

State Revenue News Page 3 / 2nd Quarter 2005 Perfins Found In Maryland Liquor and Wine Excise Tax Stamps by Chuck Spaulding

Chuck was putting touch-ups on this article which he passed away. He indicated that there were minor conflicts between this and Ron Lesher's article that appeared in The American Revenuer.

Many members know of the excellent article that SRS member Ronald Lesher wrote on Maryland perfins in *The American Revenuer*, Nov.-Dec. 2001, pages 124-126. Ron titled the article "The Maryland Perfins Identification Mystery: A Partial Solution". The purpose of this article is to show members what the perfins he wrote about looked like. Maybe members can add to the designs shown. They are small designs with a letter over a number. The three basic types are **D/#**, **M/# and W/#**. These Ron had identified to be for County **D**ispensaries, **M**anufacturers and **W**holesalers.

Figure 1 shows the liquor and wine excise tax stamps in which these designs are found. Our research for the revenue perfins project has discovered a total of

fifty-four designs. In all the years that I've been collecting perfins I've discovered only nineteen of them. Revenue perfins project members are responsible for discovering the other twenty five designs and reporting them to me. Many of them are scarce perfins. With the help of SRS members there may be more to be discovered.

I've set the perfins designs into three

figures. The abbreviations for liquor and wine stamps are Li and Wi.

Figure 2 shows the designs that were used by two different county dispensaries in Maryland. There may be perfin designs D/3 and D/4 etc. to be discovered.

Figure 3. Shows twenty two M/# designs that were used by liquor and wine manufacturers.

Figure 4 shows thirty W/# designs that

were used by wholesalers of liquor and wine. Note that there are two types of perfin designs for W/17, W/27, W/38, W/ 39 and W/59.

There is a serious chance that I have lost my mind, but I have started work on a replacement for the two Hubbard catalogs. At this writing in mid April I am well at work re-keying in the entire pair of catalogs, a huge job that will take me many months. I am up to Michigan, with Oklahoma, North Carolina and South Carolina also done.

I have created a battle plan that goes roughly as follows:

- A. Key in and merge the existing two catalogs and change to SRS standardized suffixes.
- B. Add in Bill Smiley's work on bingo stamps, the ABNC specimens, and the tags from the recent Nutmeg auctions.
- C. Apply new finds and information from the SRN from 1968 to present.
- D. Apply the auction results from the SRS Auctions and adjust prices.
- E. Find other auction results and price lists and adjust prices (Eric Jackson auctions, future Nutmeg sales, ARA, Rumsey Hubbard sale, J.L. McGuires, and if possible dealer stocks).
- F. Renumber the whole thing.
- G. Lay it out and add the illustrations.
- H. Print it.

From what I have done so far, if I just multiply the Hubbard values by 10 and convert the mysterious "c"'s "s"'s and "r"'s into some kind of monetary terms and merge the two catalogs, it is amazing how much better it is right there. The interface between the two existing catalogs is far rougher than even I realized it was. A problem in the last auction where Volume I and Volume II had different numbers for the same stamp showed me how bad it is. There is a lot more of that than I realized.

Applying the SRN material I do not think will take that long.

Adjusting the prices is going to be a big job. I have already done that making the new North Carolina, Oklahoma and South Carolina catalogs. Pricing remains a dark art and at some point I would like to bump my guesses against some major dealers stocks to get a sanity check. Some areas like soft drinks and oysters have risen substantially, while some of the documentary's have not, and other stamps with huge stocks available, like Iowa cigarettes or Indiana intangibles, will be cheapos forever.

There are several other things I am shooting for. The catalog will be 8-1/2x11 made for three ring binders. And it will be upright like the Wooton catalog, not sideways like it is now. That may be a mistake for me personally, but I can see the benefit long haul. The big benefit is that if a new set of stamps is released or new types of stamps surface we can release updates. I say binders because this thing is going to get large. North Carolina and Oklahoma both run about 30 pages formatted out.

The catalogs will be organized within each state by subject order (Bedding, Beer, Cigarettes....Wine). Specimens and proofs will be at the end of each state. Not the hodgepodge of the current catalogs. The type size will be 10 point like the *SRN*, not the 6 point size of the current catalog. My eyes are getting to bad to read it.

Hawaii will not be included unless new issues surface. The old revenues from the pre-state period are already well covered in the Scott Specialized catalog.

The big open question is whether to renumber everything. There is value in continuity with the old numbers, especially for dealers. But some of the states are in just horrendous order (California in particular). I want the subject heading to match what is on the stamps as much as possible. Thus in Georgia I plan to split out the cigar stamps, oyster stamps and shrimp stamps. In California I want to have Bill of Lading and Exchange and Attorney stamp sections. Lumping them all under documentary works well on the federal stamps, but not so well here. The bingo stamps are a particular challenge as what they have on them changes from state to state. They will all have the same prefix, but the heading may change from state to state (Public Utility, Tractor-trailer, Interstate Commerce).

