

MORE ABOUT PRIVATE SALES TAX CARDS: CALIFORNIA, ILLINOIS, IOWA, AND KENTUCKY

In the November, 1971 State Revenue Newsletter, I discussed sales tax cards used by individual merchants in Ohio in 1935. In other areas merchants also issued their own, and as in Ohio, the purpose of them was to allow the consumer to avoid paying too much tax. In the early days of the sales tax, at the height of the depression, overpayment of sales tax was a serious issue between the merchant and his customers. One difference between Ohio and the other states was that the cards described here were not put out by the state first, but by the merchant for his own peace of mind until his customers became accustomed to the new tax. Most of the issuers were chain restaurants serving low-income clientele, and the cards were likely not in use for more than a few months in any one case. They were valid only in the store of issue and usually had at least tacit, if not active, approval of the tax agency.

The one known California card was probably used immediately after the passage of the Retail Sales Act which took effect on August 1, 1933. Each punch, or coupon (as described on the card), was good for tax on a five cent purchase, or a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ % rate,

and the card cost one cent. By reading the reverse of the card one can get some glimpse of the sales tax overcharge issue that sparked the emission of these cards and the millions of sales tax tokens used later in other states. Most of the Illinois cards were used during the same year, although earlier. Illinois had two tax rates during 1933, 3% and 2%, with the rate going back up to 3% in 1935. The companies that used them were Chicago chain restaurants, and the two known are Raklie's and Thompson's. The Raklie's came in a ticket roll and each card bore rouletted separations at each end.


The one card attributed to Des Moines is another Thompson's Restaurants piece with its design identical to the Illinois issues. In this case, though, the message to the card user was different, reading:

"...without paying further tax at any Thompson's Restaurant in any state wherein the same rate of retail sales taxation is effective. SAVE THIS CARD, money will be refunded if sales tax law is held invalid."

This paragraph probably reflects the company's concern about the tax law which was held unconstitutional in Illinois in May, 1933. The card did not clearly state that it was to be used only

in Iowa, but it has been attributed to that city by early researchers on sales tax tokens, mainly Emil DiBella and Herbert Rowold. Obviously it was meant to be used in other states, if necessary, and may actually have been used so, although there is no evidence for such a conclusion. It was likely used in Des Moines in mid-1934, just after the 2% tax took effect on April 1. Two cards are known from Kentucky and there may have been more. A large green one was used in a small town called Habit, probably issued by a general merchandise store. Another, recently located by Charles Hermann, was used by a Lexington bakery.





MINNESOTA POLLUTION TAX STAMP
Tom Betz



Commonly referred to as the "Pollution
Tax", the stamp is used to collect a
\$1 tax on transfer of vehicles, addi-
tional to the \$2 tax, for recycling of
abandoned vehicles. The tax is col-
lected on the transfer of each new and
transferred self-propelled (the key word)
vehicle weighing more than 1000 lbs
(With the exception of: vehicles pur-
chased by dealers, vehicles purchased
by governmental units or religious or
educational or charitable organizations
holding a certificate of exemption
status from the department of taxation.
It is not collected on vehicles coming
from out of state if the purchaser was
a non-resident 60 days prior to pur-
chasing the vehicle, and is not appli-
cable to common carriers holding a di-
rect pay certificate number.

The stamp is printed in green on gray
paper with black serial numbers and is
roulette. I am willing to purchase these
at face value + a self-addressed stamped
envelope. The \$1 and \$2 vehicle transfer
stamps are also still available on the





WYOMING

Flaming Gorge Fishing Stamps

First issued for the 1964 season in accordance with a reciprocal agreement with the state of Utah. All adult resident or non-resident Utah licensees fishing the Wyoming portion of the reservoir were required to purchase stamps. Non-resident juveniles 12 or 13 years of age were not required to possess any state license but were required to purchase a stamp.

All 1964 through 1971 stamps have the printed text and serial numbers in black and are from vertical booklet panes of 5 (1 x 5) rouletted horizontally between stamps and at top selvage.



