, if for no other reason than to preserve their existence.

Hubbard's 1992 catalog specifically excluded fusions, noting: "too fragile and faintly visible unused". As a result, there are very few documented fusions. The occasional mention has been made through the years in the SRN, but by and large, we are missing the vast majority of fusions



State Profits from Drug Stamp Taxes

This was sent in by member Ivan Pfalser who lives in Kansas. As many people are finding this quite bizarre, I am reprinting it. Editor.

Here's a rare bright spot in the state budget: Income from taxes on marijuana, cocaine and other illegal drugs is up this year.

Say what?

Believe it or not, state tax collection on marijuana increased by 3.6 percent from \$139,227 to \$144,236, in the first half of this fiscal year. And tax collections on cocaine, methamphetamine and other hard drugs are up a whopping 20.6 percent, from \$252,515 to \$304,905.

Perhaps an explanation is in order.

The state taxes marijuana and cocaine just as it does such legal products as alcohol and cigarettes.

It even issues a gold foil "drug tax stamp" showing a marijuana leaf, a vial of cocaine and three pills. The stamps come in handy denominations from \$10 to \$1,000.

Illegal drugs have their own tax table. For example, there are three different rates for marijuana:"wet plant", "dry plant" and "processed".

Under the relevant state law, "the drug tax is due as soon as the dealer takes possession of the marijuana or controlled substance," according to the state Department of Revenue's Web site.

Dealers are supposed to "attach the stamp to the marijuana and/or controlled substance immediately after receiving the substance."

Although it sounds pretty goofy, the drug tax actually makes sense on several fronts, officials said.

For one thing, it allows the state to seek civil penalties from dealers regardless of the outcome of any criminal prosecution, said Bob Longino, director of the Division of Alcohol Beverage Control, the branch of the Revenue Department that administers the program.

And while federal law allows the seizure of assets used in the drug trade, the state tax law throws a broader dragnet. The state can seize any property owned by the drug dealer - whether it's used in the drug trade or not - to satisfy an outstanding tax



obligation, Longino said.

No one seriously suggests that drug pushers, who by definition are breaking the law, are buying tax stamps.

"Just about the only people who buy those are stamp collectors" said Sen. Stan Clark R-Oakley, a member of the Assessment and Taxation Committee.

"My son and I collect stamps, but we didn't want that kind of public exposure," he laughed.

He needn't have worried too much.

The Revenue Department is well aware of the collector interest in its stamps, Longino said. "That's about all we sell."

In fact, the department's Web site even has a "frequently asked questions" page about the drug tax stamps. One of the questions is "Can I purchase drug tax stamps through the mails?"

The answer is "Yes." But, "the purchaser will need to provide their mailing address in order for the department to send drug tax stamps."

You might think it would take a pretty dim witted drug dealer to fall for that.

But the Revenue Department assures that drug stamp purchases are anonymous - and information is not shared with law enforcement - to protect the stamp buyers' constitutional right not to incriminate themselves in a crime.

Because the tax usually is collected only after a drug dealer is arrested, 75 percent of the money goes to the local law enforcement agency while 25 percent goes to the state general fund.

Last year, Sedgwick County got \$54,000 in drug-tax proceeds, finance department records show.

In the last session of the Legislature, lawmakers working to close a \$700 million-plus budget gap voted to raise the tax on cigarettes by 55 cents a pack - but left the marijuana and drug tax rates untouched.

How fair is that?

Not very, several lawmakers said.

"I guess maybe nobody thought about it", said House Majority Leader Clay Aurand, R-Courtland. His guess was that legislators were busy looking for big money and overlooked small ticket items like the drug tax.

Yet, it's probably the one tax increase even the most anti-tax legislator could love. "The standard argument is that if you raise taxes too much, people won't buy the product," Aurand said. "There's no reason not to double it," he said.

Okmulgee Trade Scrip

I don't know if the SRS members are familiar with the Standard Catalog of Depression Scrip of the United States by Ralph A. Mitchell and Neil Shafer. The Okmulgee Trade Script is listed on pages 212-213. The only information they provided beyond that in the article in the last issue is that the \$1.00 denomination was the only one issued, there are two varieties of signatures on the front (handwritten or handstamped), and that a large group of these notes came on the market in the late 1970's.

"Script" and "Scrip" are two entirely different words that get confused. "Script" is a printing term referring to a style of font, while "scrip" is a form of money. Obviously, the designer of the Okmulgee issue got it confused too!

Mississippi Levee Tags

In the 4th quarter 2000 SRN Terence Hines did an article on Mississippi Levee tags indicating they were pre-1895. A letter uncovered from James Seville, a cotton dealer and the SRS's oldest continuous member, to George Cabot in 1939 indicates they may be from 1939.

"Have not hear[d] from you since my last letter, however I ran into the enclosed Mississippi levee tax tags which I thought might interest you. We get these on cotton that comes from Mississippi where they have levees to keep up or build. I understand the planters in these districts [have] to pay \$1 a bale tax on cotton raised

in these districts to pay for levees. As they are on cotton the tags are not in very good shape. I have sent one with my compliments. If you want more I have a few but they are not as clean as the one enclosed".

The one that was enclosed is the same red tag as the one illustrated in Hines' article.



Interesting Auction Lot by Scott Troutman

Shown is lot 322 from auction 26. This is a very odd stamp because of the rouletting on it. It appears at first to be a Wisconsin W103. The 1968 W103 should be rouletted 6 3/4, which this one is along the bottom. However, along the top this stamp has distinctive 3 roulettes. Vertically it has black 9 roulettes. Roulettes are measured by how many nibs are in each 20 centimeters (same as perforations). If you have other stamps from this 1968 series, you may want to check the rouletting closely and see what you have.



Washington Cigarette Commemorative

Commemoratives on cigarette stamps and decals, those most utilitarian of all state revenues are quite rare, so when I got a chance to illustrate only the second one I know of, I thought I would do so. Shown is a used copy of Washington State Hubbard C15, which commemorates the 50th anniversary of Washington State. The design features a green pine tree in the center and the wording "Golden Jubilee" around the top. Curiously, the only other cigarette commemorative is also from 1939. It is a stamp from Oklahoma celebrating the oil industy.

This decal is listed in the Hubbard catalog as being green on yellow on a yellow card. I think the color would more appropriatedly be called green on gold.



New Mexico Cigarette Permit

A friend of mine named Dale Amerman found this most unusual "on piece" usage of a New Mexico cigarette permit from July 1, 1965 to June 30, 1966 still attached to a large chuck of a window pane. These water decals were issued by the Luxury Tax Division of the Bureau of Revenue and

were placed on the front windows of stores selling cigarettes. The decal is black on white except for the sun symbol in the middle which is deep red. The permit number has been printed in black.

On the back in pale turquoise green are the instructions on how to mount the decal. State Revenue News