I will also add in the tags and eggs and some other areas Hubbard left out. There will be new areas like the Colorado lab fees and California DMV stamps that appeared after the old catalog.

The pictures are my big terror. I have a tiny fraction of the stamps. Where possible I want to have real scans of the stamps. I may ask some of you to give me Page 5 / 2nd Quarter 2005

a hand scanning or to send me clean copies. The problem is you don't need every stamp, just one out of each set. And if worse comes to worse you'll get the old pictures.

What I am not going to do is to slow down. I would love to have this out by Christmas 2006, but whatever is coming out will be out by the end of 2007. There is no point in doing this at the glacial pace of the individual catalogs. So if you want to help - help. But move fast. If you can supply pictures or copies of the stamps not in the current catalogs, get ready and send them. Don't wait for me to ask. If you have some rarity no one knows about and want it in the catalog, send a picture of it and a catalog worthy description (color, perforations, size etc.)

I may need help with editing. I would like to use people working on the individual state catalogs. But I need quick turnaround. If you are going to take months or years to get back to me, I'm moving on without your input.

The new catalog may be released in pieces just due to the sheer size. But it will be in alphabetical chunks of states. All in all this is one huge project. In the end I may have to self publish this to get it out, though it would be better if it can be done through the SRS. Catalogs deteriorate from the day they are created, so we can't wait months and years for reviews. I would love to see them come out serialized like Mobile Post Office Society does their railroad postmark catalogs, or the Perfins group does their catalogs.

I want to add, please don't stop work on the individual states projects. There is still a need for those. Detail out the laws, show the stamps with better pictures, show all the varieties. I will probably not replicate Matesen's work on Utah beer labels, and I may skip on the first go around the Ohio sales tax. Those could use a catalog of there own (actually there was one at one time).

Wish me luck.

Editors Note - This originally appeared in a series of articles in Weekly Philatelic Gossip in the October 30, 1948 and November 13, 1948 under the title Kentucky State Revenues. As the information is excellent and the magazine is not something the average reader is likely to have easy access to, I was asked to reprint these articles. I have modified the numbering to match the Hubbard Volume II catalogs to make his discussion easier to follow. The Hubbard catalog the original article referenced was apparently an older working copy. This article was left over from the Kentucky issue.

IMPORT LIQUOR ISSUES OF THE KENTUCKY TAX COMMISSION IMPORT TAX PAID

First Issue. Date?.

These stamps were designed to be placed over the cork and neck of individual bottles, similarly to the federal liquor strip stamps. However, it is probably they were used in multiples on cases or on permits. Second Issue. Date?



IL9a

Typeset. Black roulette horizontally, colorless roulette vertically. Design 25x17mm in black on papers varying in color for each value.

The 1/2 pint green was distributed in sheets of 48 (4x12). Each sheet has a straight edge on all four sides and there is no serial number and no selvage. The stamps are ungummed and watermarked (LEGION BOND) appears once on each sheet so that stamps may be found either showing part of this watermark or unwatermarked.

The 1 pint yellow was distributed in sheets of 24 (4x6). Straight edged and watermarked as in preceding paragraph. I have a single copy with much thinner lettering--probably an early printing.

The 1 quart blue was distributed in



Kentucky IL2

They are typeset in black on ungummed, watermarked paper varying in color with each denomination. Measure 144x14mm. They have straight edges at the right and left sides and are rouletted horizontally in black. Some copies have straight edges at top or bottom. I do not know the sheet arrangement, but judging by the 25x17 mm. stamps, to be described later, the pint probably came 24 to a sheet and the quart 12 to the sheet.

IL1--1 pint, black on orange-yellow

a. black on orange yellow [this became IL4 later]

- IL2--1 quart, black on blue
 - a. black on pale gray blue

sheets of 12 (4x3). Straight edged and watermarked as described under the 1/2 pint.

Possibly at the same time, due to printers vagaries these three stamps also appeared rouletted horizontally and perforated 12 1/2 vertically. The sheet arrangement, watermarks, etc., correspond to the rouletted issues.

IL6--1/2 pint black on green

- a. -- Rouletted by perforated
- IL7--1 pint black on yellow
 - a. --thin letters
- b. --rouletted by perforated
- IL9--1 quart black on blue
 - a. --rouletted by perforated

As regards the 1/5 black on rose,

Hubbard's IL8, I again quote:

"Very seriously doubt that the fifth gallon rose, number IL8 exists. My reason for this is that at the time these were issued a fifth gallon carried the quart stamp". [Does not say who is quoting].

I have had submitted to me numerous copies of the fifth gallon rose which were believed to be IL8 or IL16. Invariably they have proven to be later issue (IL22). Anyone who can supply me with IL8, IL16, IL17 and IL17a will earn my undying gratitude and a suitable cash reward.

