**NORTH CAROLINA LINSEED OIL**

1/2¢ black on bright green surface colored paper. Appears to be die cut and padded at left. Design approximately 56x30mm.

3¢ black on light blue green paper, perforated 12. Same design as 1/2¢ but size of design 58 x 31½.

Both have Ballentine signature.



**OKLAHOMA LIQUOR**

25 x 20mm decals with white map in center. Design in black with colored background. "Oklahoma" is in red on 1/5 and black on the others.

- 1 Pint black and orange
- 1/5 Gallon black and red
- 1 Quart black and green



**HAWAII EGG INSPECTION**

1" wide green tape, 65mm high, rouletted 12½ at top and bottom.

No value Black on green

**NEW JERSEY EGG INSPECTION**

2½" wide printed tape with continuous design in dark blue with yellow circles. These are misplaced on the copy seen, but appear to belong between the two circles of the state seal.

No value Dark blue and yellow

The copy seen is a used one and while it appears to be rouletted at the sides we are not sure about it.



VIRGINIA POULTRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS TAX - No information is at hand as to how this tax, effective June 26, 1964, will be collected, but the tax would be 2¢ per 30-dozen case of eggs or 2¢ per laying hen producing such eggs when such hens are marketed, 7¢ per 100 pounds liveweight of turkeys marketed and 25¢ per thousand pounds of chicken broilers marketed.

RHODE ISLAND CIGARETTE TAX - Effective June 1, 1964, this is increased from 6¢ to 8¢ per pack. A floor stock tax of 2¢ per pack applies to the stock on hand of wholesalers and retailers on June 1, 1964. This last appears to be paid by report rather than stamps. The discount on the purchase of stamps is reduced from 4% to 3%.

VIRGINIA SWEET POTATO TAX - Effective June 26, 1964, subject to a referendum of those farmers who sold at least 300 bushels during the previous year, a 1¢ per bushel or 50 pound crate or carton tax would be levied for additional research, education, publicity, advertising and sales promotion. No mention is made of the method of collecting the tax.

COLORADO CIGARETTE TAX will go into effect July 1, 1964, with a 3¢ per pack tax.

This leaves North Carolina and Oregon the only states not having such a tax.

The new Colorado cigarette tax law does not prevent a city from imposing its own local cigarette taxes. Colorado has a number of cities which do impose such taxes.

VIRGINIA BEER TAX has been increased to \$6.00 per barrel from July 1, 1964, until June 30, 1966. After that date it will be \$3.10 per barrel. The tax was originally supposed to be reduced from \$4.00 to \$3.10 per barrel on July 1, 1964. The increased rates on bottles have been extended to June 30, 1966, also.

KANSAS CIGARETTE TAX was increased from 4¢ to 6¢ per pack on April 1, 1964.

KANSAS LIQUOR TAX rates also increased on April 1, 1964, from \$1.20 per gallon to \$1.50 per gallon 100 proof or less for the old rate. Alcohol and spirits of more than 100 proof content are reduced from \$2.40 to \$1.50, making the \$1.50 rate uniform for both classes.

SOUTH DAKOTA SUGAR BEETS AND RAW HONEY TAX - Effective July 1, 1964, a tax of 1/8 of 1 mill per 20 pounds will be levied on raw honey owned, stored, received or handled during the preceding year. A tax of 5/8 of 1 mill is levied on each ton of unprocessed sugar beets also. This does not sound like a stamp tax.

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#### NEW JERSEY TROUT STAMPS

Stamp Collectors now have an opportunity to add the sixth issue (1958) of the New Jersey Trout Fishing Stamp to their collection. There are two denominations: a \$1.00 red on white stamp for resident fishermen, and a \$5.00 black on green stamp for non-resident fishermen, which may be purchased at reduced prices.

The stamps come in sheets of ten, each stamp in the sheet being fully perforated. Collectors may purchase them in single sets, block-of-four sets or in full sheet sets. The set of two stamps (\$1.00 and \$5.00 denominations) is offered at 50¢, blocks of four at \$2.00, and in full sheets at \$5.00.

Remittances should be made by U. S. check or money order, payable to the New Jersey Division of Fish and Game. Postage stamp payments cannot be accepted because of accounting problems. Orders should be sent to: Trout Stamps, Division of Fish and Game, Box 18-9, Trenton, New Jersey, 08625.

All revenue received from the sale of these stamps is used for fish and game management.

The opportunity to secure this sixth issue of Trout Stamps in mint condition is limited to requests received before June 1, 1964. Present plans are to destroy any remainders of this limited issue after that date, as was done with the previous issues.

## NEW YORK STOCK TRANSFER STAMPS

Dr. Pruess has shown us a couple of these on what appears to be colored paper. One is a 10¢ green of the 1916-33 type which is on pink paper, and the other a \$1.00 red (#ST-150) which is on yellow surface colored paper.

We have never heard of any of these stamps on colored paper and are of the opinion that both were colored during the soaking process by transfer of color from the document to which they are attached.

Having soaked our share of these, we do know that sometimes the slips these stamps are used on are colored, and that the color runs at times. We do not see why the \$1 stamp should show so much color on the front and so little on the back. Does anyone know any more about these?

He also shows us a copy of ST134, the 50¢ yellow orange of 1932-39, with a distinctly double overprint.

MISSOURI SECURED DEBT - Dr. Pruess also shows us a 10¢ of this issue, rouletted. It has a round hole punched and no gum, although uncanceled.
