NEBRASKA FEED STAMPS AND TAGS

Kenneth P. Pruess

All Nebraska feed inspection tax stamps and tags are rather simple typeset designs; this perhaps accounts in part for their neglect by collectors. Because most of these stamps are quite similar in design, it seems possible that collectors have varieties which they have not recognized from the unillustrated listing given by Hubbard (State Revenue Catalog, 1960). The purposes of this article are to solicit information on any unlisted varieties so they can be included in the new catalog which I am preparing, and to present details on roulette varieties which I will probably cover with only a footnote in the new catalog. For the few collectors who may be interested, this article will document what little is known about these roulette varieties.

The first tax on commercial livestock feed in Nebraska resulted from a law passed by the 1911 legislature. The tax rate was 10¢ per ton and this rate remained constant throughout the period during which stamps and tags were used (1912-1945). The 1911 law provided for tags to be issued in 25, 50, and 100 lb sizes. However no appropriation was made to enforce that law and it seems doubtful that the tax was collected until 1912. The 1912 annual report of the Food, Drug, and Dairy Commission (the enforcement agency at that time) confirms the sale of tags, showing receipts of \$1686.05.

The law of 1915 provided for the use of either stamps or tags with the Food, Drug, Dairy, and Oil Commission as the enforcing agency. Although tags have been reported from 1915, the first known stamp was issued in 1919 (the

1917 date given by Cabot and Hubbard is erroneous) since it bears the name of Leo Stuhr who did not become Deputy Commissioner until that year. In late 1919, the new Department of Agriculture with Leo Stuhr as Secretary became the enforcing agency. Tags are known with Stuhr's name and appropriate title for both the Food, Drug, Dairy, and Oil Commission and the Department of Agriculture.

In 1933 the name was changed to Department of Agriculture and Inspection. Thus Hubbard's listing of these stamps has them in the wrong sequence of issuance. At this time there is no way to determine with certainty the order of issuance of the several sets printed by the Department of Agriculture and I can do little better than preserve Hubbard's method of classification.

All illustrations are slightly enlarged. All measurements of stamps refer to printed text as overall sizes vary greatly. These measurements are approximate as is rouletting since variations occur.

Roulette combinations other than those listed above occur. Some stamps will show mixed rouletting on a single side; both gaps and overlapping occur at points where rouletting is changed in horizontal rows.

It appears that this and all subsequent issues were prepared by the same printer. With sufficient multiples, it should prove possible to determine correct order of issuance from the sequence of repairs made in the rouletting equipment.

The diagram at the top of the next column will enable the interested student to determine where diffrent combinations occur in a sheet.

FLA occurs in the bottom row of a sheet of F4 (exact position unknown). I have not seen a full sheet of either F3 or F4 but it seems likely that other roulette combinations occur in both. Nor would I be surprised at the discovery of a major plate variety in F3. There is some reason to believe that these varieties were intentional, possibly to prevent counterfeiting.



STATE FORESTS HUNTING STAMPS

First issued for the 1960-61 season and required for both residents and nonresidents to hunt in the Cumberland, Appomattox-Buckingham, and Prince Edward State Forests located in counties listed on the stamps.

All stamps through the 1970-71 issue are identical 51 x $34\frac{1}{2}$ mm design size, with red serial numbers, and from sheets of 25 (5 x 5) imperforate all four sides.

Permits, of identical size and design, in use prior to the 1960-61 season were ungummed, were not required to be affixed to the hunting license, and were <u>not</u> stamps.

BATH COUNTY

Bear-Deer Damage Hunting Stamps

Required for residents and nonresidents to hunt bear or deer within county boundaries. Funds derived from sales of these stamps were used to reimburge farmers for bear and deer crop depredations.

First issued for the 1944-45 season. All stamps through the 1965-66 issue were from booklet panes of 15 (3 x 5) perforated 11 3/4 between stamps and at left selvage. All stamps 1966-67 through 1970-71 were from booklet panes of 10 (2 x 5) rouletted or perforated between stamps and at left selvage. No serial numbers on stamps prior to 1948-49. Red serial numbers on 1948-49 through 1970-71 issues. All stamps through 1970-71 believed to have been printed by the Everett Waddey Co. of Richmond, Va.