The sheet arrangements previously described seem rather odd until one notes that the tax is expressed, "5c per gallon". At the time these stamps were issued standard cases of whiskey contained three gallons made up either as 48 half-pints, 24 pints or 12 quarts. Therefore the tax per case was fifteen cents irrespective of what size bottle the case contained. Carrying out this idea we find the face vale of each half pint stamp to be .003125c, the one pint .00625c and the one quart to be .0125c. I believe it highly probable that either entire sheets were used on permits or as case stamps, or possibly the stamps were separated for use on individual bottles as the exigencies of the situation required. Inasmuch as all sheets were issued without gum, it would prove to be rather a task for the wholesaler to gum each individual stamp and affix it to a bottle so that case or permit use is highly probable.

The Tax Commission also issued a one barrel stamp. I do not know to which series it belongs but it is extremely scarce, possibly even more so that the oleomargarine stamp. I have in my collection a copy which I obtained from Mr. Cabot and which is the only one I have seen. Would like to know if others exist. This stamp is imperforate and ungummed. It is typeset in black on pink paper with the design measuring 113x63mm. Watermarked "LEGION BOND".

IL3--1 barrel, black on pink.

KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE



Hubbard No. IL3

The Reorganization Act, which went into effect March 7, 1936, created the Department of Revenue which apparently took over the functions of the Tax Commission. It also provided for the appointment of a Commissioner of Revenue, "whose term of office is not affected by the fiscal year, but who is appointed by the Governor and is subject to removal by him at his pleasure and who serves until his successor is appointed."

Under the provisions of this Act, our first Commissioner, Dr. James W. Martin, must have been instructed by the House of Representatives to raise the wind and as a result several new taxes were imposed. Where before this time, presumably, only whiskey imported from outside the state had been required to have stamps, this Act imposed new taxes as follows:

Chapter 3, Special Revenue Session of 1936, Section 2:

(a) bottle drinks-1c for each 5c of retail price.

(b) syrup-76c per gallon-stamps not required

(c) candies-20% of the retail selling price

(d) ice cream-7c per quart

(e) chewing gum-1c per 5c pkg.

(f) cosmetics-20% of the invoice price

(g) nuts-20% of the retail selling price

As well as continuing the existing taxes on imported whiskey.

In addition to the above, taxes were also imposed upon cigarettes, domestic whiskey, beer and wines. The effective date of the act as far as stamps is concerned was: Quoting from the above act, Section Nineteen:

"...pending preparation of stamps and crowns and the creation of necessary administrative set-up, the effective date of Section Two of the Act shall be one o'clock A.M. July 1, 1936.

ISSUES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

After the creation of the Department of Revenue the use of the Import Tax Paid stamps was presumably continued but the designs were altered so that the wording was changed to read "Kentucky Department of Revenue". A new value (1 miniature) was added. The quarter gallon 25x17mm, the pint and quart 144x14mm, and the barrel disappeared. Perhaps there was a large stock of these four Tax Commission stamps left over, sufficient for use until 1938 when this particular tax was discontinued, but at any rate, I have never come across any of these four stamps bearing the Kentucky Department of Revenue inscription.

Hubbard IL8 the miniature stamp

The miniature black on pink measures 20x10mm and is perforated 12 1/2 x 12 1/2. It was issued in ungummed sheets of 192 stamps (12x16). Each sheet has straight edges on the left side, the top and

right side. Bottom of sheet is perforated with a wide straight edge selvage. Vertical perforations pass through the selvage to the bottom edge of the sheet. Serial number, in black is on selvage at left lower corner under stamp No. 181. Sheet watermarked LEGION BOND. All copies I have seen do not read KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE but merely DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE.

Apropos of Miniatures:

Chapter 146, Sec. 6, 1934 reads:

"...all such sales shall be in unbroken packages in either pint or quart sizes and the same shall not be opened or the contents of any part consumed on the premises where purchased."

Chapter 2, Sec. 2. Special Session of 1936, May 1, 1936:

"The last paragraph of Section 6 [above] is hereby repealed -- and re-enacted to read as follows: 'All such sales shall be in unbroken packages in either quart, one fifth gallon, pint and half pint sizes, and shall not be consumed on the premises except in the case of spirituous liquors which are contained in two ounce or less containers, that said containers shall not be sold by any licensed dispensary unless such dispensary has obtained a license to sell spirituous liquors by the drink. That the tax levied upon spirituous liquor contained in two ounce containers or containers less in size shall be two cents upon each such container of spirituous liquor'."

Chapter 2, Sec. 18 1/2, Regular Session 1938.

"The Department of Revenue is hereby authorized to issue a Railroad System License [which] authorizes the sale of alcoholic beverages at retail by the drink or by the package upon any train operated by it in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, which includes a dining car; provided sales are made only while said train is in motionunder this section shall be permitted to retail alcoholic beverages in unbroken packages smaller than one-half pint and shall be permitted to purchase alcoholic beverages from non-residents."