- 1964 \$2.00 green Wyoming Game and Fish Commission insignia (Pronghorn antelope in center) on lemon yellow surfaced paper. Overall stamp size approx 44 x 26 $\frac{1}{2}$ mm. Roul 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ horizontally.
- 1965 \$2.00 green on lemon yellow surfaced paper. Same as 1964 except change in year date.
- 1966 \$2.00 green on lemon yellow surfaced paper. Same as 1964 except change in year date.
- 1967 \$2.00 green insignia on dull yellow surfaced paper. Overall stamp size increased to approx 57 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 38 mm. A signature line has been added and printed text altered. Roul 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ horizontally.
- 1968 \$2.00 red insignia on pink paper. Roul 6 $\frac{1}{2}$. Otherwise same as 1967.
- 1969 \$2.00 green insignia on yellow paper. Otherwise same as 1967.
- 1970 \$2.00 green insignia on light yellow paper. Roul 6 $\frac{1}{2}$. Otherwise same as 1967.
- 1971 \$2.00 red insignia on blue paper. Roul 6 $\frac{1}{2}$. Otherwise same as 1967.





Fig. 59.- Double transfer at top and right on 50¢ (ST64).

Fig. 61.- Double transfer through and above "STATE", in "TAX" and in "DO" of "DOLLAR". Known on \$1 (ST65)




Fig. 62.- Double transfer at top, through and above "STATE OF NEW", through "STOCK" and "TAX", in left "1", and at bottom. Known on \$1 (ST65).




Fig. 64.- Double transfer in "S" and "E" of "TRANSFER", "X" of "TAX", right "2", and at bottom. Occurs on \$2 (ST65)




WASHINGTON SOFT FRUIT - "THE ERROR"

It has been some 24 years since the Washington State Fruit Commission first issued its stamps which, up until now, seemed relatively error-free. The story behind this one, although hypothetical, could be true, taking into consideration certain events that may have lead up to its occurrence. Fred E. Carver reported in the March 1961 State Revenue Newsletter that "the Commission originally planned to issue a series of stamps for each fruit which it was promoting. If this were the case, they quickly realized that, were the use of an issue of stamps limited to a particular fruit, the many mixed shipments that occur would require several different types of stamps". Confronted with this fact, the Commission decided upon a singular design idea that would be used for all types of fruit shipments. Having an urgent need for the new stamps the Commission placed a rush order for some 75,000 of the denominations required with the Pioneer, Inc., Tacoma (printers of the stamps). The printer, being rushed to deliver, probably only performed a cursory inspection of the stamps after printing and sent them onto the Commission. When they arrived, the Commission conducted an inventory prior to distribution and discovered that a printing error had occurred in some of the sheets of the "\$1.00".



Sheets 2404, 2407, and 2547 had only part (that being the "\$") and, in some, none of the "\$1.00" printed. Rather than returning them to have the error corrected, the required denomination was written in with a red lead pencil on each, thus our "\$1.00 ERROR".

The plausibility of this error occurring in this sequence of events can only be assumptive on my part, but yet take these factors into consideration. If the printer would have caught his own error does it seem reasonable, being rushed, as he probably was, to take the time to set down and write the denomination of each in by hand (questionable). The Fruit Commission required an Agent's Cash Receipt be prepared for the sale of stamps to the shippers. Each of these had the inscription "CAUTION Check stamps before signing". I doubt that the stamps could have even reached this point without the error being discovered, even had this been true, what would have precluded the shipper from inserting the \$5.00 denomination instead of the \$1.00? The idea of the printer being rushed to make delivery may be pursued even further by the fact that of the initial 50,000 delivered which included the 1¢, 5¢ and \$1.00 another oddity occurred, this being a variant in the 5¢ denomination. Although not as striking as the \$1.00 error this appears with the denomination "5¢" very much out of register and to the left and on top of the five line inscription.

Does anyone have a variant and/or error in the 1¢ denomination? If so, this may further substantiate my idea.

INDIANA SEED TAGS Richard Salzer shows us some of these. They were mentioned in the May 1961 Newsletter with three major types - "A", "B", and "C" - reported for different types of seeds. Each type also seems to come in several denominations. And now it appears there may be two subtypes of each. These are shown below for the "A" tag for "Unmixed Alfalfas, Clovers or Grasses". Both are for 50 lbs and printed in black on orange. Note that the first has printed data followed by printed lines on which the pertinent information is written in. The second has all of this space left blank and all the data is entered with a hand-stamp by the user.

There are also other differences such as size of printed inscription at bottom "See Other Side" and the amount of the fine "\$10 to \$100" vs "up to \$250" for using the tag a second time.