- 1944-45 \$1.00 black on yellow orange. Inscribed "Virginia Bear-Deer Damage Stamp". Black Bear. Red "BATH" overprint 5 3/4 mm high. Design size 50 x 35 mm.
- 1945-46 \$1.00 black on bluish green. Otherwise same as 1944-45.

NEW YORK STATE STOCK TRANSFER STAMPS A STUDY OF THE PLATE VARIETIES

Chas. H. Hermann and Kenneth Pruess

Issues of 1905 and 1906

There are 2 types of the \$1 (Fig. 14). Type I has fancy numeral of value and background while Type II has simple "1" on a solid background.



Fig. 21 shows the so-called "cracked




Fig. 15.- Double transfer in both top corners, left frame, etc. on Type I \$1 (ST7, 15, 23).

A very prominent double transfer on the Type I \$1 shows in both top corners and left frame (Fig. 15). A lesser double transfer shows only in top left corner (Fig. 16).




Fig. 17.- Worn plate variety of Type I \$1 (top) and recut variety (bottom). The recut occurs on ST7, 15, 23).

Fig. 17 shows an important recut on the Type I \$1 and the worn plate variety which necessitated this recut. All of the vertical lines are faint and the crosshatching between the inner and outer circles are missing. In the recut an inner line just above "OF" has been added and the inner frame line forming the 'pearls' has been recut sharply but unevenly. The vertical lines in the upper left corner were also recut and are slightly uneven. No attempt was made to recut the lines connecting the inner and outer circles to form the 'pearls'. The worn plate variety occurs only on ST7; the recut of course also occurs on ST15 and 23.




Fig. 18.- Double transfer in both top corners and at bottom on Type II \$1 (ST24).




Fig. 19.- Double transfer in top right corner on Type II \$1 (ST24).

The Type II \$1 has 2 double transfers. One (Fig. 18) shows in both top corners and very slightly at bottom. The other (Fig. 19) shows only in top right corner.

There are also 2 types of the \$2. Type II with simple value numeral on solid background did not appear until the second 1905 issue on rough yellowick warms (STIZ)

lowish paper (ST17).




Fig. 20.- Original state of Type I \$2 (listed as ST9) on left and worn plate variety (listed as ST8) on right. ST16 is also a worn plate variety of Type I.

Fig. 20 shows the original state for the Type I which has fine inner lines in the "2" and 'eyes' in the wide lobes. This stamp can be found in all stages of plate wear, ending up with a plain colorless "2" with the 'eyes' reduced to little blobs of color. Hubbard's listing of ST8 should be deleted; it is only a worn

plate of the stamp listed as ST9. The second 1905 issue (ST16) is of course from the worn plate and at best will show only traces of the inner lines.

Fig. 21 shows the so-called "cracked plate" variety of ST8 and ST9 (further proof that these are the same stamp). This variety mystifies us inasmuch as it seems to occur during all stages of plate wear but shifts ever so slightly. A true crack obviously could not move at all. Possibly this ink streak resulted from a mechanical bar to hold or move paper. Hubbard correctly reports that this line varies in length; this variation, however, is not due to extension of a nonexistent crack.

But there are real line varieties that are on the plate. The best of these has 2 fine lines at upper left, a few all over, and a conspicuous series of them across the "S" of "Dollars". These are fine like layout lines - but layout lines don't come in bunches like bananas.

No other plate varieties are known for the Type I \$2. But the true Type II

which first appeared with ST17 is loaded with double transfers. ST25 and 26 are from the same plates and of course have the same varieties; however they show far better on ST17. The \$2 values are the only really common stamps of the second 1905 issue on the rough yellowish paper. The following illustrations and their accompanying legends should suffice to describe the double transfers on the Type II \$2.




Fig. 22.- Double transfer at top, above "N" of "NEW", and beneath "TA" of "STATE", etc. on Type II \$2 (ST17, 25, 26).




Fig. 27.- Double transfer at top, both top corners, lower left corner, between outer and inner frame lines at right, through, above, and below "YORK", in and below "DOLLARS", etc. Occurs on Type II \$2 (ST17, 25, 26).