March 7, 1938, all trafficking in miniatures was prohibited, except as to railroads.

Hubbard IL9 the 1/2 pint

The half pint was issued black rouletted horizontally by perforated 12 1/2 vertically in ungummed sheets of 48 stamps (4x12). Top of sheet, right side and bottom have straight edges. Left side is perforated with a straight edge selvage. Roulette is not continued through the selvage. Serial number, in black is on the selvage to the left of stamps 41 and 45. Sheet is watermarked LEGION BOND.

The one pint is horizontally rouletted in black, perforated vertically, and ungummed. It was distributed in sheets of 24 (4x6). There are two varieties of sheets. The more common sheet has straight edges at the top, right side and bottom. The left side is perforated with straight edge selvage like the half pint. Serial number, in black, is on selvage to left of and approximately opposite stamps 13 and 17. Watermark is TA-NON-KA BOND. The scarcer sheet has straight edges on all four sides, no selvage and no serial number. Watermark is LEGION BOND. Stamps from this sheet may be identified only if they have a straight edge at the left.

A minor variety, which is not found in the scarcer sheet but appears to be constant in the later printings of the commoner type, is the presence of a defective M in DEPARTMENT in stamp number 13. I have found this on sheet number 383808 and numbers 323616 to 323623 inclusive. Sheet number 47502 has a normal M so the defective type is probably a later printing due to wear.

I have not seen copies of either the fifth gallon or the quart 25x17mm stamps of this issue though both are listed in Hubbard's catalogue. I believe the listing of this issue should be as follows:

- IL13--1 miniature black on pink 20x10mm perforated 12 1/2
- IL14--1/2 pint black on green, 25x17mm, black horizontal roulette, perforated 12 1/2 vertically
- IL15--1 pint black on yellow, 25x17mm black horizontal roulette, perforate 12 1/2 vertically
 - a.--Straight edge at left. Watermark

LEGION BOND. b.--Defective M in DEPARTMENT IL16--1/5 gallon black on rose(?). IL17--1 quart black on blue(?). a--roulette both ways (?).

In regard to IL16, IL17, IL17a, I am inclined to believe they do not exist. I challenge any one to produce them. I have found, from a rather extensive correspondence, that much confusion exists between the issues of the Kentucky Tax Commission and the Kentucky Department of Revenue.



Hubbard IL21 1 pint

A second series of the Department of Revenue Import Tax Paids were issued possibly late in 1937 or early in 1938. They are similar in design to the preceding issue but the wording "5c per gallon" was changed to "5c Proof Gallon". The only values known are the one pint and fifth gallon. As before the pint comes in ungummed sheets of 24 (4x6) rouletted horizontally in black and perforated 12 1/ 2 vertically with TA-NON-KA BOND watermark. Straight edges at top, right side and bottom. Perforated at left with straight edge selvage. Serial number on selvage is at left, opposite stamps 17 and 21. The defective M does not occur in this issue but I have seen sheets in which thee is a distinctly printed dot over the V of Revenue on stamp number 3.

The fifth gallon comes in sheets of 12 (4x3), straight edges, etc., as described for the pint. Serial number in black is on selvage, to left, approximately in the center. Watermark is HAMMERMILL BOND. I have seen one sheet on which the serial number is in red, and located on the selvage to left of stamp number 5.

In the case of the "fifths" which I believe first appeared at this time, a standard case contained 12 "fifths" or 2 4/ 10 gallons. The tax per case was therefore

12c and the face value of each individual stamp was one cent. Somewhat different from today with the present tax of 26c per fifth!

The Import Tax was withdrawn in May of 1938 and since then no stamps of this type have been used.

EXPORT SPIRITS



Hubbard EL1 export liquor

Also issued in 1936. Designed to be used on spirits manufactured in Kentucky and shipped outside the state. They Measure 87x43mm. They are printed in black on different colored papers. All bear a control number in red. Sheet arrangement is unknown to me but I have seen copies perforated on all four sides and others with one or more straight edges. Stamps are ungummed and beat a sheet watermark, apparently LEGION BOND. These stamps were used temporarily prior to the issuance of the decalcomanias. All values are very scarce.

EXPORT WINE

An export wine stamp similar in design to the export spirits is listed as appearing in 1936, and probably served the same purpose as the Export Spirits. Only one value is listed but there may have been others. I have no information on this stamp nor have I seen a copy. Probably very scarce inasmuch as Kentucky is not famous for the amount of wine it exports.

My short item on the Connecticut cigarette floor tax stamp and cigarette tax rate increase in the 3rd quarter 2004 SRN (# 262, p. 15) contained several errors and did not tell the full story of the recent Connecticut cigarette tax increases. The listing below corrects those errors and fills in the missing parts of the story.

Before April 3, 2002:

Tax rate 2.5 cents per cigarette.

- Packs of 20: tax is \$.50, paid by a yellow fusion decal.
- Packs of 25: tax is \$.625, paid with an orange fusion decal or a red water transfer decal.

April 3, 2002 to March 14, 2003:

Tax rate 5.55 cents per cigarette.

- Packs of 20: tax is \$1.11 paid by green fusion decal.
- Packs of 25: tax is \$1.3875 paid by blue decal, format unknown.
- Floor tax stamps for use on packs already stamped for previous rate:

Packs of 20: .61 red.

Packs of 25: .7625 brown.

March 15, 2003 to date.

Tax rate is 7.55 cents per cigarette.

- Packs of 20: tax is \$1.51, purple fusion decal.
- Packs of 25: tax is \$1.8876, tan decal format unknown.

Connecticut Cigarette North Dakota Mule

The 1962 North Dakota mule deer stamp, a rather nondescript issue picturing a running deer as seen through a rifle scope, is primarily known through its number of color varieties. Previously this stamp was known in three color schemes: black on green, black on blue and black on white. The black on green stamp is he most common as for a number of years it was occasionally included in the packets of free stamps given to collectors who requested them.

A fourth variety has now surfaced. This stamp is of the same design but has a deep pink background. Noteworthy is the fact that the serial number on this stamp has an "A" prefix. The black on green variety has no letter prefix before the serial number, the black on blue variety has a

Kansas Duck Stamp Error

Earlier this year Linn's Stamp News noted a peculiar pane of 30 1988 Kansas \$3 Canada Geese stamp (Scott No. 2), shown cropped below, that contains just one error stamp. The first stamp in the bottom row of five stamps in missing its six-digit serial number, which is normally printed in the white area to the right of the stamps central image.

A significant misregistration during

printing caused the serial numbers to be applied at an angle in relation to the stamps. This made 29 of the stamps on the pane freaks, but not true errors as part of the number shows on these stamps. However, the corner stamp was missed completely making in a error.

Jeff Harkness of Kansas, who often "inquires about state duck stamp that look different from others" purchased the pane in late 1990. He had ordered some 1990 duck stamps and "received a call from the license department in Pratt, Kansas, and was told about the odd 1988 pane, which I then bought. At the time Kansas had a three year stamp destruction policy. Lucky me."

The stamps printed in the panes of 30 were made "for collectors". Stamps meant for hunters were printed in panes of 10 with no plate number in the selvage. This sheet has no plate number.

"C" prefix, and the black on white variety has a "D" prefix. It can only be assumed that stamps were issued with a "B" prefix, and as to their background color, perhaps we will someday know.

Auction Changes

by Scott Troutman

In Auction 32 you will notice two changes. In all the auctions prior to this one, each lot began with the state, date of stamp issue, and the type of stamp. For at least the next two auctions, I have dropped the date of issue. The reason is that I noticed it takes a lot of time to look up and in some cases the date is either not right or I was using the date in the perfins on the beer stamps. There are stamps where the date matters and I will still have it in the description. This saves me a lot of time (and around Christmas I was being blitzed with material coming in). If you find this was not a good move let me know.

The second change has been requested by the board. Up until now I have had you send the money to me personally, that way I can cash the checks and send the money out to the consignors quicker. I can also respond quickly if we had a misdescribed lot or some other problem. Well someone was afraid I might run off to Aruba with the money, so in the future we will have you make out the checks to the State Revenue Society, and I will have to send them on to Harold, our treasurer, for cashing and eventual payment to the consignors. The net effect is your checks will take longer to clear, the consignors will be paid slower and the whole process is more costly to the society but I can't run off to Aruba unless I sell your stamps on e-bay or take Harold with me.

Auction 32 has a lot of good material in it. The second half of a large collection of Ohio sales tax (in auction 31 every single lot from this collection sold), many Ohio specimens, long runs of Mississippi and Minnesota, many recent but hard to get scale seals for several states, and some rarely seen Michigan malt strips. And a very spectacular South Dakota hunting license with four stamps on it including a very scarce West Prairie Deer altered for a special antlerless season. Even a South Carolina terrapin stamp, a rarity that, like the terrapins, doesn't surface very often.

I don't know why but I have become convinced that if I set the closing for this

auction for New Years, some of you would still be sending in bids on New Years Eve. There are advantages to sending bids in quickly (you may win a tie breaker), none in sending them in late. This is not E-bay. One bidder missed out last auction because the bids showed up days after the bidding closed. And what was really strange is this bidder usually uses e-mail to bid.

Ira Cotton reports this eBay item: 7128832264 California 1923 fishing license. Sold for \$762! This pictorial license appeared in pristine condition but my guess is that the high price was because it was overprinted in red "Duplicate License", making it a very rare item. All of these early pictorial California licenses are popular, but have recently sold in the \$25-\$50 range for fine condition. A 1912 Nebraska hunting & fishing license (Item 7135332160) brought \$230.27. Nebraska Game & Parks has a display of old licenses but lacked this one. Although not stamps, many of our members also collect licenses.

Scott Troutman reports that a North Carolina Sales Tax coupon eBay item 5565522983 brought \$78. This was the McLellan Stores #L22 in Malehorn & Davenport (Hubbard ST8) which appeared to be in mint condition. A used copy with only one stub left sold for \$36 as eBay item 5567773419.

Scott also reports a South Carolina Terrapin stamp (T1) which brought \$22.38 as eBay item 5567349357. This price is probably more a result of the unusual tax than rarity. I have seen others offered but did not track.

Marion County Kansas duck stamps are for sale in Bennett auction. Will report when I see prices realized.

Prices realized in April 1-2 Auction 287 of Matthew Bennett are now posted at bennettstamps.com. This included better Honey Lake California, California "no fee", Illinois daily usage, Marion County Kansas ducks, and Indian reservation stamps. Top realization of \$12,000 was for a 1948-49 Kansas license with Marion Co. duck (A8), Marion County fish, Kansas quail, and federal duck all on a clean license. Certainly a showpiece! Top price for a Honey Lake was 1972 Scott to meet the reserve.

Page 14/ 2nd Quarter 2005 Short Lived North Carolina Agriculture Commissioner

The odd political career of Britt Cobb as Agricultural Commissioner has produced a scale seal with a name on it that may become as hard to find in the future as the signature of David Coltrane¹ is on the North Carolina dog food, feed and vegetable seed stamps.

Democrat Britt Cobb first went after the job of Commissioner of Agriculture in the 2001 primary election against fellow Democrat Meg Scott Phipps. Cobb lost. However, the election was a bitter one and it wasn't long before allegations of a major scandal turned up against Phipps. After a two year long court battle, Meg was found guilty of election fraud and resigned the office.

The Democrats had controlled the powerful Department of Agriculture for over a century and Democratic Governor Mike Easley wasn't about to change things. He appointed Britt Cobb to fill Meg Scott Phipps' position until the 2004 election.

However, the election scandel had taken its toll, and Republican tobacco farmer Steve Troxler, who had lost to Phipps in 2001, ran again against the seemingly unbeatable Cobb. Come election day some three million North Carolinians voted but at the end of the night Troxler led by a mere 2,300 votes. But some 4,438 votes had disappeared from a single voting machine - the results of a software glitch. However, the machines were new, and not wanting to be in a Florida situation in the presidential election, Carteret County had had everybody vote by ballot also.

Ugly politics raised its head. Cobb's lawyers argued for a new statewide election to resolve the problem, with the Democratic majority on the election board ignoring the votes and trying to go Cobb's way. Troxler could show with the votes properly counted, Carteret County's votes would have still given him the win. State and federal judges would have no part of the elections board's effort to give Cobb another chance when the duplicate ballots were sitting there. On February 5th, 2005², after three months of turmoil and seeing the handwriting on the wall, Britt Cobb threw in the towel and conceded he had lost.

Interesting Auction Lots

Lot 165 in Auction 32 is a Minnesota motor vehicle transfer file fee stamp. This is something wholly new. I have looked on the Minnesota state web sites and can find nothing on it. The stamp is black on orange feturing the seal of Minnesota and a \$1.00 charge. At the bottom is the notation "SECTRETARY OF STATE". The design is about 21x23mm but the overall dimentions are about 25x25mm. The stamps has a serial number overprinted in silver. The assumption is these covered a fee for transfering title on a motor vehicle.

In lot 223 are six New York cigarette stamps, five decals and a heat fusion which to not appear to have been cataloged. Two appear to be from a set Hubbard calls 1959?. These include a 20 (cig?)lilac and a 2ct purple stamp (C41A and C43)

respectively. Next is the counterfeit stamp shown in the last issue of the SRN actually used. This decal is about 11x14. Yet another apparently later decal is for 20 cigarettes, red on white, 12-1/2x18mm. 20's are in the lower corners and the overall design is reminiscent of a NC soft drink. The last decal is similar to C12 with a map outline in the middle but values only in the lower two corners. This stamp has a black design on deep orange, 12x15mm.

Lastly there is a heat fusion with tiny wording "STATE/&/CITY OF/NEW YORK". The design is in black on white, with the bottom half gold and a magenta safety. Size is 11x11.



State Revenue News Auction 31 Was Huge in Many Ways

This was a truly huge auction with more lots than we have ever run before, as many sellers as we have ever had and more bidders than ever before (52). A few got skunked but most folks got something. We sold almost \$3,000 worth of stamps.

the Pennsylvania Radnor \$100 real estate (20/26), and 464 the hunting hodgepodge (50/26). Other hot lots were 131 Kansas upland game (7/11), 132 Kansas wines (8/12), 139 LA documentary (1.50/55), 251 Ohio sales tax (7.50/11) and 275 an Ohio liquor seal (1.50/2.50)

Other good realizations înclude lot 20 AZ luxury (\$1.50/\$3.25), 87 Iowa oleo



Philadelphia Documentaries: More Info

A long letter written by Herbert C. Gross Jr. to the late Elbert Hubbard in June 1955 has been found.. The letter is three pages long and some is repetitive of what was given in the recent articles by Jack Stewart et. al in the 3rd quarter 2004 SRN¹. Herb Gross appears to have been a collector with some inside contacts. Information that has not been reported has been extracted. In addition, letters from Maurice Fox were found later after the first article was published. Thanks to Romie Coltrin and Mack Matesen for providing the original copies to the SRS library.

HERB GROSS LETTER

"From 1937 to 1952 inclusive, these stamps were used for general documentary tax purposes on deeds, judgement notes, property transfers of all kinds, wills, trust accounts, sheriff sales, etc.

This ordinance was repealed December 9, 1952, just a few months after the Democratic administration took office and established a more efficient administrative system. I find that records are available from January 1, 1953 to date, but prior to this, everything is shrouded in mystery and indifference. Starting January 1, 1953, the stamps were used only for the real estate transfer tax and affixed to deeds. All of the stamps in the hands of title companies, banks, loan agencies, recorder of deeds, prothonotaries's office, and numerous other retail outlets turned in their remainders to the city for credit and henceforth stamps were issued only to the following banks as collection agents for the Commissioner of Revenue:

Philadelphia Title Insurance Company Commonwealth Title Company Land Title Bank and Trust Company Frankford Trust Company Broad Street Trust Company Tax Collection Office (City Hall).

The Broad Street Trust Company merged with Commonwealth Title Company about June of 1953, hence there have been only five agents since that time. The \$500 and \$1,000 denominations were first issued some time in January or February 1953, and records show that 2/ 3rds of the high value stamps were sold by the Commonwealth Title Company.

The following numbers of each denomination were sold in 1953. [note the author did not think the 1 cent and 50 cent existed-Hubbard knew otherwise]

These totals are not exact for the 5ct to \$100 denominations, since there was not sufficient time to check the addition of long rows and columns of figures beyond the first two significant figures (the other digits were estimated). However, I am certain the errors cannot exceed plus or minus 5%. The total sales of the \$500 and \$1000 stamps are exact.

....The sales figures for 1954 were not detailed since the distribution of the denominations appeared to be very close to the 1953 data except that the totals were about 20% higher (which is in accordance with the increase in revenue reported for 1954).

These real estate transfer tax stamps are identical with the old documentary tax stamps and the remainders credited in 1953 were about 25% of the above totals. Since all of these remainders were re-issued as real estate transfer tax stamps, all mint stamps prior to current supplies must be practically nonexistent.

The demand for the 10 cent denomination has always, for some reason, been very low; hence, all 10ct stamps have been printed by the Elliot Company. This explains the odd perforation of 14x14 1/2 found on this stamps, which is virtually the same as the 1938 issue. I have seen several color and perforation varieties but I cannot tell yet what is normal and what is not. The Wright Company refuses to give any information about any of their printing work since too many collectors have been bothering them for details....

The description of the higher values is as follows:

\$10 Official Color Purple, Quantity printed

50,000 on 11/6/53, 9/15/54 and 3/3/55. \$50 Official Color Orange, Quantity printed 30,000 on 11/6/53 and 3/17/55

\$100 Official Color Magenta, Quantity printed 20,000 on 11/6/53.

\$500 Official Color Terra Cotta, Made up in 20 sheets of 5 stamps per book with red stub no. in book starting at 01001 on 11/6/ [53]. This indicates 2000 copies exist.

\$1000 Official Color Brown. 10 sheets of 5 stamps per book - red stub no. starting at 00501. This indicates 1,500 copies exist. 1,000 were printed on 11/6/53.

The \$10-\$100 had 20 stamps on a sheet. All these were on a 1st quality tropical gummed paper. All sheets are completely perforated; hence there are no straight edges. The centering on the stamps being sold today is generally poor..."

COMMENTS BY JACK STEWART.

The Herbert C. Gross letter of June 1955 is most interesting. In reading it, I find the statement that the stamps were used on "...wills, trust accounts..." to be incorrect. My practice as an attorney was limited to that area of the law covering those two fields and definitely the stamps were not required there. I mention this only to avoid someone, in seeking the stamps, might search for old wills or trust accounts in endeavoring to acquire stamps for collecting purposes.

The problem he mentions "that everything is shrouded in mystery and indifference" in referring to the period prior to 1952 is consistent with what I was told by the Commissioner of Revenue in that records are only kept for six years unless there appears to be some historic or legal reason to retain them longer, as was mentioned in the 3rd quarter 2004 article.

Gross's statement that the stamps were only issued to certain "banks" which he names is also slightly incorrect. The institutions were actually all Title Insurance Companies or had Title work as a major part of their business. Philly, Commonwealth, and Land were exclusively Title Companies. Both Frankford and Broad Street had large Title Departments that they reinsured eventually through Commonwealth, and Land

eventually merged with Commonwealth, reducing the number even more. The Tax Collection Office (City Hall) was actually the primary source for stamps for these agents and for individuals as well.

In another matter the Cabot² catalog indicates that the 1938 issue was of a perforation 14, and that reorders in 1939 (which Cabot lists as a separate issue) were perforated 12.

MAURICE FOX LETTERS

Two additional letters surfaced more recently from among the Hubbard correspondence. The first is an undated letter from R. Maurice Fox to Herb Gross and George Cabot. Much of this letter concerned information on quantities printed.

A copy of a second letter between Maurice Fox and Frank Applegate from 1959 also was found in the Hubbard correspondence. In it Fox had had correspondence with the Director of Supplies at the Procurement Commission which brought "better results than expected" on orders for E.A. Wright stamps placed between 1958 and 1959. The catalog numbers in both letters have been altered to conform with those in the SRN 2004 3rd quarter article. The information from the two letters is summarized below.

JACK STEWART'S FIND

Lastly Jack Stewart found a deed dated October 25, 1978 with the high value \$50, \$100 and \$500 stamps. These stamps were only used for two months after that date as the change of to meter type stamps was inaugurated in 1979. It would appear that, if the starting numbers were 1001 as Gross indicated for the 1953 stamps, a 1960 issue of the smaller in size higher denominations may also have started at 1001.

- PD37 \$50 serial number 270,164, indicating about 270,000 stamps.
- PD38 \$100 serial number 380,749 and 380,750 for about 380,000 stamps.
- \$500 serial number 10,367 for about 10,000 stamps.

The \$500 PD39 is perf 12-1/2. The first small \$50 and \$100 stamps (PD27 and PD28) were perf 12, and PD37 \$50 and PD38 \$100 stamps are perf 12-1/2. I think it is very possible and reasonable to assume there are two perforations for the \$500 and the \$1,000. As the 1953 issue (the large stamps) had a \$500 and \$1,000 stamp, and with the City of Philadelphia, for file space conservation purposes having gone to the



Georgia Military Beers

I have a little more information on the Georgia military liquor stamps. I can report another (actually two) Georgia "MILI- State Revenue News TARY LIQUOR / NO GA. TAX PAID" issue. Shown are two copies of the same design stamp that is printed in black on smooth bright white paper. One stamp has the design in a heavy print while the print on the other one is significantly lighter, which I assumed were just production varieties of the same printing. Upon measuring the gauge I noted differences. The dark print is roulette 6-1/4 and the light print is roulette 7, so the two stamps are probably from different printings. Design on both is 28x32mm.



A friend of mine in the Air Force obtained both stamps for me in the mid 1980's while he was assigned to TDY in Georgia (bless him for staying sober long enough to make an addition to my collection). I also have an example of the Georgia Military Liquor stamp that you illustrated in the 1st Quarter, 2005 Newsletter and believe that it is an earlier issue, perhaps from the 1960s or even older.

letter size 8-1/2x11 inch deeds in 1960, Jack believes there is a series of perf 12 stamps of these two denominations in that year as well as the perf 12-1/2 issue. The easy way to catalog number at this point is to make:

District of Columbia Cigarette Meter

Cigarette meters were used in the District of Columbia just as they were in many states and local tax situations. However, I don't know that one has ever been illustrated before. The existence of these were noted by Harold Effner in a series of articles on cigarette meters in 1979 and 1980 and in earlier lists by the late Charles Hermann. This one is magenta or purple in color.

Featured this time are some newly reported issues from Birmingham, Alabama. The first is a dark blue on white "Bondsman License Tax" stamp for \$1.00. This is a catagory of stamp that has not been seen before. The stamp is perforated.

The second stamp is a 1ct black and yellow beer tax decal. The one shown is on a cream or yellowish safety paper with a steel mill similar to the stamp reversed reading "CITY OF/ BIRMINGHAM" in the outer circle. This beer stamp has also been seen on a green safety paper with the same reversed design. The cream card has black roulettes vertically on the card, the green card appears to be hyphen-hole rouletted.



Arkansas Piggybacks

This article has been in the pile since the Arkansas issue.

Joe Jeter sent in these two examples of first an Arkansas B31 beer piggybacked

on a Missouri B79HB beer and second an Arkansas B32 on a Missouri B81. At the time we did not have a good feel for what caused this.

We now believe this is an example where a beer distributor changed his mind on where a shipment of beer was going. He had originally planned to ship it to Missouri and had already put the tax stamps on it, but something happened where the beer was needed in Arkansas.

He restamped the beer with Arkansas stamp, in this case piggybacking the stamps on top of the Missouri stamps. There were forms he could fill out to get his money back from Missouri, or he could write it off as the cost of making the shipping change.

Free For All

This free for all is a Texas BE1 bedding stamp donated by Jerry Lurie. Somewhere he managed to find a bunch.


